

A superb 15<sup>th</sup> century memorial brass to Sir Thomas Lestraunge (1426) beneath the carpet in the chancel was revealed by our guide, Michael, who spoke eloquently about the church, greatly enhancing our visit.

Incidentally, the local U3A make good use of the church for their meetings. Lunch was enjoyed next door at "The King's Head".

Last month we showed a film about the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World. The oldest of these was the Great Pyramid of Giza, built about 4500 years ago, and still surviving to this day. It remained the tallest man-made structure in the world for 3,800 years. All the other six have long since disappeared, but all seven were very large structures representing incredible feats of engineering and building. The most practical of them was the youngest, the Pharos (lighthouse) at Alexandria, built in the 3<sup>rd</sup> century BC. It survived until destroyed by earthquakes in the 14<sup>th</sup> century AD.
