BABY MAPENZI

"We did not know that when Mapenzi Kahindi was brought to us about a month ago, she had a broken **arm**. The doctor's assessment was that the hand either broke at birth or shortly after. At the Kilifi hospital the doctor said we had a chance to correct the baby's hand now before it was too late, otherwise she would grow up with a crippled hand. Mapenzi had her hand redirected to the correct position and it is healing well. We thank God that, despite the temporary pain that she went through during the operation, she will grow up with a normal hand. According to the report from the Kilifi District Children's Office the baby had not been given any immunization after birth. She was given two immunizations at the Kilifi general hospital against polio and tetanus. Other immunizations and tests will follow as she grows. Mapenzi was seriously malnourished when she came to Mudzini but she is picking up very well and has put on some weight. The mother is still under treatment and we are praying that she recuperates soon." Catherine
