Fryent Country Park

We have had a good summer at Fryent Country Park. We have worked each Sunday on a different project, but especially on the acid grassland areas, Masons Field, the linear orchard and Bush Farm orchard where we have laid the hedge, and David has done sterling work clearing and cutting back. We have scalloped some of the blackthorn, and this is working very well. We have had good crops of wild flowers including Great Burnett and sneezewort.

The butterfly team – Simon, Michael and Leslie have walked the two butterfly transects every week since April and Gatekeepers have had an excellent year. Meadow Browns, Brimstones and Holly Blues have also had a good year as they find their food plants in abundance on the Park,.

There has also been sightings of a Ringlet – great news for the Park. Our records are part of the National Butterfly records and go back to 1986 when the transects were started. Our thanks to our recorders – new recorders would be most welcome. We are lucky in Brent to have such a wonderful Park with such biodiversity. BUT

Number crunching No 3

Since 11 Jan 2015 some 70 illegal rough sleeper camps have been cleared and 766 bags of rubbish collected, mainly by volunteers but with support from LB Brent and Veolia. In addition we have collected: 35 mattresses, 15 duvets, 11 tarpaulins, 11 pillows, 2 safes, 12 carpets, a recycling bin, a wardrobe, a door, 8 sheets of roofing, a satellite dish, 7 chairs, an iron, a phone, 2 toilet seats, large quantities of wood and metal, 2 drums, one petrol scooter etc etc, To all those who help in this difficult and dirty work, - thank you we would not have a Park without you.

One August morning I was filling yet another sack from a rough sleeper camp when I looked up to see two beautiful kestrels above me in Pages meadow. They swooped and hovered. They came so low the blue head and beautiful pattern of the wings could be seen easily. The beauty of nature above the rubbish being deposited in the Park
