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# KK's collaborative models.....

KK's default position is to think collaboratively. Whether that be in education where it sets up village women's and men's committees to run the schools, in its microcredit schemes where it engages groups of village women to oversee its micro-credit work or

in its work on health and civil rights. In this Newsletter, we highlight how KK is taking that approach in developing its long -held interest in mental health. Support for women and children coping with mental illness or distress has been limited thus far (as in many parts of the world) even though some estimates put the incidence of anxiety and

depression among women in northwest Pakistan as three to four times that among men. Members may recall that Dr Shakil Malik from Sussex was our guest speaker at the 2014 AGM when he spoke on this subject.

KK has now been awarded a grant from Norwegian Church Aid to continue the work of the NGO Friends of the MIND (which has recently come under KKs umbrella) in community-based rehabilitation including where genderbased violence is involved

We are also pleased to report that KK has recently been funded by the J A Clark Charitable Trust to do some collaborative work with Afghanaid, а highly respected Afghanistan NGO. They will be sharing their expertise with each other, thus enabling each organisation to develop as well as exploring areas for future Watch co-operation. this space!

# FROK members visit Khwendo Kor

Thanks to the tenacity of the Khwendo Kor staff Del and Maureen Hussain were given Notice of Consent by the authorities in March to visit the Trade Facilitation and Communication Centre, and the Peshawar Regional Office in Peshawar and also a school in the town of Mardan. Maureen writes:

'You will have heard from the news that this is a very troubled area but we found a very warm welcome and every effort made to ensure our comfort and safety. We really had a great time and packed a lot into our 3 days.

At the trade centre we saw many items which had been made by women in local areas, some very distant. The women are given micro credit to finance their enterprise and helped to market their goods. As well as baskets I now have some beautiful scarves for sale which were made in the troubled area of Swat.

The Peshawar Regional Office now manages two new major projects for KK which are located in this regional office. KK is the implementing partner for the National Aids Control Program in this area since April 2015. They provide appropriate community and home based care. They are proactive in offering target groups (e.g. injecting drug users, sex workers, transgender, migrants) voluntary counselling testing. It was a very moving experience to see this centre working and to meet some of the clients.

In the same building we saw the new Community Mental Health Care Centre which is funded by Norwegian Church Aid in Pakistan and implemented by KK. *Contd p4* 

#### OBITUARY

Simon Gillett 24.09.1938 - 04.02.2016

Simon was FROK's first chair, President and, in many ways, originator. He met Maryam Bibi while working for the UN in NW Pakistan and recognised her outstanding abilities. When Maryam came to study at York, he introduced her to his friend, Ian Sinclair, and relative, Caroline Pym of the Clark family trust. FROK was the brainchild of Maryam, Elma and Ian Sinclair and Simon attended its launch as its official head and his support never wavered.

Simon's long career overseas included public service in the Sudan, Tanzania, Nigeria, Pakistan, Botswana, St Helena, Nairu and Ascension Island. High intelligence and transparent integrity enabled him to grasp the essence of challenges, grounded in conversations with those whom his projects were designed to help. Simon was kind and loyal to the causes and people in whom he believed. His contribution to FROK was immense and he will be greatly missed. A fuller obituary is available on the FROK website. Uzair, a child in Mirmakhel camp, is paralysed in both legs. His parents could afford neither medication nor a wheelchair for him. KK identified him at a KK Mobile Health camp, provided free medication and also successfully found local donors to provide a wheel chair. Uzair is now both healthier and more independent.

# Mental health matters-KK's work gets underway

Khwendo Kor is bringing its rightsbased and community development approach to helping people cope with a range of mental health

challenges including psychosis, anxiety, depression and traumarelated issues. As well as providing services through a community mental health centre in Peshawar, it has provided free psychiatric health camps with the help of mental health rehabilitation committees that it has set up. These committees, comprising women and men, receive training from KK and are already identifying and referring those that might benefit from professional help as well as helping develop local intervention strategies. Support for family members is an integral part of the services.

A series of booklets have been developed using both pictures (aimed at local communities) and written explanations (aimed at local committee members). They cover common mental disorders and symptoms, psychological problems and coping mechanisms, and types of treatment and support available. Messages about

<sup>'</sup>mental health, genderbased violence and coping mechanisms' have been transmitted through Radio Pakistan.

As always KK is seeking to bring its own values to this work by trying to address the needs of females and poorer people in particular. In doing so it is developing models that work in their particular environment rather than simply transporting ones from elsewhere.

During an awareness-raising session, one family member said that when their loved one was in 'high spirit' and threatening others or, afterwards, sitting quietly in a corner, the villagers believed it was due to possession by evil spirits. The family had tried a faith healer and doctors but there was no improvement until the community activist suggested KK's camp.

#### Children's Parliaments come to Karak!

KK works in close coordination with the Government Education Department not only at policy level but also at school level. Recently it has formed children's parliaments at 20 government primary schools in district Karak with the aim of improving governance and encouraging a sense of responsibility among children. These parliaments have already arranged several successful events with parents taking a keen interest. The KK team are now expanding the scheme to other areas.

KK is trusted at community level and hence is seen as a good vehicle to implement these projects. They have strong teams of highly qualified, gifted and caring staff working with some of the most disadvantaged and needy people.

Our visit to the school in Mardan was a joy. A local young couple have donated 2 rooms in their own house to be used as classrooms for the very young girls of the brick workers in the town. The young mother of the house is one of the two teachers. The children were in uniform, very clean and very eager to show what they had learned in English as well as Pashtun. Clearly the teachers had been well trained and were using modern teaching methods.

On our way back to Islamabad we visited the centre at Mathra which we helped to open three years ago. The craft centre there is dedicated to Elma Sinclair and we were pleased to see it growing in staff and clients. They also have two school rooms for girls and hope to have more soon. They have opened a health centre—the Zonash and Farhan Community Health Centre—with a very dedicated doctor. Mathra is a very conservative area so it is really good news that the new KK staff member responsible for all training is based there and has been able to make very positive contact with the local community and has begun to get them involved in the projects.

Khwendo Kor has an amazing group of women and men who work in very difficult and dangerous situations. They believe that the only way to peace and prosperity is to build a compassionate society where women and men live with dignity and self- reliance'.
