Session Clerk's Jottings

Just now I'm staring at a blank computer screen with absolutely no idea in my head about what I should write for this edition of Focus. In a bid to find some inspiration I looked at some of the previous articles I've written for Focus – but to no good effect. I know Fraser has set aside one page of the magazine for my article and I shouldn't let him down at the last minute. It isn't that there is nothing at all to mention; just that much of what has happened recently in relation to the church isn't particularly interesting.

You probably don't want to hear about the dishwasher problems. Rather than being good at cleaning mugs and so on, our new dishwasher became expert at producing soapy bubbles – millions and millions of them pouring out of the unit and into the kitchen. A dishwasher technician had to be called in and he diagnosed that the rinse pump was broken. The pump has been replaced and, hopefully, the machine will now produce only gleaming, clean dishes. It was just rather unfortunate that the breakdown occurred one week after the guarantee period expired.

You probably don't want to know that we recently bought a new portable digital projector to replace the one that "went missing" or that we also had to purchase several different types of cable to connect laptop and projector and sound system. But, if you've carried on reading this article you now know about the projector and the associated cables.

I doubt if you are terribly interested to know that later this afternoon I will have to gather a whole load of church documents in preparation for taking them to Glasgow Presbytery tomorrow morning to be "inspected". The documents include Communion Roll, Baptismal Register, Kirk Session Minutes, documents showing we adhere to PVG policies and guidance, that we are maintaining our buildings and that they are safe and properly insured, etc.. The inspection takes place every year and is meant to ensure that "church administration" is properly carried out by each congregation.

A week or so ago I had to complete a survey relating to the number of people normally in attendance at Sunday morning services and give an estimate of the numbers, broken down by age and sex. I think I responded by saying, "approximately 80 and around half of them."

Also, in relation to factual information I was recently asked how many adults can be seated in the pews. Thanks to Margo Neilson's swift check I can report that the number is 564.



The annual reminders to Leaders of Organisations that they should have their applications in for Halls Lets for Session 1979/80 by 27th May.

In the Sunday School report David McLean advised that the new seat was to hand for placement in the church grounds where the current notice board now stands, for passers-by in the summer months. (regrettably this seat had to be removed later when youths were gathering around and on it, causing upset to neighbouring households.) Best laid plans!!

Christian Aid Sponsored Walk realised £900 despite April showers on the day.

The Organisations in our Church who raised funds for the Age Concern Eastwood Minibus appeal were thanked for their efforts in collecting £297, this being the highest amount from any of the other participating organisations in the district. Further events for this worthwhile cause consisted of a Coffee Morning, Gala Day, Autumn Fayre and a Flag Day.

A shortage of money had caused much needed repairs in the halls being temporarily shelved and an appeal was launched to raise £1500 amounting to £2 extra per member.

Nancy Fisher reported that The Ranger Guides along with the Brownies and Guides attended the Gang Show in which Marina Martin was taking part. This was followed by a singing and dancing routine for patients in Mearnskirk hospital organised by Anne Bruce. Plans were underway for a for a weekend with the handicapped Rangers from Paisley in the Brownie House in Peebleshire.

Meanwhile Jeanette Nisbet reported that 24 girls from both Brownie Packs spent a few days Pack Holiday at St Andrews Church Hall, Leven and concluded with a campfire and marshmallow toasting in the Silverburn Estate nearby.

Jack Fraser reported that the Church gardens were about to receive attention from Colin Turnbull, whilst David Guild would be preparing the mower for another busy season and as always volunteers were sought to augment their tasks, which would be rewarded with Mrs Steen's brew at the compulsory interval.

Treasurer's Report

The Stated Annual Meeting of Stamperland Parish Church took place on Sunday 18th March after morning worship. A summary of our finances was presented with full details being given in the Annual Report, copies of which are available in the Church vestibule. The following is a brief summary of our financial position.

In 2017 the Church's income totalled £95,781. Of this amount, £57,096 was in the form of offerings with £2,651 resulting from fund raising activities, a decrease of £800 on the previous year. £13,074 came from the use of our premises by non-church organisations, much the same as last year's figure. Those organisations which kindly contributed to our running costs were as follows: The Guild £450, Guides £178, Scouts £325 and BB Company and Junior sections together £200. Tax claimed on offerings donated through Gift Aid amounted to £10,643. It is thanks to those who "Gift Aid" their donations that we are able to claim this substantial amount from the Government at no cost to ourselves. During the year we were fortunate to receive a generous donation of £3,000 from one of our members and also legacy of £500.

Over the year our total expenditure was £89,606. £48,321 of this sum was our contribution to the National Ministry and Mission Fund. This includes our contribution to our minister's stipend and to the wider work of the Church of Scotland. We also paid £2,455 to Glasgow Presbytery. We have no control over these items of expenditure which represent over half of our income.

In 2017 expenditure associated with fabric amounted to £10,889. The main item of expenditure was replacing the strip lights in the Church and both halls with LED lights, the total cost of which amounted to £4,344. The emergency door at the fire escape exit in the Church was replaced at a cost of £991 and a commercial dishwasher was purchased costing £922. £1,203 was spent on the repair and maintenance of the gas central heating boilers. A one-off expense was the purchase of a printer and photocopier which is more efficient than the old one; the cost of this was £2,820. Our heating and lighting costs were £5,346 coming in at £500 less than last year. We had vacancy expenses during the year of £3,810. These included costs associated with advertising in Life and Work, our minister's air fares, costs of furniture removal and insurance and disturbance allowance. All of these costs were shared equally with Netherlee Church.

We are fortunate to have a healthy amount of funds in the bank - a total of £127,528 together with investments valued at £4,320. In addition, the General Trustees in Edinburgh hold funds of £14,448 on our behalf; these repre-

Thanks are due to everyone for their efforts in supporting our Church throughout the year in their donations of regular offerings and to those who assist and support fund raising activities, the final outcome being that we ended the year with a surplus of £6,175. Many thanks also to Anne MacKenzie and Norman Walker for their work in relation to Freewill Offering and tax recovery through Gift Aid.


Guild Summer Evening Outing
