

### Newspaper extracts

Malton Messenger 29 March 1856

*A trotting match was held on the Pickering to Whitby road for a £1 bet between Mr Stephenson's bay mare 'Pretty Mol' and Mrs Lynes's bay mare 'Moorland Maid', from the Fox and Rabbit to Hellfield Gate, a distance of 1 mile. Moorland Maid was the winner by several lengths. After the race the sporting gents passed the evening at the Fox and Rabbit in the greatest harmony.*

And from what must have been a period of slow news:

Malton Messenger 25 Nov 1893

*A goose belonging to Miss Mackley of Whitethorn, Lockton hatched a number of goslings.*

Malton Messenger 3 Nov 1894:

*Mr Roberts, headmaster of the Board School in this village and student of the Arts Class for Teachers held in Whitby was awarded the first prize for drawing in light and shade (elementary stage).*

## St. Giles' Church

Dear Friends,

Thank you to all of you who came to the wonderful Service of Thanksgiving held at the end of October to mark the completion of restoration of St Giles' Church. It was good to have the Archdeacon there as preacher, and good to have so many people, not only from Lockton, but from the whole benefice: every church was represented.

Onward we go. There is always work to do on a building as old as St Giles', and we will continue the work of maintenance and restoration.

Some people from Lockton have expressed concern that a light or candle appears to have been kept burning at night. Do not be alarmed! The aumbry – where the Reserved Sacrament is once again kept – traditionally has a light that burns over it, and the lamp used is the one that would have burnt certainly during all the years that Fr Cause was Rector here. It is good to restore it to its proper use once again. It highlights the importance of the Sacrament, and it constantly shines because it reminds us all that whilst the church might well be the oldest building in Lockton; whilst it is literally at the centre of the community it has served for so many centuries, its primary purpose is to tell people of God in their very midst.

What could be a finer thought than that as we approach Christmas which, whilst for some is a season of family togetherness and parties, is really about God choosing to become one of us, and walk on this earth a human being, enjoying with his friends food and drink and good stories; sharing with others their sorrows; suffering pain and torture, and then rising from the dead to offer us all a unique hope.

Look again at that light shining out in the darkness of a winter night and remember that God is present for you. That little church is a space in the village devoted wholly to God. Keep it special.

## Neighbourhood Watch



### Internet scams

Internet users are being warned about cold callers who offer to fix viruses but then install software to steal personal information.

Internet users are also urged to be wary of pop-ups offering virus checks. Earlier this year, search engine giant Google warned it had discovered massive amounts of malicious fake anti-virus software. Some of the scams involve pop-up windows claiming that the computer has been infected. These "scareware" approaches encourage users to click through to a site hosting malicious or useless software that acts as a front for gathering personal information. Most of the time, the software appears almost identical to professional anti-virus products. In other cases, call centres have been set up in eastern Europe or Asia and cold-call UK phone numbers attempting to find people to con.

### Burglaries

There have been burglaries in several local villages recently, including Middleton, Wombledon and Kirby Misperton. These have mostly been in the early evening just after it's got dark.

## Parish Council news—Grit bins & snow-ploughing

Ryedale District Council had filled all the grit bins during Autumn. This grit is for use on public roads and pavements only. Due to cost cutting and to ensure that there is enough grit available for the highways gritters, the grit bins will only be refilled in exceptional circumstances. Please do not use this grit for private driveways.

To enable the snow plough to keep the village roads clear, please park off the road wherever possible.
