




Our first meeting of this year was hosted by Tony Ingram whose rousing programme was entitled "Midlands Connections", all the composers having some connection with this area. The pieces included Gustav Holst's "Mars the bringer of war" from his Planets Suite, George Butterworth's "The Banks of Green Willow", and his "Shropshire Lad", Vaughan Williams's "The Lark Ascending" & "Fantasia on a theme by Thomas Tallis", two choral pieces - "I Was Glad" by Hubert Parry & the Hilliard Ensemble with "Parce mihi domini", it was altogether a lovely programme to start the year.

Our next meeting is on 27th February, after our lunch at The Bear Hotel when Lin Randall will present her programme.

Peter Tugwell Philosophy

For our first meeting of 2019 we had a philosophy quiz. It consisted of about 4 or 5 questions on each of the 11 topics we had considered and discussed at our monthly meetings in 2018. So, it was rather like a recap on what we had actually done, and we were all pleasantly surprised at the wide range of subjects we had covered during that year. This meant that we had questions involving the philosophies of the mind and education, political philosophy, epistemology, ethics and aesthetics, as well as some important aspects of philosophical discourse and the views of several 19th and 20th Century philosophers. But significantly when the occasion demanded, we had moved out of the arguably comfort zone of theoretical philosophy into the (also arguably) more demanding area of applied philosophy.



The number of questions to get through in the time available meant that we had to canter rather than trot, and some found that this emphasised the key points under each topic, with those key points facilitating greater recall,


rather like a mnemonic. It also threw up issues we hadn't considered at the time, showing that we haven't yet exhausted the realm of philosophy.

So, did Ockham's Razor have anything to do with the paradox of the barber who shaves everybody in town except those who shave themselves? [Who shaves the barber?] Or does 'Modernity' clash with a Schopenhauerian view of the 'Will', and does the 'Principle of Sufficient Reason' clash with the 'Principle of Contradiction'? Well, while these were among the answers, the questions were more causally connected to the answers than in the forgoing clauses. It was perhaps rather like the Caucus Race in Alice in Wonderland, so there were no winners, except that everyone was a winner - but there were no prizes, just the experience of bathing in the warm glow of epistemological and ontological satisfaction, helped by the usual tea and biscuits.

Our topic for February is: Karl Popper (1902-1994).

Today saw us convene at our newly designated "poets' corner" otherwise known as Malt Mill Lane CommunityCentre. And well it turned out too. So with what wordly gems did we regale each other?

Our subject was 'the sea' which produced many old and loved friends of earlier learning. John Masefield's's 'Sea Fever' and 'Cargoes' were obvious choices; Tennyson's 'The Kraken', 'The Lotus Eaters' and 'Crossing The Bar' were also recalled. Sir Edward Lear's 'The Owl and The Pussy Cat' soon followed and was of course also cheerfully enjoyed. Longfellow and Emily Dickenson reminded us of America's

tradition and were suitably joined by Spike Milligan and Psalm 104 - the muse has no bounds! Lesser known poets in the shape of Ernestine Northover, David Weevil (beware of sharks but soak up the lyricism), Barry Cornwall with appropriately 'The Sea' and an astonishing piece using the channel tunnel in ways unheard of by Patience Agbabi, a British poet, born in London to Nigerian parents in 1965. 'Dover Beach' through which Matthew Arnold shared his honeymoon thoughts and the magical work of the Greek poet Cavafy's 'Ithica' sped us along but we could not finish other than with Robert Louis Stevenson's 'Requiem' (home is the sailor, home from the sea) and Thomson's Rule Brittania which we sang to finish off a most enjoyable afternoon.

Our next meeting is at 2.00 pm on Friday 22nd February (continuing at Malt Mill Lane naturally) when the subject will be 'Rings'


