Dear Friends.

I have greatly enjoyed the privilege of serving as a Locum Minister at Stamperland during these past three and a half years. I had just finished a similar appointment at Broomhill Church, found that experience rewarding and helpful, and was happy to fill the same duties at Stamperland.

I am fortunate to still be enjoying good health and after the busy life of being a parish minister, might well have been wondering what to do with my time.

You, the members of Stamperland Parish Church, have helped me to adjust to part-time service. I realised immediately that I was amidst a very friendly, caring and supportive congregation led by capable and committed office-bearers.

Particular tribute should be paid to the Interim Moderator. The Rev. Gray Fletcher, and to your Session Clerk, Norrie Bolton, Gray Fletcher, in addition to his work at Carmunnock Parish Church, has chaired regular meetings of the Kirk Session, and numerous other meetings which have enabled the congregation to move on to a new chapter in its history, linking with Netherlee in 2018. Norrie Bolton has spent many hours, quietly and conscientiously fulfilling his duties as Session Clerk—duties which are bound to have increased during the vacancy.

Now the congregation can look ahead expectantly to the new ministry of the Rev. Scott Blythe. The overwhelming vote of support and confidence which he received from Stamperland and Netherlee members after he preached as Sole Nominee will be a great encouragement to him.

Sharing a minister with a neighbouring congregation is a relatively new experience for the churches in the greater Glasgow area. This experience may become the norm for most Church of Scotland congregations. This new arrangement will inevitably involve adjustment and change, but I am sure you will be sensitive to any changes and the extra responsibility placed on Scott Blythe as the minister of two linked congregations.

Scott Blythe comes with his own God given abilities and gifts. He won't just step into George Mackay's shoes or Jack Drummond's shoes. He brings his own shoes with him!

Thank you for these past three and half years of friendship and fellowship together, much appreciated by myself and Barbara, who is heavily involved each Sunday in the life of Croftfoot Parish Church.





As we strive to maintain the church in a proper state of repair a busy month has produced the following results.

The external brickwork which was giving some concern had now been fully restored to almost its original state. At the same time the emergency exit door was replaced complete with new hardware. A nice new coat of paint completed the task.

New lighting was fitted at the entrance to the halls, with similar unit to be sited at back donor. Both in the interests of safety and security. Painting of the ceilings in the halls will be completed by the time we go to press. We employed the same decorator as we had for the refurbishment of the manse

On the subject of the manse, we have been advised by our letting agents that they have a new tenant due to take up residence prior to the end of the month.

New LED lighting similar to the installation in the church has been commissioned and is being fitted to both halls to replace the existing fluorescent tubes. This will increase the visibility and is also environmentally friendly and cost saving to run.

Some small repairs to the woodwork in the kitchen area is ongoing and will be complete by month end.

We are due to have a 5 yearly inspection of our electrical installation, this has been organised and will take place shortly.

The property committee are in the process of preparing a schedule of various projects for next year to keep us wind and watertight .

Looking Backwards

By the time Scott Blythe becomes our new minister on 30th November we will have been vacant for almost three and three quarter years. During any vacancy or extended period of uncertainty there is a risk that a church will suffer decline with falling attendance, members drifting away and church finances deteriorating. Throughout our long vacancy we have been very fortunate in having Jack Drummond as our Locum Minister and Gray Fletcher as our Interim Moderator. During this time both ministers, along with the congregation and Kirk Session, worked hard to ensure we thrived and maintained a positive, forward-looking attitude. As a congregation we have many people to thank.

Jack Drummond

I know that many of our congregation wish that Jack could stay on and be our minister for ever.

Jack's style and manner is closely aligned with many members' idea of the ideal minister and his conduct of worship felt very appropriate to Stamperland. Whilst some might say that Jack offers a very traditional style of worship the subject matter has always been relevant, up-to-date and topical. Throughout his time as Locum, we have been introduced to many new hymns and hymn tunes. So, a traditional minister, perhaps, but not at all old-fashioned or stuck in the past. Jack's language is simple and straightforward – not flowery and not complicated. As a result, his message is always clear and inspirational. The ease with which ideas are communicated in prayers and sermons is, almost certainly, the result of lengthy and careful preparation.

Jack enjoyed a great rapport with the children in Stepping Stones. All of us in the congregation enjoyed his interaction with Stepping Stones particularly, initially, with Sophie Brown and, more recently, with Scott.

Jack is interested in and cares for people. Within weeks of coming to Stamperland, Jack knew the names of most of the congregation. Throughout his time as Locum he has been assiduous in visiting members and parishioners both in their own homes and in hospital. Everyone experienced great support and encouragement from his visits.

Right from the start Jack engaged fully with the life of our congregation – he was never just the "Sunday Locum". He attended Guild meetings; he supported the youth organisations; he worked with Open Door; he established the monthly service at Clarkston Care home; he was, along with Tom Nelson, chaplain to Netherlee Primary School. Jack attended most of our Kirk Ses-

Gardens and so and so on. These events often saw him accompanied by a family member or members. As well as developing a friendship with Jack we were fortunate in getting to know Barbara, his wife. Barbara played piano or organ on many of the occasions when our organist was on holiday.

Jack never took all of his holiday entitlement. In his time as Locum he never had a single day of illness. Knowing that if Jack didn't turn up for a service I would have to step in, I was always relieved to see his little green car parked close to the church. Jack did say that he thought that the little green car would last him throughout his time at Stamperland. Being here somewhat longer than probably at first envisaged, he now drives a newer car - a little blue one this time.

Jack Drummond really has kept our church going over the past three and three quarter years. He has won a place in the hearts of many and we trust that he will think well of us as he moves on to fresh pastures and new challenges.

We wish Jack and Barbara a long and happy retirement.

Gray Fletcher

Gray Fletcher has been our Interim Moderator since March 2014. As Interim Moderator, Gray's focus was more on the administrative rather than the spiritual aspects of church life and much of his involvement will have gone unseen by the majority of members. By the time of Scott's induction, Gray will have moderated more than 40 meetings of Stamperland Kirk Session, 10 meetings held jointly with Netherlee Kirk Session and three Congregational Stated Annual Meetings. Most Kirk Session meetings were preceded by a meeting with either members of the Session Business Committee or the Session Clerk.

Gray has also chaired at least three major meetings of the congregation and conducted five Communion services. In addition, Gray attended a considerable number of meetings with Presbytery officials, with the minister and Session Clerk of Netherlee and with the Nominating Committee of Stamperland and Netherlee as well as meetings associated with our own Local Church Review (LCR) and with the LCR follow-up. All of this activity was undertaken in parallel with his primary role as minister of Carmunnock Parish Church!

As Interim Moderator, Gray led us through testing times both in dealing with presbytery and in unifying diverging views regarding our future within the session and congregation. Gray brought a wealth of relevant experience and insight to the situation and guided us calmly and wisely through the many complex processes which led, ultimately, to the election of Scott as our new minister. We have much for which to thank Gray.

Tom Nelson

Ever since its establishment in 1940 Stamperland Church has enjoyed a close—link with Netherlee Church. In recent times, when Presbytery were seeking a new, close, formal linkage between our two churches, the attitude of the minister at Netherlee was always going to be crucial. Knowing Tom it was entirely in his character to set aside any personal preferences and look for and work towards the outcome which would best suit both churches. Most recently, the gracious decision of Tom and Catherine Nelson to move out of their manse in Ormonde Avenue well before Tom's retirement to enable Scott and Liz Blythe avoid a double house move within just a few months, has been very much appreciated.

Looking Forwards

The Service of Induction for Scott Blythe takes place on Thursday, 30th November at 7.00 pm. This service will be followed by a less formal event in which presentations will be made to Gray Fletcher and Jack Drummond and at which we will learn a little bit about Scott from one of his friends, Rev Alan Watt.

We don't know a great deal about Scott other than that he spent most of the last ten years as a pastor in the Presbyterian Church of North America. Prior to moving to America, Scott served as a detective with the Metropolitan Police, as a university chaplain in Aberdeen and as a Church of Scotland minister in Edinburgh. He comes, therefore, with a broad range of experience.

We do know, however, that Scott and his wife, Liz, are really very excited about their future in Scotland and about Scott's ministry in Stamperland and Netherlee. It is a huge, life-changing decision for Scott and his family to relocate from America to be with us. When they arrive in Scotland, the Blythe family will move into 25 Ormonde Avenue – the former Netherlee Manse.

Initially, Scott will be our minister at Stamperland. When Tom Nelson retires next summer, Scott will become the minister of the linked churches of Netherlee and Stamperland. Before then, we hope that we will have recruited someone to assist Scott. Under the Presbytery Plan Netherlee and Stamperland should have a resource of "1.5 full-time equivalent ministers". So one of the first tasks will be to start the process of finding and recruiting "a 0.5 fte minister".

Last month I wrote the following: 'How the future unfolds is largely in our own hands. If Stamperland Church has regular attendances at Sunday services of well over a hundred people and is financially sound then there will be no doubt about our continued future. On the other hand, if only a small number of people were to attend worship on a regular basis and the finances were in a bad way, I'm sure that you can imagine what the future would have to be. The arrival of a new minister always provides the opportunity for fresh starts. If you haven't been coming to church as much as you once did, then the arrival of Scott is an ideal opportunity to make a change. A change for good. A change to ensure your church's long term future.'

Going forwards, our future is up to YOU.
