Alton Art Society—children's results


The Alton Art Society's annual art exhibition children's section attracted a host of interesting entries—here is the full list of those selected for praise by the judges.

Tremendous reception for Art Society's exhibition

The committee members of the Alton Arts Society professed themselves thrilled after receiving glowing feedback from a steady stream of visitors to their 65th annual exhibition, held at the Assembly Rooms.

There was very much a pastoral feel to this year's exhibition, with a number of pleasing and well-executed landscapes and seascapes. Cornwall proved a popular inspiration, both for Best Exhibit winner Peter Forey and Veronica Blake, who captured a wild and elemental Cornish Shore, while Liz Relfe had travelled further and risen early for a captivating Morning at Flatford Mill in elegiac, hazy light.

Toni Goffe entered some enchanting vignettes of

Mallorca and Venice exerted a magnetic pull on many artists, to rewarding effect. Geoffrey Ainley was one, yet his visions of Alton were equally impressive.

Still out of doors, Dorothy Dean's climb up the Welsh hills was well worthwhile as it resulted in the rich blue and green tones of Llanthony Valley, while Alan Roe's The Opportunist trod a rural beat to fox his victims. The same artist drew us inside with his warming Firelight and Sheila Edwards kept the visitor welcome there with her symphony of reds, mauves, purples and violets in Seated Woman.

With sculptures selling well and a lovely display of miniatures of local scenes, it truly was an exhibition for all tastes.
