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Minister's Message



Well, friends, despite the seeming unending nature of our snow showers, we are not far away from Easter already. The winter will recede, and we are already moving into the days of longer light and hopefully fairer days.

Easter is undoubtedly the central week of our faith. In this confrontational week between Jesus and the Pharisees a great deal happens. That is why it is good that we have the chance within our community to reflect on each day as it comes. One of the things I find very difficult with Easter so often is the tendency to rush to the end of the story and not to spend time reflecting upon the way. One of the best examples that I found of this within the US was the tendency of some churches to arrange 'Easter Egg Hunts' on Easter Saturday.

Holy Week is an important week for all of us – and yes so are the 'Easter Egg Hunts' in case you think I am some kind of horror!!!! However, each day is important and is significant. Easter Saturday is a day that I have strong memories of from my time working on Iona. Saturday's were normally a very busy day for me. In my first job as Office Manager, I had the job along with my driver to get everyone's cases to the jetty for their departure and then to pick everyone up again. So, by the end of that day, we were usually pretty tired!

However, during Easter the guests stayed through until Easter Monday and so the Saturday felt strange and unusual to me on that day – all the normal rhythms were out of shape as it were. In that moment, I suddenly realised that this must have been the feeling of the disciples and the followers of Jesus. That Saturday must have been a day of shock as all that was familiar to them had been seemingly irrevocably changed!

Therefore, how much joy do you think they must have felt that first Easter Morning after those feelings?

If we take each day in Holy Week as it comes, we have the chance to gain such insights together. I am looking forward to sharing with you in our evening services as we move through Holy Week. However, I am also aware that the working life now and other family commitments place great demands on many of us and that some of you will not be able to make all evenings. Therefore, on Palm Sunday we will be reading first about the Triumphal Entry but after this we will spend time reading through the Passion Narrative. I do this friends in order that all who attend worship weekly have the chance to contemplate Christ's death before we move to the joy and wonder of Easter morning.

Jumping the Queue

Today, a true tale of heroism that takes place not in a war zone, nor a hospital, but in Victoria station in London in 2007, during a tube strike. The bus finally pulls up, and Edwards hears a shout from the front of the line. It's the elderly woman, addressing him: "Young man! Do you want to go in front of me?"

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Down Memory Lane 1981

In the Session Clerk's report of March 1981 when writing of the 41st anniversary of Stamperland Church, it is interesting to note yet another example of what was said in the past having some meaning a further 37 years in the future; The report read that as the Church gathered together to give thanks to God for everyone who had helped to establish a Church at the corner of Stamperland Gardens and Clarkston Rd they had been handed a heritage which would depend on you and me what becomes of it. Do we let it slip through our fingers or do we accept the challenge and build on the foundation which has been provided for us.

The congregation of the day also welcomed back Rev Archie Chisholm and his family for that special occasion. Again, 37 years later Rev Chisholm has recently written to us saying he is happy to read this magazine "on line" in future so continuing a connection with Stamperland.

Bob Liddel went on to report on that same service of the attendance and the playing of the BB Pipe Band after an absence and during the service Christine Liddel was presented with her Queen's Guide badge by Commissioner Irene Docherty and Andrew McIlwraith was presented with his Chief Scout's badge by Chief Commissioner of Scouts, Douglas Rae.

Bob concluded by saying that these young people had shown with dedication and skill and the help of others, the targets that could be reached. He was positive that if everyone else showed the same resoluteness they would be able to overcome the problems which beset Stamperland Church at that time.

On the other hand things happening then, still occur today. The Christian Aid Art Exhibition had just concluded, rubbish had been cleared out of the premises by the Fabric Committee, the Scouts had a Coffee evening, 6 Beavers had joined the Cub Pack, Andrew Blandford, Barrie Consadine, Fraser Cochrane, Michael Wilson, Ian Hallahan, and Andrew Wilson, meanwhile the Stated Annual Meeting had just taken place. The BB boys had just been awarded Drill and Safety Badges; S King, G King, C Smith, G Kirkwood, D Wood, G Thomson,, M Reid, A Finlay, I Malloch, R Izatt, S Mcleod, D Anderson, S Mair, C Campbell, D McIntosh. In safety there was C Campbell, D Anderson, L Irvine, D McIntosh, G King, C McKenzie, G Thomson, S Hill, E Osterberg, A Finlay, G Kirkwood, S King, D Probert, M Fairweather, and S Croll.

The Guild had a Daffodil Tea, and AGM, the Brownies and Guides were promoting and receiving 15 Brownies, and the Treasurer had requested a capacity audience for the Stated Annual Meeting where a formidable budget figure of £27,750 was ahead, with a proposal for a 20o/o rise in giving's, as it was realised the faithful few were the backbone of the Church and were carrying the rest. Repairs were overdue, and Deeds of Covenant were not successful. So here you have it. March 1981!!!

PEWS



Pews only started to appear in Scottish Churches around the time of the reformation. Before then congregations would stand, often for lengthy periods. The expression "weakest to the wall" is attributed to the least able being allowed to lean against a wall or pillar when in church. The form of pew would vary and often reflected the social standing of those attending church. The very wealthy could have a whole gallery with its own staircase and private entrance. Well-off members could have box pews which formed an enclosure a

bit like a small room and might even have a coal fire! More commonly, families would rent a pew or section of a pew. Many churches still have a brass fitting at the end of a pew which has space for a card bearing the name of the family who paid to sit in that particular section. Free seating was provided for "the poor"; their seats generally had a poor view of the pulpit or were in a corner under a gallery or were particularly cold and draughty and certainly wouldn't have had a cushion. Fortunately, pew rent is long gone. Everyone is welcome to sit anywhere.

However, it seems that many are reluctant to occupy "the best seats" – those which give a good view of the chancel and pulpit; those which are warmest; those with the best acoustics.

In our church the coldest seats are at the back and the sides of the sanctuary. Cold air flows down from the clerestory windows and the air temperature around these seats can be five or even ten degrees colder than those in the middle of the sanctuary.

The view of the screen from many of the seats in the side sections is interrupted by at least one lamp fitting.

Seats towards the back of the sanctuary are furthest from the minister, the Bible reader and the loudspeakers. Those of the congregation seated nearest the back wall and the side walls hear not only the sound which comes directly from the loudspeakers but, also, sound reflected from the hard brick surface. This echo effect makes it harder to hear clearly what is being said.

So why do so many of us choose the "bad seats"? Some observers believe that there is a reluctance to "be seen" by others; a desire not to be considered ostentatious or presumptuous; that deep-down there is a belief that they

are not good enough to deserve a good seat.

The pew in which Kay and I usually sit is near the back. We initially chose to sit in that area so my wife could easily slip out to attend to our son when he was in the crèche and then it just became a habit to sit there. Most of us do sit in the same pew Sunday after Sunday. We have become creatures of habit.

How about giving yourself an upgrade? Moving from the cold to the warm seat from an area of poor sound quality to audio heaven; from a restricted view seat to the best in house? How about trying a different location? Getting a new perspective? Perhaps sadly, plenty of good seats are available.

Hearing Loop

Our sanctuary is fitted with a hearing loop. This provides an electro-magnetic signal which can be picked up by (most) hearing aids. Many hearing aids have a two position switch – M and T. M stands for microphone and is the usual position. It allows the hearing aid to pick up sound just like a microphone and amplify it. The T stands for “Telecoil” and with the switch in this position the hearing aid picks up a radio broadcast signal rather than the surrounding sound. Some hearing aids offer a third switch option, “MT”, in which both sound and radio signals are picked up.



Tests have indicated that the hearing loop appears to be working and is providing coverage in all areas within the sanctuary (and quite a bit beyond). However, there are some adjustments which can be made to the radio signal. If you are experiencing any difficulty with the hearing loop system please speak to Norrie Bolton and he can try to adjust the broadcast signal to see whether it can be improved.

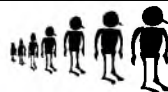

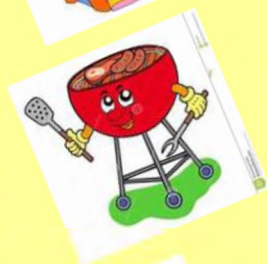
