Mystery behind historic school house revealed

Kingsbury is home to one of the first poor schools to be built in the West Midlands in the seventeenth century. The Teachers House (previously known as Thomas Coton's help gain a speedier entrance into heaven! school), is now a Grade II listed private property that was provisioned for in a will in 1684 by Thomas Coton. This act of good will ensured that for the first time, the poor children of Kingsbury, Neither Whitacre and Marston could be educated for free, with lands allocated to pay for the teachers, the school equipment and the upkeep of the building. This act has ensured that Kingsbury has had a rich history of education for over 330 years (1686 – 2016) with the proud tradition continuing with the current Primary and Secondary schools. Whilst much has been written by the local community about the School, nothing is really known about Thomas Coton? Why did he do such a generous act by having a proper school built in Kingsbury?

This has been a mystery to the current owners for the past 15 years, until a set of remarkable events unfolded over the last few months. The first breakthrough really came when Craig was exploring old maps of the area. To his surprise, he noticed that on an old Ordnance Survey map ((1831-1835), a Coton Hall was listed just off the A4079.

Keen to learn more, Craig and his son took a walk down to the location on the map, which they walked to through the Water Park, and to their utter amazement, they spotted the original footings of the hall. The floor plan also clearly indicated that the School (Teachers House), Church and Kingsbury Hall would all have been visible from Coton Hall, and was possibly a key factor in having the school built on the hill, so the school could have been seen from the hall. Delighted at this find, Craig wanted to confirm that this was indeed true and enlisted the help of the local historian, Carole Haines, who validated the findings and also provided photo evidence of the hall, prior to it being

demolished. Carole also speculated that another reason wealthy people did benevolent acts in those days was to

which was where the site was located. This gave Craig the opportunity to discuss the history of schooling at Kingsbury and explore what the Environmental Agency knew of the hall. Mr Corder, Project Manager confirmed that they did own the land and also provided additional pictures of the hall before it had to be knocked down in 1994 for structural reasons. Whilst the Environmental Agency was aware of the hall, it was unaware of the importance of Thomas Coton and his legacy of the education of children in the area.

The happy ending to this story is that the Environmental Agency, given the significance of Thomas Coton's impact on the local area, has agreed to install a plaque in the car park of the Coton Fishery Lake to commemorate Thomas Coton and his wonderful gift to the Kingsbury community. Craig said he was delighted that this little piece of history will now be recorded for all, and is hoping that this article may help unfold even more facts about Thomas Coton and his life.


