#### The Forth Estuary features in the 2014 British Archaeological Awards

Congratulations to The SCAPE Trust and Save the Wemyss Ancient Caves Society who work within the Forth Estuary Forum area and have been shortlisted for 2014 British Archaeological Awards. The SCAPE Trust has been nominated in the Best Community Engagement Archaeology Project category for the Scotland's Coastal Heritage at Risk Project (SCHARP) and in the Best Archaeological Innovation catergory for ShoreUPDATE: Sites at Risk Map web portal and app. The Trust is also nominated along with Save the Wemyss Ancient Caves Society and The York Archaeological Trust in the Best Pubic Presentation of Archaeology category for the Wemyss Caves 4D project. #### Anstruther's whaling history

Wessex Archaeology Coastal & Marine, based in Edinburgh, have been working with The Scottish Fisheries Museum, Anstruther, Fife to investigate Scotland's early whale fishing industry and associated maritime heritage from the 18th century. The project has focused on investigating two key sites on Scotland's historic eastern seaboard; the mid-18th century whaling store, which is part of the Scottish Fisheries Museum and the late 18th century Montrose Rope & Sail works in Montrose Angus. ## Contributing to gannet research from your own home and improved facilities for wildlife watching on the Isle of May

The <u>live streaming cam</u> from the Scottish Seabird Centre allows you to observe the Bass Rock gannets from the comfort of your own home. By observing and recording the birds arriving and leaving their nests you could contribute to the research being done by Sue Lewis at the University of Edinburgh. Understanding what gannets do during the breeding season when they are under enormous pressure to feed their hungry chicks will us begin to understand how they can cope with climate change. Whilst seeing gannets close up on the Isle of May is not a regular occurrence, in peak season you can experience first- hand, nearly 200,000 seabirds. 2014 is a good year to visit as last month a new Visitor Centre was opened on the island. The centre gives visitors to the national nature reserve a panoramic view of the island's scenery and wildlife, information displays will help visitors orient themselves and make the most of their time on the island, as well as giving information about the birds and the research taking place on the Isle of May. The Mainstream Renewable Power project team are providing the opportunity for you to find out more about the Neart na Gaoithe offshore wind farm via exhibitions at a number of community events during the summer. Mainstream Renewable Power has commenced the development process for the proposed Neart na Gaoithe offshore wind farm which is located some 15km off the Fife coast and covers an area of approximately 100km<sup>2</sup>. Subject to securing the necessary consents, it is expected that the wind farm will commence construction by 2015.
