

BENJAMIN MOLE

Benjamin Mole is not on the Combrook War Memorial or the Roll of Honour in the church. He is, however, on the Combrook and Lighthorne Schools Rolls of Honour.

He is also on the Coventry Roll of Honour.

He was born in Stoneleigh, Coventry in 1886 and baptised there, aged two years, on 7th October 1888, son of Isabella and Henry Mole (shepherd).

He is in the 1891 census in Combrook but no address is given.

At the time of the 1901 census he was on the "lion" 1 St Training Ship at St Germans, Devonport as a boy under training.

In the 1911 census he is recorded in Bombay with the 1st Royal Warks Regiment with the rank of corporal. He was single and aged 25.

He was killed in action on 10th December 1914 in France and Flanders, aged 29 years. His next of kin are recorded as Henry and Isabell Mole of Charlecote, Warwick. He is commemorated at the Prowse Point Military Cemetery.

He was awarded the British War medal, the Victory medal and the 1914 star, with clasp, 2/2609, qualifying date 8th November 1914.
