Ready for the new "normal"? - Part 3

The URC document asks the important question "What is the New Normal for your Church?"

- 1. **Do churches still need buildings?** Churches have survived the last few months using phone calls, broadcast or podcast services and posted information. Would being free from the worry and expense of buildings give churches new energy to engage in mission in the community?
- 2. What might worship look like? People have worshipped God quietly at home, praying alone, reading and hearing the same Bible passages as others but not necessarily at the same time. Could online "streamed" services become more common than the physically attended service?
- 3. What might work in the local community? With physical meeting restricted, or at least different, for a long time, what kinds of activities should the church support? How can the church help people outside the congregation in a socially-distanced community?
- 4. How do we collaborate? If physical meetings to discuss the practical business are difficult, how do the congregation and leaders work together to ensure safety, good stewardship and mission? How does the church walk together in the footsteps of Jesus?

One comment heard at a recent *Life after Lockdown* conference was:"Lockdown is not a sabbath to rest, but a jubilee to reset".

<u>Neighbour</u>

Our neighbour at 402 Chester Road is *AgeUK*. Here is a short history.



- In 1940 there was no welfare state, and World War II brought hardship to many older people. A group of individuals, charities and government was formed and became the National Old People's Welfare Committee.
- When the welfare state was born, the committee coordinated work among older people in the UK. Meanwhile disasters and conflict in central Europe, Asia and Africa led to a *Help the Aged Refugees Appeal* for older people suffering abroad.
- Renamed to *Help the Aged*, the appeal continued to fundraise for emergency aid overseas and it also started housing and day-centre projects in the UK.
- In 1971 the National Old People's Welfare Committee became independent of the government and was renamed as Age Concern. It developed its own services and commissioned reports especially on older people from ethnic minority groups.
- In 1980s, Age Concern also helped support training for unemployed older people, and Help the Aged opened shops selling second-hand goods.
- In 2000s, *Age Concern* and *Help the Aged* merged to become *AgeUK* at home and *Age International* for overseas work. The range of services in the UK expanded, with more practical support, information, and campaigning for older people.
