^{3.} Minister's Message



I am a typical man in that I love to watch football when it is on the television. This comes from growing up with my dad who was a very good football player himself. In fact, he used to play for Muirend's team for several years and I believe he won a few trophies with them.

However, I was enjoying some of the FA Cup matches put on by the BBC. I love cup-ties as they are a one-off match, and anything can happen. In the UK there is this great tradition of 'giant-killing' in the FA Cup. For those of you who do not like anything to do with football, this refers to a lower division club taking on one of the top clubs and playing well enough to win against them. This weekend I was cheering when little Rochdale Town scored a goal against the mighty Tottenham Hotspur.

I was thinking about this tradition of cheering for those who are the underdog and how it is we love an upset from the normal pattern of the mighty winning over the weak. I was thinking about this desire for the smallest to win over the mightiest and I was drawn to thinking about Jesus. The whole gospel is born out of God's constant choosing for the smallest and the underdog.

Time and time again, Jesus would seek out those who were the genuine 'underdogs' of the time. They included children, women, lepers, those possessed of demons and generally many others who society had little regard for. Constantly, Jesus would go to these people and in the process of hearing their story, Jesus would affirm their worth, and in many cases, would bring healing and show the wider world that they need not fear these 'underdogs'.

In the modern church there has been a growing emphasis on churches seeking ways to support those who might be modern day 'underdogs'. This new approach of seeking to uphold the weak is called a 'missional' approach to mission. It has proven effective as a new means for the church to find a new connection to those within their communities who are in need.

So, who are the 'underdogs' in Stamperland?

Could it be our job to support these underdogs by ourselves or in partnership with some others?

These are questions for us to think about in the months ahead. I would love to have any conversations with anyone who might have some ideas. But, for now, let's see how much we can support the 'underdogs' in our own way!





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

We started off with repairs to the manse roof to stop ingress of water to the upper room. This was followed during the year by repairs to the back door, painting of several rooms, and clearing out of odds and ends left by outgoing tenants. Following several



The Church received similar attention, annual services to the central heating boilers and some remedial repairs were carried out.

At the request of all who were involved in kitchen duties to make life easier, a commercial dishwasher was purchased and installed and has been in constant use since. Some remedial joinery work was also carried out in the kitchen area at the same time.

After suffering many years of issues with the strip lights in the ceiling of the Church a decision was made to replace them all with LED lights, this has proved to be so successful we repeated the process in both the large and small halls.

In the interests of security and health and safety, CCTV cameras were fitted to both the front and back doors and lighting at these doors was updated with LED lights.

Because external brickwork above the emergency exit of the Church leading out to Clarkston Road was giving cause for concern, professional advice was sought following which we were advised it was basically a cosmetic issue.

This work was carried out and at the same time the doors were replaced, following years of patch and mend, and are now fitted and painted.

With the arrival of our new minister a modern sign was created and is proudly displayed on the wall, which replaces the wooden one, the content of which was obsolete.

We are now in the planning stages for this years programme of repairs and upgrades.

New £1 million Church planned for the Island of Cumbrae

Whilst the following story is not directly related to our circumstances there are

similarities in certain quarters, but the overall project is something unique to the Church of Scotland in these otherwise difficult times. I hope you enjoy reading about their progress.

Ambitious plans to build a new £1 million church on the small island of Cumbrae off the Ayrshire coast are fast becoming a reality.

The congregation has raised around £200,000 and has secured grants to-

wards the new single story, multi-purpose building which is scheduled to open this summer.

The General Trustees of the Church of Scotland has allocated \pounds 120,000 - comprised of an interest free loan and a grant to the project, which will have capacity for 140 worshippers.

It is an exciting time for Rev Jonathan Fleming who took up his new post as minister of Cumbrae linked with Largs St John's, in October 2017.

Although the two churches are only 4.4 miles apart, he is based in Largs and has to regularly journey across the sea by ferry to tend his flock in Millport. In his own words, Mr Fleming provides a glimpse into the life of a minister responsible for a mainland and island parish.

"Excitement is growing amongst parishioners and inhabitants of Millport as they watch their new church building begin construction with a view to being completed by the summer".

The new church in Millport will be a lot more than a place of Worship. Through the hard work of Cumbrae's New Church Focus Group, their locum, Nicky Smith and their previous minister, Rev Markus Thane, who tragically passed away a couple of years ago, had the vision of Cumbrae Parish Church not being just for Sundays, is soon to be a reality.


Cumbrae Parish Church hopes that their new building will be a true gift to the community with multi-purpose space, multimedia facilities and kitchen space. A place to be used by organisations and groups from across the island.

Rev Fleming currently leads worship in one of the two congregations each Sunday with a pulpit supply rota arranged to cover the vacant pulpit. Hopefully the 0.5 Parish Assistant post, which is soon to be re-advertised, will bring to

the Ayrshire Coast and some stability to the setup in due course. As the minister of a linkage, it is his goal to allow both congregations to maintain their own identities, while doing all they can to support each other in presence and prayer.

To allow the congregation of Cumbrae to visit friends and family on the mainland, do a 'big shop' etc, service times have to be carefully thought out for Sunday worship. There is also the added complication that attendance at worship on an island depends very much on the ability to reach the island.

When the ferry is unable to sail on a Sunday morning, especially during the winter storms, he emails his 'script' to Cumbrae's Session Clerk and members of the congregation happily get involved. He feels very blessed to be the minister of two forward-thinking congregations.

A few more visits to the island over the coming months will see progress being made from this picture from December 2017. The new church will be located in Bute Terrace beside the Primary School and can be reached by walking up Cathedral Street at the east side of the Garrison and turning left at the end of the Garrison wall on your left.

The Cathedral of the Isles, which you will pass on your right, is also worth a visit. It is open to the public every day and is reached by a set of steps leading up through a tree lined path.

Down Memory Lane 1980

In 1979 Robert Liddel, Session Clerk reported on the 40th Anniversary celebrations of our church when the service to a packed congregation was led by the Rev G M Philip, Moderator of the Glasgow Presbytery. An exhibition of photographs in the vestibule was a popular spot for many as they walked down "Memory Lane" and had many a laugh at themselves as others see us.

A surplus of £663 was revealed in the annual accounts but was mainly due to donations received. The giving's to Stamperland Church were reported to be by the few and not the many, resulting in an average donation of 28p per member. An increase of 37o/o was unrealistic so £1000 was being transferred from funds, a 20o/o increase sought and a special appeal was planned.

A quote from a former Minister's letter of 1962 was given ;

" It is the weekly offering that counts. What we must do if Christ's cause is to prosper in our midst is take our Christian responsibility of regular giving seriously ".

We sometimes believe that everyone was very serious in Church life in the past but a report by John Buchanan who was Clerk to the Board, was in the form of a letter, an extract of which follows;

"Dear Friend, Just a note to remind you of the Annual General Meeting on 19th March in the Church with the Minister in the chair. I have read the minutes which are rather boring, but after that the new Treasurer will make his report. (John is a wizard with figures, and never takes very long) and then the Session Clerk will give a review of the year. It's amazing what Bob can rake up. Of course everyone gets a chance to speak, so why not come along and shake them up?"

Age Concern Eastwood were planning a Coffee Morning in the Church and tickets, priced 25p and 15p could be purchased from Mrs French or Mr & Mrs J Dodds.

The BB Junior Section announced plans for their annual day trip in May and this was to be to Millport, as reported by R Kirkwood. (As part organiser of this event that year I can confirm that it poured all day, but the Royal George Hotel gave us the use of a room to keep dry, and it didn't stop us from returning there the following year and every year since, to the present day—Ed).

The other organisations reported on past and future events of Haggis Nights, Jumble Sales, Songs of Praise evening service, Displays, Taking promises, dressing up, results from selling Christmas cards, and Scout Job Week and Gang Show, whilst the Ranger unit had to cancel visits due to poor weather.

SAFEGUARDING

We were probably all surprised and disappointed to hear recently of sex scandals associated with the charity sector. These have been widely publicised in the media and commented on by many in public life. Unfortunately, the actions of the few taint the public's perception of the whole organisation or sector. It would be a real tragedy if wrongdoing on the part of a few people resulted in large-scale boycotts of certain charities and the curtailment of their vital, valuable, life-saving work.

It seems almost inevitable that in every walk of life there is a small minority of people who will carry out reprehensible actions and activities. Such behaviour is wrong and criminal; and the wrongdoing can be compounded when the organisation seeks or acts to cover it up. To their shame, churches have not been immune from scandals and from attempts to disown responsibility.

The Church of Scotland has long sought to ensure that it "practices what it preaches". It has developed procedures to try to ensure that churches offer a safe, secure and supportive environment for all and that the protection of vulnerable people, in particular, from all types of harm is given appropriate attention.

There is a team of ten full time staff working in the Church of Scotland's Safeguarding Service.

In our church we have a trained Safeguarding Co-ordinator – Mrs Margot Young.

In our church the leaders in all of the youth organisations have to undergo Disclosure Scotland checks to ensure that there have been no incidents in their life history to suggest that they might pose a risk to those in their charge.

In our church many of the elders have attended training or awareness courses.

But, importantly, in our church, we rely on everybody to look out for signs which may indicate a person is being abused or harmed or there are behaviours which give cause for concern. If you see something which gives you cause for concern, if you think something looks, sounds or feels wrong then do something about it. If it is a serious incident of physical harm or sexual abuse and someone is in imminent danger you should contact the police immediately. For other cases it is appropriate to speak with the minister or Margot Young and entrust them to take the correct action.

Ensuring a safe church and a safe community is not the responsibility of "them"; it is the responsibility of each one of us.

As 27th March is Holy Week there will be no formal Guild meeting but we would encourage Guild members to join the congregation at the Holy Week Services.


The Friendship Meetings will be held on the last Tuesday of each month from April to August and notification of the programme will be advised separately.


