# Lockton & Levisham Heritage Group

# 🗱 THE NATIONAL TRUST

For the past few months the Moors team has been spending plenty of time up on Bridestones moor. We've been working on a project to restore a Scheduled Ancient Monument (SAM) that has become overgrown with birch and pine trees that threatened to damage the underlying archaeology.

The SAM is a prehistoric boundary feature that is almost 1km long, so clearing the dense trees from it is going to take quite some time. In fact we expect to be working on it for several years. We've already made a really good start though thanks to help from the various volunteer groups we work with. The Explorer Scouts, the National Park's Hobs group and our midweek and Sunday volunteers have all spent days with us clearing trees from the monument.

Waiting for spring – and one of the first signs for me is seeing bees foraging in late winter when the sun finally comes out. What can we do to help them at this early time of the year when not much is growing? This is from the North York Moors Park website:

'The anatomy of different bees species varies greatly, and so to assist most species it's best to have a wide range of flower species from which they can

feed. As some of the mining bees have short tongues of only 4-5mm, they need open flowers such as cow parsley and daisies. The garden bumblebee *Bombus hortorum* on the other hand has a tongue that can extend to around 12mm, so it can feed from flowers with a long corolla (ie

petals) like foxgloves and honeysuckle. As well as fragrance, one of the other things that attracts

bees to



flowers is colour. So it's worth considering maintaining colours throughout the season. For example, coltsfoot and hawk's beard proved yellow colour from about February to June, and then cat's ear and bristly oxtongue do the same from June to October.

Similarly, a successional combination of white deadnettle, oxeye daisy and yarrow can ensure there are plenty of white flowers throughout the year. Interestingly, it is thought that bees can see in ultraviolet, which means how they perceive flowers will be very different from how we do.'
