Dear All,

What a privilege it is for me to write the first pastoral letter to the communities which comprise the new pastoral Charge of Mid Strathearn which was formed by the Union of the Parish of Fowlis Wester, Madderty and Monzie with the Parish of Gask, on 26<sup>th</sup> September.

Firstly, please let me introduce myself. I am Graham McWilliams, Parish Minister at Comrie and Dundurn, where I have served for just over 13 years. I am your Interim Moderator, which means that I am the minister appointed by the Presbytery of Perth to oversee the transition of the Parish of Mid Strathearn from a time of ministerial vacancy through to a time of installation of your next minister.

We live in a time of declining church membership, where people's faith in God is not reflected by their regular attendance at weekly worship. However, even in this climate, it is the call of the church to be a witness for God in our parishes. As St Paul reminds the Christians in Rome, 'how, then, can the people call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them?'

Speaking of God, and the Good News that God has given to us in Jesus, is not the sole responsibility of clergy, or Elders. It is our collective responsibility. And so, as the new Kirk Session gathers together all of the strands which are necessary to arrange ourselves into a new functioning Parish, to put us into a position to call a minister, I ask that everyone who reads this letter can find it in their heart to speak of the goodness of God, and encourage everyone in this new parish to be a living, breathing, people of faith, honouring to God in all that we do. It is through this concerted effort that we will be an attractive church, overcoming the barriers that life, and history, will place in our way.

St Paul was a man who regularly challenged the early church, and the people responded. And if it were not for the faithfulness of the people of yesterday, we would not necessarily be the people of faith that we are today. In our faith in Christ, there is more to unite us for the journey ahead than divide us. Not everything will be easy: nothing worthwhile ever is. Some traditions will pass, as they should, and new ones will be created as our living faith informs us of how we should be the church today.

Whatever part of your faith journey I am able to participate in, and support, I will do. But, ultimately, the responsibility of becoming a new church for the present age belongs to the people of God in the new church community of Mid Strathearn. It is your witness that will continue to share the word of God to those who have not yet come to know Him.

I wish you every blessing as, together, we step out in faith. Yours in Christ.

#### **Glenalmond Concert**

On Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> June a sizeable crowd of members and others enjoyed a most marvelous "Music for a Summer Evening" concert provided by some of the youngsters from Glenalmond College, led by their Director of Music, Dr. Tim Ridley and assisted by the Assistant Director of Music, Ms Jasmine Nicholson.

Ticket sales, after expenses, were to go to the Scottish Charity Air Ambulance whose helicopter can be seen from time to time in the sky above Monzie as it avoids the air space over Crieff. The evening began with a couple of pipers braving the midges at the door to welcome the audience and the event proper got under way with a short introduction to the work of the SCAA by one of their staff, Mr John Pritchard who brought with him lots of interesting reading material. As they get no direct government funding events like the concert are of great value to them in raising money to allow them to continue their good works.

The concert itself was given by ten of the youngsters from the College and what a talented bunch they turned out to be. There were ten items listed in the programme but they added in another where they all sang together as a choir because they were enjoying themselves! There was a trumpeter, solo singers, a violinist, someone playing the recorder, the trombone and and an organist. They provided an excellent concert of mixed music and the kirk proved to be the ideal venue. It would be wrong really to pick out any one performer but mention must be made of the young chap, Alexander Wallace, who played the organ twice. As he began his first piece you could see the audience turning to one another mouthing, "Wow! This chap can really play!" Note his name, someday he will be a very successful musician.

The concert was followed by an excellent supper in the hall where Mr Pritchard gave further details of the work of the SCAA. The evening resulted in over £500 being raised for their funds.

The main thanks are due really to Mrs Isla Crichton who had the idea to contact the College and ask them to give a concert. It was she who set up a meeting with Dr. Ridley, got a date decided and organised tickets and publicity. She was also mainly responsible for the supper spread in the hall afterwards.

Everyone agreed what a success the night was and it is hoped to do something similar again next year as the kirk is such a suitable place for a concert and it was wonderful to hear the place filled with music.

### **GASK NEWS**

#### **Partner Plan**

These are some excerpts from a letter from our Missionary Partner, David Sinclair who is working with the Reformed Church in Prague, Czech Republic. He and his wife were over here in the summer, but unfortunately, he was unwell and had to stay longer than he had planned. I wrote to him in the spring and finally have received more information from him.

"Since we got back just over two weeks ago, life has been hectic. The Evangelical Church of Czech Brethren (ECCB) is celebrating one hundred years since its foundation - in its current form (it really has a much longer history) it dates back to the same time as the formation of the then Czechoslovakia at the end of the First World War. At that time, in Bohemia and Moravia - but not Slovakia, the Reformed and Lutheran churches came together (and actually had quite a bit of help in how to organise themselves from the Church of Scotland).

ECCB congregations are, in many respects, remarkably similar to Church of Scotland ones. In the west of the country, where we are, the tradition is predominantly Reformed - so worship looks and feels very like home. The differences are the language, of course, and the fact that here we sit to sing and stand to pray. The church is broad in its theology, willing to criticise the government (particularly, for example, on its attitude to refugees) but is largely ignored. The congregations here face the same challenges as in Scotland, of declining membership and probably a tendency in most places to be somewhat inward-looking. Choice of hymns and style of music brings the same arguments here as at home! The people are, however, extremely friendly and welcoming - and we have been made to feel very much at home.

In October we will be spending weekends in two churches: one to the north, almost in Germany; the other to the south-east, almost in Austria. Both of these will be new to us. I will be preaching in at least one of them, maybe in both. And in the first we will then spend the Monday morning in a primary school going from class to class, talking about Scotland. In the second the emphasis of the visit will be more on their interest in a twinning with a Church of Scotland congregation; it will be very much a first conversation about that, so we will see where that goes.

My job has a large emphasis on twinning arrangements and contacts with 'the English-speaking world', so that currently is mostly about Scotland and the United States, though there are contacts with the United Reformed Church in England as well."

Anybody may write to David and support him, give him news from this end and find out more about his work and the Czech Replublic. I now have his email address, so I can supply it to anybody who is interested.

#### The Findo Gask Community Association

We, in the Parish of Findo Gask, would like to sing the praises of, and blow the trumpet for, the Findo Gask Community Association.

From a quite humble start the Association has grown and developed and we have, over the years, set up and hosted a variety of different events; an Art Exhibition, this developed when we suddenly realised there were four professional artists who live in around Clathy and Gask, and many gifted amateur artists. There have been Beetle Drives and Quiz nights, wonderful Pet Shows, Flower Shows, Gardening Question Times and Scarecrow Competitions and Litter pick gatherings and Barbeques. This has basically been achieved on an "ad hoc' basis.
