Looking at Churches

For our 2018 finale we visited St Laurence's in Bidford on Avon, the 13th century Parish Church. Mr Chris Horn the church warden made us very welcome on a bright September morning and outlined the principal features of this fine, but much altered building. The Victorians, and before them, the Georgians, had stripped away almost all the earlier features of the church, leaving a large rather soul less edifice (although they may have rescued it from dereliction). We learned that a superb collection of seventeenth century silver donated by Lady Dudley, has to be kept in the bank, but otherwise the church is rather a disappointment. Large but empty. It has to be kept locked and therefore there was evidence of only three visitors in the last two years, and the dwindling



congregation of only two dozen or so ageing folk now struggle to keep the church alive. They have however very shrewdly managed to off load responsibility for the upkeep of their very large churchyard ((closed to all burials now)onto the district council. Lunch was enjoyed at "The Bulls Head" to conclude our season

Garden Lovers



Janet Allely After a slight confusion with the parking meter at Warwick Racecourse we met with our guide at the Hillclose Reception. Our guide took us in and out of the 16 various victorian pleasure gardens. Most gardens had brick built summerhouses which have been carefully restored, and heritage vegetables and fruit trees (which have been labelled). Our excellent guide informed us of the history of the various families who had owned and used the gardens which are on a slope overlooking Warwick Racecourse. At other times of year there are over 100 varieties of snowdrops and C19 daffodils and the victorian style glasshouse has plants for sale. Volunteers help to care for the gardens and provide tea and cakes for visitors taking the tour.

History

In September John Ruffell gave us a great presentation on the history of Galloway, incorporating much general history of Scotland. Galloway's Neolithic people built intricate tombs over 5000 years ago. In the first millennium BCE the Iron Age Celts arrived, fierce opponents of the Romans who never managed to settle here. The first king of a Scottish nation was Kenneth McAlpin, crowned on the famous Stone of Scone *(illustrated)* in 843. Later, John Balliol and his wife were local Galloway nobles who were buried in New Abbey Village. Their son John, a rival to Robert Bruce, was appointed King of Scotland by Edward I of England. John Balliol failed to pay due homage to Edward, so Edward invaded, seizing local Caelaverock Castle. James IV was the most



popular king after Robert Bruce, but he was killed by the English at the battle of Flodden. However, his great grandson James VI also became King James I of England when Queen Elizabeth died in 1603. The two countries united in 1707.

John also included his trademark brilliant photos of historic New Abbey Corn Mill, Caelaverock Castle and Loch Doon, and beautiful shots of historic Galloway gardens.

Our next talk is on the history of maps.

We all found this month's book - 'Arctic Summer' by Damon Galgut - very interesting. It is a fictionalised account of E.M. Forster's visits to India and Egypt, based on his own diaries and writings. The book takes its title from an unfinished Forster novel, written between the publication of 'Howard's End' and' A passage to India'. The Galgut book explores Forster's difficulties with long-term relationships, especially with his Indian friend Masood, and a bus conductor, Mohammed, in Alexandria. Though it was sometimes difficult to distinguish between the voices of Forster and Galgut, the book is a well-written story of a lonely, frustrated man.

Music Appreciation

Pam Gough brought us beautifully into Autumn with her lovely Autumn themed programme. The first piece was Vivaldi's "Autumn Concerto No. 3", then Alexander Glazunov's "The Seasons of Autumn Bacchanale", Brahm's Clarinet Quintet, Mendelssohn's "Songs without Words" & Tchaikovsky's "Children's Song, Autumn". After our tea break we heard "The Seasons Autumn Song" also by Tchaikovsky, Auguste Franck's "Symphony in D minor, the rousing overture from "Tannhauser" by Wagner & finally Cecile Louise Chaminade's "Automne".

On 31st October John Ruffell is presenting another on screen concert, with a Spanish flavour this time, by The Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra, everybody is welcome.
