Brent Climate Change Strategy Conference

At the beginning of December we participated in the Launch of the Brent Climate Change Strategy. We set up a stand to demonstrate how our Group has contributed to the fight against Climate Change through the planting of over 20,000 trees over the years. The trees exchange CO2 to oxygen, thereby mopping up carbon pollutants. We also had on display a number of saplings we have grown from seed from the trees in Fryent Country Park – hawthorn, ash, oak, holly and silver birch. We also took a number of Alder Buckthorn trees, which we offered visitors free for planting in their gardens. The Alder Buckthorns should encourage Brimstone butterflies in the summer.

Fryent Country Park

We had another successful Countryside Day back in September. Our marquee was buzzing with visitors who were fascinated to see the bats brought in by the local 'batman'. The bats had not been taken from their normal environment, but were rescued bats which were being nursed back to good health, but they were in relatively good shape.

Work continues apace at the Park. We have cleared the scrubland on one of the last remaining areas of acid grasslands on the Park. This will encourage grasses and flowers that live on this habitat to thrive. ie those grasses such as red fescue, the bent grasses, cocksfoot and false oats – and flowers such as devils bit scabious and knapweed.

The Park has also gained the Soil Association Certificate for organic hay, and for the first time included our wood and fruit trees. How wonderful to have something without pesticides.

Debbie Pledge represented our Group at the Ninth National Biodiversity Network Conference, held in London in November. The theme was 'Non-native species: alien invaders or benign newcomers?' Further information on this subject can be obtained from Debbie.
