Eskdalemuir: Health and Social Care Meeting

Thursday 30 October 2014

1. Introduction

Paul Nelis from SCDC gave a summary for the Eskdalemuir Health and Social Care survey findings. In total 54 people (74%) responded to the questionnaire from a target of 70 households. The results from the survey were posted out to 240 individuals in the community on 20th October 2014 along with an invite to the public meeting in the Hub to discuss the results.

Approximately 20 people turned up for the discussion about Health and Social Care needs of the wider community.

2. Definitions

At the start of the discussion Paul defined the terms Health and Social Care as this would be the main focus of the evening's discussion. Health: The World Health Organisation's statement that health is 'a state of physical, social and mental wellbeing and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity'. Social Care: Social care services help people who are in need of support due to illness, disability, old age or poverty. Social care services are available to everyone, regardless of background. However, social care is subject to rules about your needs and ability. Services can also support the families or carers of people who receive social care.

Examples of social care

Social care services could include having a personal assistant to help you around the house, structural changes to help you move around your house, or even an alarm system so that you can call for help if you have a fall.

3. Summary of the Survey Results which will guide the discussion

Support for Families to live healthy active lives in Eskdalemuir

35% of respondents wanted better access to Health and Social Care Services locally. This included better access to a local GP, Pharmacy and that the area needed to have someone or a body to coordinate the service locally.

Vital support at a time of illness

Respondents said that the household activities that they would most need support with during a period of illness were: help to clean the house, maintain the fire & wood stock, shopping and support with preparing food.

Living in Eskdalemuir into old age (pensionable age)

73% of respondents indicated that they would like to continue living in Eskdalemuir when they get older. To do this they need increased Health & Social Care Support and improved transport links. Many people said that they feared that as they get older they will be increasingly socially isolated in their own homes.

Access to Health & Social Care Services

66% of respondents said that there is good access to Health care but many had little knowledge of Social Care Services.

Access to Information about what is available

40% of respondents indicate that they do not have access to the information they need to make informed decisions about Health & Social Care Services.

4. Group Discussions

Participants were split into to 3 groups to think about the 3 main themes of the survey, these were:

- 1. What support do individuals and families need to live in Eskdalmuir;
- 2. Access to Health and Social Care services;
- 3. Access to Information about services.

Each group was given 15-20mins to look at their question and to consider the issues and possible community and statutory sector solutions. The groups then moved to the next question until each group had looked and comment on all three questions.

1. What support do individuals and families need to live in Eskdalmuir?
