Activities in Fryent Country Park

Since our last newsletter we have had 17 projects in Fryent Country Park and have also completed the hay meadow and butterfly survey for the year.

Our projects on the Park have included work on the meadows to improve the species and richness, we have worked on the orchards, and continue to restore the acid grasslands areas. We keep Hell Lane (the ancient lane between St Albans and London in use since 1000) clear of overhangs. Our thanks to Helga who keeps the refreshments rucksack replenished each week and to Anju for sorting the tools for the projects, and our volunteers who collect and return the tools each week (with help from Parks Dept).

We have had a good year for hay at Fryent Country Park due to the fine weather. The hay has now been collected by an organic farmer.

Dr Bruno Bubna-Kasterlitz

What is the connection with Dr Bruno Bubna-Kasterlitz and Barn Hill Conservation Group I hear you ask?

Kingsbury Manor (originally called 'The Cottage') and the adjacent Walled Garden were built in 1899 for the Duchess of Sutherland as a weekend retreat for herself and 3rd husband Sir Albert Kaye Rollit. Irene, the Duchess's daughter by her first marriage to Arthur Kindersley Blair, married Count Johann Franz Bubna-Litic in 1901; they were Dr Bruno's grandparents. On the death of her mother in 1912, Irene inherited 'The Cottage'.

Dr Bruno contacted our Group through our website and Scott emailed photographs of the Garden and the models we have of the Duchess, her maid and gardener. There has been a lively exchange of emails between myself and Dr Bruno who kindly donated to the Group a

book that was published in February 2018 called 'The Life and Times of Mary, Dowager Duchess of Sutherland' by Catherine Layton and Dr. Bruno.

Dr. Bruno will be visiting the Walled Garden on the afternoon of [19th October](#) and in the evening will be giving a talk for the Wembley History Society about his great grandmother.
