Chairman's Blog

I hope that you had a nice Christmas and a Happy New Year to you all.



It was not a good start to 2016 for me, as many of you know. However, I will tell all at the meeting on Thursday, which is the Honey Show. I hope that we will have a good number of entries and Jack Mummery, the judge, knows his stuff and was extremely complimentary about all the exhibits the last time he judged our show.

Don't forget that the sales are on at this time of the year and bargains can be had. Many firms waive the carriage fee if your order is more than £100, so if you do not spend this much, team up with another beekeeper or two to beat the limit.

On Wednesday 13th January there will be a bee forum at the South Park Community Centre, Buckfast - see this month's Beekeeping - and Bill Finnemore will be on the panel. The subject will be the importation of honeybees. It should be a lively debate! I will do my best to be there!

Now something from the magazine where the author ought to have known better. A swarm is collected from a post box - Beekeeping page 16. Whenever a swarm is collected, especially if it is from your own hive and you wish to house it in the same apiary, it is always wise to put a piece of queen excluder over the entrance if housing them in a nuc box or, if it goes straight into a hive, put a QX between the bottom of the brood box and the floor. Remove it when the queen has started laying. If a virgin queen has headed the swarm, then you still have to take a chance unless you have a spare queen cell or mated queen with which you can replace the virgin.

My only wish for the New Year is for less rainfall! Warm, wet and windy weather is not good for the bees in winter. Above all, check their stores by hefting the hives, and if they feel light, feed with candy or the like, but not syrup. Mind you, I remember being told many years ago that rainfall averages work out in the end, so let's hope that having the rain now will lead to a glorious, warm summer and a bumper honey crop!

Finally, my heartfelt thanks to all of those members who contacted me after my recent predicament, offering to assist. What a great membership we have!



HONEY SHOW SCHEDULE

1 2 x 1lb Jars of light run honey Slater Cup (in standard 1 lb jars with plastic or metal tops) 2 2 x 1lb Jars of medium run honey **Edwards Cup** (in standard 1 lb jars with plastic or metal tops) 3 2 x 1lb Jars of dark run honey **Tucker Cup** (in standard 1 lb jars with plastic or metal tops) 4 2 x 1lb Jars of crystallised honey Winnicott Cup (in standard 1 lb jars with plastic or metal tops) 5 2 x 1lb Jars of creamed honey Perpetual Trophy (in standard 1 lb jars with plastic or metal tops) 6 1 Pair of beeswax candles **Prosser Tray** (One pair of identical candles made from pure beeswax. One candle may be lit by the judge) **7** I Bottle of Mead (any type) Mansfield Tray (all bottles to be clear punted with new flanged corks) **8** 1 Frame of comb for extraction **Eric Goss Tray** (may be any type of shallow frame) Interserve Tray 9 1 Jar of honey labelled for sale (Labelling to E.C. regulations. Honey may be of any variety.) 10 6 x 1oz blocks of beeswax Poole Tray (all blocks must be identical and may be from any shape mould) 11 Beeswax Open Class Bandvulc Tray (any wax item or product eg polish or wax block etc) 12 1 Honey Sandwich (see recipe) Ward Cup (white paper plates will be provided for display) 13 12 pieces of Honey fudge (see recipe) **Barton Cup** (white paper plates will be provided for display) 14 Novice Class Milford Cup (any category of beekeeping exhibit from classes 1 to 12 entered by a novice) See Show notes for further guidance. 15 Open Class eg photo, gadget etc Mayflower Marina Open to all items of beekeeping interest not covered by classes 1 Cup to 12)

SHOW NOTES

Honey Keep everything clean and shiny, no odd bees, legs etc. A clean jar makes the

Classes 1–5: honey look clear and bright.

Class 6: Candles may be displayed free-standing or in candlesticks. Do not overheat the wax

as this makes the wax become darker and most judges prefer a bright amber colour. Use fine filters, if possible, to remove impurities which may come to the surface and spoil and otherwise fine exhibit. Polish the candle to get a good smooth shiny

appearance.

Class 7: Mead. Again cleanliness is a must. The punt will show up any debris and any

fermentation will show up at the bottle neck. A nice clear yellow always looks

pleasing but the ultimate goal is the flavour. Use good quality honey for good quality

mead.

Class 8: When choosing a frame make quite sure that it is not granulated or weeping honey.

The capping must cover the surface to the edge. Cleanliness is desirable but not

essential if it is an old well used frame.

Class 9: Make sure that you are up to date on all the E.C. regulations.

Class 10: Make sure that your blocks are 1 oz, some judges will weigh them. All six blocks

should be identical in colour and shape so melt all the wax together first for

uniformity.

Classes 12.13: Keep to the recipes provided

Class 14: Novices – choose your exhibits from any of the above classes. A novice is someone

who has never won a prize in the category entered eg an option for beginners honey

if you have not won a honey prize before.

Class 15: Open to all beekeepers, young and old, to show off photos, gadgets, poems etc.

SHOW SCHEDULE CLAUSES

- 1 This show is held in accordance with the show Rules (1994) of the British Beekeepers' Association and Exhibitors are bound by them.
- 2 Entries must be made on the form provided and filled in on the evening of the Show.
- 3 The entry fees are free!
- 4 Judging will commence at 7.30pm.
- 5 No exhibit or any part thereof shall be removed until after the prize giving.
- 6 The Show will be open to members and exhibitors at the close of judging.

Recipes

Class 12

Honey Sandwich

6oz Margarine 4oz Caster Sugar

1 tbsp Honey 3 Large Eggs

6oz Self Raising Flour Pinch Salt

Cream margarine, sugar and honey until light and fluffy. Whisk eggs and beat into creamed mixture. Fold in sifted flour and salt. Divide into two prepared 7" sandwich tins and bake in moderate oven for about 30 mins. Turn onto a wire tray and when cold, sandwich together with honey filling.

Filling

4oz Icing Sugar 1 Tablespoon Honey

2oz Butter

Blend together until smooth.

Class 13

12 Pieces Honey Fudge

1lb Granulated Sugar

1/4 Pint Evaporated Milk

1/4 Teaspoon Salt

2oz Butter

2 Tablespoons Honey

Boil sugar and milk for 5 mins. Add honey and boil until "soft ball stage" at 240°F (Thermometer is needed as the temperature is critical). Add butter. Beat until creamy, pour into buttered dish. When nearly set, mark into 12 squares. Use full amount for entry.

IMYB 2017 will be held in England if BBKA members are in support.

What a chance for us to showcase beekeeping in England.

What a chance for young beekeepers to show how well they understand beekeeping here in England.

Yes, the BBKA Executive have agreed a proposal that, subject to it not being a drain on BBKA resources, the International Meeting of Young Beekeepers should be held here in England. We don't want it to be a drain on resources and will be looking to raise as much sponsorship as we can but we will also be asking you, the members of the BBKA to demonstrate your support through a small financial contribution. If every member makes a contribution of just £1 towards this prestigious and forward looking-event this will cover around onethird of the cost of hosting the event and we already have plans for raising the other two-thirds.

We hope that this will be discussed at the ADM in January and would like your support when we ask members to agree to a one off, one time levy of £1 for each member. With the expectation of media coverage, we hope that you will agree that this is a wonderful opportunity to make the public at large aware of the importance of beekeeping and, particularly, the importance of young people taking up our craft.

There will be much to do to make sure that we are ready the host best IMYB to date; as always it will be most successful if we all pull together. We are looking for volunteers to help; people with language skills will be particularly helpful as in addition to the three main languages for the event (English, German and Russian) there will be people who speak other languages present probably including Slovak, Sloveian, Czech, Polish, Hebrew, Arabic, Danish, to name but a few. Although we will hold the event at Marlborough College in Wiltshire, a well-established college location with all of the boarding facilities you would expect, if we have to pay for administrators to do the work the costs go up so we will be looking for volunteers to act as ambassadors and administrators too. And if you have special skills such as photography, graphic, design or can manufacture badges, medals or certificates there is a role for you too.

Welsh honey 'as potent as Manuka' found in new drugs hunt

Cardiff University experts analysed the honey created by bees from 250 Welsh hives to find plants they had visited with high anti-microbial properties. They uncovered a honey in Gwynedd "as potent" as New Zealand's famed Manuka.

The team is now setting up an urban honey-making scheme to see if it can be brought to market.
