The History Group began the year with a guest speaker. Tessa Smallbone, a Holocaust Ambassador, told us of the Nazi attempt to exterminate the Jews and others during World War Two and reminded us that similar killings have taken place since. She took us on a photo-tour which revealed her own emotions when she visited the Auschwitz camps. She concluded by highlighting the methods used to isolate a minority before demonising and then persecuting its members: a process still sadly in evidence today. We then heard of a local resident who was rescued from the Nazis on the last of the Kinder-transport. To discover how it all began - come to our February

meeting where John Puzey will tell us about the Wannsee Conference.

Tony Ingram's theme for his presentation was 'American Composers', his first pieces were Aaron Copland's well known "Fanfare for the Common Man" then his "Clarinet Concerto" this was followed by a selection from "West Side story" by Leonard Bernstein. Next was a jazz piece by Miles Davies entitled "Blue in Green" and Paul Simon singing "Graceland". Charles Ives' "Central Park in the Dark" was an atmospheric composition with layers of orchestral textures and John Adam's "The Chairman's Dances" certainly extended our musical knowledge



too, the finale was Jessye Norman singing one of Richard Strauss's "Four Last Songs". Our next meeting on 26th February will be preceded by our annual lunch at "The Bear Hotel, the presenter will be Lin Randall.

Milosophy Philosophy
The question Peter Tugwell The question for January 's meeting was 'How should a liberal representative

democracy deal with the rights of minorities?'. We took the explicit and implicit assumptions in the question as 'given' and went straight to looking at the sorts of minorities that might have rights issues, and the vocabulary needed to examine these topical areas in political philosophy. 'citizenship-as-rights', identity politics', 'cultural pluralism', 'politics of Redistribution', 'politics of Recognition' were just some of the terms we looked at, and as for minorities, we looked at ethnocultural groups, national minorities, groups based on gender, sexual orientation, disability and age. Liberalism seemed prepared to accommodate the individual and his/her claim to rights, but in the form of a 'liberal democracy' with the goal of 'nation-building' there was often a tension which left claims unresolved at the group level. Our discussion included two areas where such tension is evident - the core curriculum in schools (the right to education is not a right to a particular education) and language (where a particular language is not the language of the social and political institutions of the state). If the goal of the liberal democracy is a common national identity including the laudable aims of equal opportunity and unity, then that goal should be realisable without causing injustice to recognition- seeking minorities. The topic for February's meeting is: 'Kantian Ethics', in the new format of a five-minute member presentation followed by general discussion.

Old Wives Tales Book group 2 read 'The Taxidermist's Daughter' by Kate Mosse. a Gothic tale which doesn't quite work. The number of characters, their relationships with each other & frequent scene changes interfere with the flow of story. The point of the story is gradually revealed through events which trigger the gradual return of

her childhood memory. It just seems a rather clunking way to proceed with the plot. Some of us found the graphic descriptions of taxidermy rather disturbing.
