PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Councillor Vacancy

We were all sorry to hear that Ashley Briggs has decided to resign from the Council for personal reasons. His contribution to the establishment of the youth club has been crucial and his management of last year's carnival exemplary. We hope he will continue his involvement with both activities in some way. The vacancy is being advertised and, unless an election is requested, we will interview applicants with a view to cooption. The co-option process is confidential and only the name of the successful applicant will be publicised. If you feel you would like to help manage Bradwell Parish Council's responsibilities and have ideas which you would like to bring to our debates about the future of the village, please contact the Parish Clerk, Steve Lawless (tel 620329, email - stevelawless@supanet.com), or any Councillor.

Annual Parish Meeting

This was held on May 6th when Chairman Stephen Eyre was re-elected for another year. Chairs of sub-committees and Council representatives on outside bodies were also elected. **War Memorial**

The PC authorised the Clerk to accept the lowest quote for cleaning the memorial and replacing the lead lettering with black epoxy resin. Funding for this will, appropriately we feel, be taken from the Community Fund - which mostly arises from the compensation we received from the British Legion for demolishing the old Legion hut.

Village Organisations Grants Budget

We agreed to a request from the Wells Dressing Committee for £600 towards the cost (£800) of a new frame for the Church Street Well. The old frame is now beyond repair. We also agreed a donation request, from Bradwell Cycling Club, for £50 towards the running costs of the village defibrillator.

Parish Clerk's Workload

It was agreed, with immediate effect, to increase the Clerk's paid hours from ten to fifteen per week - to reduce the gap between hours paid and those actually worked. The extra cost of £2631 will be drawn from the contingency provision in this year's budget. We thank him for his hard work and dedication since his appointment.

Dale End Adverse Possession

The PC agreed to a recommendation from the Rights of Way and Common Land Committee to enter into a joint agreement with the owners of Leigh Cottage. The Clerk was consequently authorised to go ahead with arranging for the village caretaker to fence around the plot which the Parish Council is claiming. He was also asked to obtain quotes for clearance of trees from the site.

Newburgh Development

Planners have insisted that a full socio-environmental impact assessment report on the proposed site should accompany the application. This effectively delays the process by about three months. Consequently the final plan is not now

expected to be submitted for approval before the end of June. **Youth Centre**

At our May meeting the PC agreed to employ a regular cleaner at the Centre. Anyone interested in this position should contact the Parish Clerk for details of hours and rate of pay.

HOPE VALLEY FIRST RESPONDERS

The Hope Valley Neighbourhood First Responder Unit is comprised of local volunteers who provide immediate care to patients in the minutes before an ambulance arrives at the scene. In many medical emergencies, simple but critical actions by a trained first aider within those first few minutes can help save lives. This is especially the case for heart attacks, loss of consciousness, and choking. When the East Midlands Ambulance Service receives a 999 call and dispatches an ambulance, they can also request the attendance of the on-call volunteer from the Neighbourhood First Responder Unit who can provide patient care in advance of the ambulance's arrival. Hope Valley First Responders cover an area from Grindleford to Castleton and from Edale to Bradwell. Cover is provided from 8am till 10pm, 7 days a week. We have been in operation for nearly five years and have attended over 450 calls. We have 15 responders but we are always looking for more volunteers! No experience is necessary as all training is provided free by the East Midlands Ambulance Service and Derbyshire St. John Ambulance. If you feel you could help this worthwhile cause, your help would be greatly appreciated. You will need some spare time and access to a car. A REDISCOVERED LEAD MINE

The ruins of a long-lost lead-mine have been uncovered after a marathon eight years of effort by the Peak District Mines Historical Society. The remains of the once-impressive High Rake Mine near Windmill at Great Hucklow, are now accessible to the public, adding to the wealth of heritage sites that can be visited in the Peak District National Park. High Rake once rivaled the famous Magpie Mine near Sheldon, but its engine houses and other buildings were demolished in the late 1920s by Henry Boot to build council houses in nearby Bradwell. John Barnatt, the project archaeologist and society's conservation officer, said: "When we began work here in 2000 there was little to see, but now, after much hard work by society volunteers working one Saturday a month, things are very different. "We initially thought that all we would find would be low foundations, but a big surprise awaited us. Very unusually the bottom third of the largest building on site, a Cornish pumping engine house, had been set below ground level. After something like three years of filling buckets, we found the original floor within the building at 25 feet down. The once state-of-theart mine, which was worked by local lead miners between 1834 and 1852, was started with great optimism. The owners were going to make a fortune by sinking a shaft through volcanic rock to reach rich ore deposits beneath. They spent years sinking the shaft, which eventually reached 720 feet before the money ran out. We now know that they were sinking the shaft in a volcanic plug going towards 'the centre of the earth'. The venture was doomed to failure. In modern terms they lost millions. The Peak District Mines Historical Society project included detailed archaeological excavations and conservation of the ruins for future generations to see".

The society has installed three interpretation panels and iron railings for public safety around deep drops. Costs of £7,400 were funded by the Peak District National Park Authority's Sustainability Development Fund, Vision Project, Lead Rakes Project and Cultural Heritage Grant Scheme. In addition, £500 was given by councillors Tracy Critchlow and Judith Twigg under the Derbyshire County Council Leadership Scheme. Society members contributed expertise and labour free of charge. Mave Luff, the society chairman, said: "It is very pleasing that our efforts at High Rake have been recognised and that the Peak District National Park Authority and Derby-



shire County Council are helping make possible the interpretation of this important historic mine to the public."

BRADWELL POST OFFICE

As many of you will now have heard, Bradwell Post Office has been identified as a Branch which Post Office Ltd proposes to keep open. At this stage I must stress that this is only a proposal and depending upon the outcome of the local area consultations, due to commence Tuesday 10th June, this could yet alter. The local area plan for the Greater Manchester and High Peak Area will be available to view from this date. The web address is http://www.postoffice.co.uk/portal/po following the links for Network Change. The final decision should be known by 12th August 2008.

Clearly these are difficult times for Post Office Ltd with the continued loss of much of its traditional business. The government will announce in August whether the Post Office will continue to handle its Pensions and Benefits business, or whether these too will be handed to a private company. As you can see, the challenges just keep on coming! It is important therefore that those services which do remain are used as much as possible. It is only because of the high number of transactions carried out over the counter that Bradwell Post Office has survived thus far, and it is only through continued use that we will see Bradwell Post Office surviving into the future.
