Fryent Country Park

The Park has been at its best and most beautiful and interesting this summer. The meadows have produced a profusion of wild flowers and grasses which in turn have encouraged much wildlife. Many butterfly species have been seen and recorded. If you had been in the park on the right days you would have seen hundreds of gatekeepers, meadow browns and marbled whites.

The Sunday team are also working on uncovering an old orchard, which was part of the former Hill Farm seen on the Victorian ordnance survey map, and identified as Pightle Orchard in the All Souls College Hovingdon map of 1590. The area is given as 1 acre, 2 rods and 25 perches.

It has been necessary to replace a number of young poplar trees in the 'poplar avenue' that local residents Carlo and Raf, who both loved the park, had donated to the Park before they moved to France. The replacement trees were planted in late February 2017 but due to the extremely dry weather in early spring the trees were suffering. Dan Ridley-Kitts and John Parker spent every Sunday morning from June to the end of July watering the trees. They used pond water and gave each tree 20 litres of water. Due to this action only one tree appears to have been lost but may still recover. Lets hope so.

Once more we have been awarded a Green Flag for Community Gardens, and have also been judged for London in Bloom

The recently planted wild flower meadow in the Garden has been a success and has been attracting bees and butterflies, including a Ringlet which was seen during the hot weather. The meadow is close to the Stumpery and was developed during the winter months and planted up with wild flower seeds, grass seeds and plug plants during the spring.

Humphrey Repton at Fryent Country Park

Much of the top of Barn Hill was landscaped by Humphrey Repton. He started his work at Barn Hill about 1793, when the land was used for grazing before his design work. The area covered by his landscaping was the Acid grassland at the top of Barn Hill and also where Basing Hill and Brampton Grove now stand. It is thought he also designed the pond. He planted many of the trees including English Oak, Elm, Lime, Beech Hornbeam, Wild Cherry and Ash.

Humphrey Repton was involved in many London gardens - possibly about 50. Many are now lost, so at Barn Hill we still have part of the garden he designed – an important part of history we should treasure.
