Minister's letter

Dear Friends,

I am only just old enough to remember steam engines operating on the main rail network. When I was young I used to travel by train to Guildford station where there were still a few steam trains operating. Steam engines have a peculiar attraction. There seem to be an ever increasing number of privately run steam railways. However, steam engines weren't really all that efficient; they took time to pull away and pick up speed.

Today we travel on modern trains like the Azuma between the major cities of the country. The guard blows the whistle or pushes the button and the engine pulls away quickly, smoothly and effortlessly. It draws its electric power from outside itself, a power much more effective than the old steam engine which made its own power.

This is a parable for us as we live our lives for Christ. Although we trust in God we often labour under our own steam because we do not allow the Holy Spirit to control our lives. When we try to manage on our own we don't get very far; we feel we're not being very effective in God's service.

What we need is a power that comes from outside ourselves – the power of the Holy Spirit that God offers to each one of us.

The Precursors of the 16th Century Reformation Part 3 Jan Hus 1369 - 1415

Jan Hus was born in Husinec in 1369, to a peasant family in Bohemia, a country which we now call the Czech Republic. Bohemia still has a secondary meaning, believed to be the place where gipsies originated (hence the idea that people who do not follow the traditional way of life are called Bohemians). However here we are discovering the historic facts about one of Bohemia's mediaeval citizens who contributed ideas to reform the Roman Catholic church in that country and eventually died for his beliefs.

Bohemia was a Slavonic nation and did not receive Christianity from western Europe, but from a Slavonic source. Coming later under German influence in its politics, Bohemia was compelled to accept western Roman Catholicism. In Jan Hus's time during the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries there were minor rebellions among outspoken clergy. The English John Wycliffe's writings became available suggesting a new organisation of the church, ideas which had great influence on Jan Hus.

The local Bohemian dynasty came to an end in 1306 and a new dynasty was installed to rule, coming from Luxembourg. The extra title of King of the Romans passed through that family and Charles IV became emperor. The territory of the Empire expanded and Bohemia became the centre of German immigration, culture and learning.

All the time that Hus was alive there was disruptive occurrence in the catholic church called the Great Schism, beginning in 1378 and lasting thirty eight years. It was really a battle for the election of a new pope. Three ambitious men with their own supporters competed for the role. Confrontations, underhand scheming and verbal assaults were regularly heard and seen. Church councils were set up to deal with the divisions. The split occasioned competition from France and two French popes set themselves in office while Italians assumed the high office for themselves. This disruption was always in the background. Hus as a young man was intelligent enough to enter the University of Prague, a recently opened institution. He studied in the faculty of liberal arts. In 1400 he was ordained as a priest and the following year was elected Dean of the faculty. He wished to work towards a doctorate but the work was never completed. Already rumours were spreading regarding his beliefs and what he said when addressing his congregation at Bethlehem Church. His popularity

rose because his sermons were preached in the vernacular; Latin was disregarded. His friend Jerome of Prague provided him with the writings of John Wycliffe. Latin in this respect, from England, was influential, making a good impression on him. Those who heard his sermons, often with quotations from Wycliffe, became aware of the outside influence and condemned them.



The Archbishop of Prague in the beginning supported Hus and appointed him to preach at the Prague Synod of 1405. However Hus used that time to attack the clergy, their immoral behaviour, their neglect of the Bible, their personal wealth and their abusive tendencies. Naturally the clergy opposed him and led Popes Innocent VII and Gregory XII to condemn him. The Archbishop was told to confront Hus and ordered the burning in public of Wycliffe's books.

Hus was forbidden to preach but continued to do so. The one area where he agreed with the catholic church was in the belief in transubstantiation, the doctrine that focussed on the communion and the idea that the bread and wine, after consecration, changed into the body and blood of Jesus Christ and remained so afterwards. However Hus demanded that both elements, bread and wine, should be given to all communicants as everyone, except the clergy and certain V.I.P.s, was given the bread only. The church raised objections; this was an attack on their historic traditions. Hus was charged therefore with heresy and put under interdict, thus being barred from all ecclesiastical functions and privileges. In 1412 he was compelled to leave Prague and went to stay at a friend's house. Here he composed his greatest work "De ecclesia", an analysis of the doctrines, the teaching and practice of the church, together with an interpretation of the Bible. Scholars say that some of his ideas in this work were borrowed from Wycliffe's writings.

In 1414 he was summoned to the Council of Constance to defend his beliefs. Sigismund, King of Bohemia, offered him safe conduct but that was withdrawn for political reasons. Hus was therefore arrested, charged with heresy and in July 1415 he was burned at the stake. One year later his friend Jerome suffered the same fate.

Of course Hus had many followers from all sections of society, known as the Hussites. After his death they gathered together and fought for the beliefs they shared with Hus. Fierce battles occurred for many years and the church failed to control the opposition. They concurred in the recognition of the 16th century Reformation but there was a long waiting time until the 20th century when the Hussite church was first set up in Czechoslovakia.

Certain historians describe the life and times of Jan Hus as a pre-Reformation. Others do not and think that Martin Luther and Jean Calvin were not influenced by him. Some call him a puritan who sought a change in the nature of the church, going back to the early Christian church, plain and simple and unadorned with a focus on the Bible. He gave his life for these principles which were only recognised by the state centuries later.

Children's Yoga:

As the founder and teacher of Body, Mind and Heart Kids Yoga and Mindfulness I really enjoy the children walking through the door to their weekly Monday and Friday after school classes at The Grove Centre.

I have built a true passion for teaching children and teenagers to learn to look after their bodies and minds after first practising when I was only fourteen years old.

Although children's yoga follows the main points of movement through yoga poses, working with your breath and relaxation it is very different to an adult class. This is especially true of my children's fun and interactive class (4-8 years) where we make more noise, play games and follow stories and teen classes (8-16 years) follow a more adult theme, with added mindfulness in the form of gratitude journals and a safe place to share if you so wish.

There are many benefits of yoga and mindfulness for children including:

• maintaining the flexibility their bodies are naturally born with and building strength and better posture

- teaching them to breath more deeply, which is a great tool to help them to cope with the varied emotions they deal with from being very excited to being sad, angry or nervous and helping to encourage better sleep
- promoting effective concentration and communication skills.

I'm an accredited Kids Yoga Teacher and complementing this is my Diploma in Mindfulness for Children and my training with Youth Mindfulness in teaching a full stand alone mindfulness curriculum.

You can also find me teaching family yoga and mindfulness and work closely with primary and high schools helping Year 6 students preparing for SATS and at special events such as Mental Health Week and Schools Health Week.

The Rattenbury Dynasty

Following Gordon's article about the Rev. H.B. Rattenbury I thought that readers might be interested to learn that this famous Methodist dynasty had connections with our circuit. While Albert was on the staff at Oxford Place Chapel (1977-84) the Rev H Morley Rattenbury was asked to preach there. Morley was the elder son of Harrold (sic) Burgoyne Rattenbury and Emily (see Dec/Jan Grove Vine). When Albert moved on to Trinity Church Bramley he invited Mr Rattenbury to preach there. He and his wife Elizabeth came to lunch with us following the service and from then on he preached several times at Trinity, living as they were in retirement in Otley. It is quite likely that he may have taken services at the Grove, does anyone remember?

Morley was born in August 1915 in Kuling in China and was educated at the Methodist school, Kingswood, in Bath. He read medieval history at Oriel College, Oxford, before training for the ministry at Wesley House, Cambridge, as did Albert which gave them immediate interests in common.

During World War II Morley was an RAF chaplain.

While teaching church history and History of Doctrine at Headingley College 1954-1967, he led the way in establishing a Methodist International House in Leeds. He retired to Otley and then moved to Silverdale in Lancashire where we visited and were entertained by them a number of times. They attended the little Methodist Church and delighted to have theological discussions with us. Both were great readers. We also enjoyed being shown around their garden of which they were very proud and sitting out for tea when the weather allowed.

Morley died in May 2005 in Lancaster. Elizabeth lived for several years more. A lovely couple.
