Since the last six monthly newsletter we have promoted Neighbourhood Watch in many ways. Our Steering group attended The Bull Hotel, Halstead in May and we met up with our local Pcso's (see picture above).

In July they both attended our Annual General Meeting at Gosfield Village Hall and gave a talk to a full capacity audience and then held one to one with our attendees. It has proved successful that, with the help of Essex Police, Neighbourhood Watch membership has increased in Braintree District which we appreciate very much. Every week we not only receive crime information from Braintree Police (which is summarized in the weekly but also their Partnership newsletter) Document and they are both distributed to over 120 Braintree District Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinators (who then forward it to all their members which reach over 1,000 people per week).

We are always looking for volunteers who may have a little time in their lives to distribute Neighbourhood Watch information to their neighbours, friends and family too by email or create a Neighbourhood Watch facebook page that covers your road/street or local area.

So if you have even 10 minutes a week that would be great. The more people who receive Neighbourhood Watch information the better as it does help to reduce the opportunity of crime. Neighbourhood Watch items

If you are a member of your local Neighbourhood Group and receive from your Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator information each week why not also ask for some of the following:- Window stickers, Wheelie Bin stickers, UV pens, Contactless card protector wallets* (* these are 50p each), Purse bells, Message in a Bottle , Neighbourhood Watch Street signs, The Nominated Neighbours Cards (which prevents anyone opening doors to those they do not expect) and of course the Essex County NW Members Guide (which has our Code of Ethics), as well as the email weekly newsletter. It is important to know that no other organisation can supply such items to you not even National Neighbourhood Watch. Only your local NW Co-ordinator can provide them as well as keeping you up to date on local Neighbourhood Watch issues.

<u>Funding for Braintree District Neighbourhood</u> Watch?

Ask if your Parish Council may have a once off up to £50 (from their crime prevention budget) and may be willing to give to Neighbourhood Watch?

Neighbourhood Watch is good at reducing the fear of crime (as well as the opportunity of crime) as we <u>carefully</u> communicate serious issues to family, friends neighbours and members.

COUNTY LINES:

This is a very serious issue where criminal gangs set up a drug dealing operations in a place outside their usual operating area. Gangs will move their drug dealing from big cities to smaller towns in order to make more money. This can have a really big effect on the community who live there and bring with it serious criminal behavior.

County lines commonly involves the illegal distribution and dealing of seriously dangerous drugs from one city/town to another. The most common drugs involved are heroin and cocaine (crack and powder), but also MDMA, cannabis, amphetamines.

Gangs sometimes use violence to threaten young people when recruiting them and they recruit young people to move drugs and money for them often using social media. Young people are exploited and forced to carry drugs between locations, usually on trains or coaches.

They are also forced to sell drugs to local users. Here are some signs to look out for that can suggest that someone you know might be involved in county lines activity.

Are they always going missing from school or their home? Are they travelling alone to places far away from home? Do they suddenly have lots of money/lots of new clothes/new mobile phones? Are they receiving many more calls or texts than usual? Are they carrying or selling drugs?

Are they carrying weapons or know people that have access to weapons?

Are they in a relationship with or hanging out with someone/people that are older and controlling? Do they have unexplained injuries?

Do they seem very reserved or seem like they have something to hide?

Do they seem scared and are they self-harming?
