

After a coffee stop in Tewkesbury (*Abbey Mill pictured*), we continued along the narrow lanes to Gloucester for a generous 2-hour stop for lunch and the sights, taking in the cathedral and the docks, then onward to Chepstow, passing the NT Dutch Water Garden at Westbury-on-Severn (definitely on our calendar for a visit).



When the Estuary and its 2 suspension bridges came into sight, the coach driver navigated a narrow lane to Beachley for us to appreciate the awe-inspiring engineering of the Severn Bridge and impressed us all with his reversing ability to get us back out!

Brian was full of historical nuggets: Nelson rested the fleet at Chepstow, conveniently close to Emma Hamilton at Monmouth; Oak from the Forest of Dean was used to build many of the boats that fought the Spanish Armada.

Finally we drove over the Severn Bridge for our return on the motorway to Alcester at the end of a fantastic day which included bonus sightings of peregrine falcon, dolphin and seal for some. Full marks to Joe.

Our April topic was the Lunar Society, a group of quite remarkable men philosophers, inventors, scientists - who used to meet at each other's homes in or near Birmingham, to discuss and exchange ideas on many different subjects. The Society was at its height in the 1770's and 1780's, and their ideas contributed enormously to the progress of the Industrial Revolution. The Society got its name because members used to meet once a month on the Sunday or Monday closest to the full moon - for the very practical reason that, with more light for the journey home, there was less chance of being mugged!

There were never more than about 14 members of the Lunar Society at any one time, but ten of them became Fellows of the Royal Society. Perhaps the five most famous names were Matthew Boulton (industrial entrepreneur), Erasmus Darwin (physician and evolution scientist), James Watt (steam power pioneer), Josiah Wedgwood (pottery manufacturer and designer), and Joseph Priestley (scientist

#### and theologian).
