

FRANK STANLEY

Frank was born in Banbury in about 1888.

As there is no record of the Stanley family in Combrook in the 1891 or 1901 censuses and Frank is not on Combrook School Roll of Honour, they probably didn't come to Combrook until Frank was above school age.

In the 1911 census he is recorded as living at 41 Combrook with his parents John and Jane Stanley. He was aged 23, single and working as a garden labourer. His father was a joiner (journeyman).

There are two other, younger, siblings living at home.

He enlisted at Banbury as a private in the Durham Light Infantry, formerly the 24/277 Oxon and Bucks Light Infantry.

He was killed by a shell on the night of March 25th, 1918, aged 30 years. He is commemorated at the Pozieres memorial, panel 68-72.

His next of kin was his mother, Mrs. Jane Stanley of 41 Combrook. There is a notice of his death in the Stratford Herald.

He was awarded the British war medal and the Victory medal.
