Our Minister's Message Reverend Scott Blythe

A New Year brings with it many opportunities and challenges. The traditions we have around the New Year in Scotland are plentiful – from New Year resolutions to events such as first-footing and the fire-whirling that happens in Stonehaven in Aberdeen. In all of these events we are conscious of the importance of the year that is ahead; and we want this year to be one that fulfils potential and hopes that we might have as the year begins.

In the Christian Calendar, our New Year coincides with the celebration of Epiphany. Epiphany is the feast that celebrates the visiting of the Magi to Mary, Joseph and Jesus. It's the date in which the Orthodox Churches celebrate as Christmas. However, epiphany means more simply 'a revealing' and it signifies Jesus coming clearly into the world.

In the Christian Calendar, we find ourselves focusing on passages that happen in the early part of Jesus' ministry. We find ourselves reading about the baptism of Jesus by John and about Jesus' early actions in ministry. In doing so we see the first emergences of Jesus into the public realm of Palestine. Jesus' coming sees the waning of John's influence and ministry and his steady development and early teaching.

This early emergence creates a number of responses. In some cases, there is great excitement in what Jesus says and people are amazed at his healings and wisdom; in others, there are some who are threatened by what he says and the first resistance to his teaching begins to arise.

New beginnings, like any New Year, are never neutral in life. They often present similar reactions to those that we witness in Jesus' early ministry. Inevitably, with every change in life, there are some who see new possibilities as exciting opportunities and others who see threats to existing comfortable realities. The challenge amidst this mixture of reaction is to find ways forward together in which those who are excited might find ways to support those who are uncertain.

The best way for us to achieve this good common reaction, is to recognise the God who is forever present in every moment and who at the same time is both ancient and unchanging, yet equally new and emergent. If we can hold onto the fact that this paradox of reaction is mirrored in the being of God, we might find a way forward together. Let's try and spend some time finding both the old and the new in the months ahead.

My father was a Church of Scotland minister. In common with most of his colleagues, my dad had a dread of Stated Annual Meetings (SAMs). Years ago SAMs used to be well-attended. At a SAM members could make comments or raise "difficult" questions; there was always the possibility of criticism and blame for something which the minister either had done or hadn't done. Nowadays SAMs are generally poorly attended and contributions from the floor are generally few and far between. I'm not encouraging members to be more critical or vociferous at SAMs. Rather I'm highlighting that, these days, many people are reluctant to express their views in public. As churches we are keen to know what people think and we endeavour to provide opportunities for members to make (polite) comment.

Those who attended church on 27th January will know that both congregations were asked whether they were content with the new service times, the format of worship and had ideas for further change. If you were absent from church that Sunday you can still express your views – write to either Stuart Buchanan or myself or speak to Scott. We are interested in hearing the views of everyone in relation not just to Sunday service times but to all aspects of church life. Your views and ideas for the way ahead are important.

We are in the process of "discerning our future". At the end of last year members of both churches had the opportunity to contribute to sessions during which we looked at significant periods, endeavours and events in our churches' lives. Since then the strategy group have reviewed the contributions seeking to identify characteristics associated with either success or failure and evaluating what our particular strengths and weaknesses appear to be.

The next stage of the process is to listen to the views of people not just within our church community but also within our parishes in a bid to learn more fully about the needs, challenges and ambitions of the people living in Netherlee and Stamperland. Scott will meet local police, community doctors and nurses, school teachers, councillors, etc. to elicit their views. "Listening Post" events will take place in our churches to give each church member, each church organisation and each organisation who use our church premises an opportunity to express an opinion. At the end of the listening phase we can then analyse what we have heard during our consultations and identify areas on which we can focus our efforts over the next few years so that our churches become ever more relevant to the lives of those in our community.

We seek your involvement in this discernment process. Look out for the "Listening Post" events and either try to attend or submit ideas in writing so that your views, experience and insight can be used to determine how our churches can grow and thrive and support those in greatest need within our communities.

Eco Congregation - Netherlee





Before Christmas I attended two workshops at Renfield St. Stephens. These were organised by Eco-Congregation Scotland. In the morning we considered "Love Food - Hate waste" This workshop looked at how much food is wasted, what the dates on food packages mean, what temperatures should our fridges and freezers be running at, what to do with leftovers. Much of the workshop was interactive and I came away much more confident about dealing with leftovers safely. One of the suggestions was to plan meals before going shopping. This seems to affect how much we buy and reduces waste quite dramatically.

Your fridge should be running at less than 5°C and your freezer -18°C. The date that is critical is the use by date. If you freeze food once it is defrosted its shelf life is normal. Make sure all defrosted food is thoroughly thawed before cooking.

In the afternoon we were looking at textiles and clothes. "Love your Clothes"

- learn how to make the most of your clothes
- save money and space
- keep your clothes for longer

One of the exercises was to ask ourselves how often we wear an item. The challenge is to go through your wardrobe and hang everything in the same direction. As you wear it and return it to the wardrobe turn the hanger the other way round. At the end of a year anything still hanging in the original way should go! My daughter does a similar exercise with me and it is a challenge. There are some items that I like so I make a point of wearing to justify their place in the wardrobe.

One of the ways to keep clothes for longer is to care for them as described on the label. I struggled with some of the label symbols for types of drycleaning etc. The workshop also suggested that lots of washing tends to wear the fabric more rapidly. If you want to keep clothes for longer try wearing things more often between washes. One Lent I limited my wardrobe to five items, Underwear, sports kit and coats etc. were not included. I managed with two pairs of trousers, two shirts and one dress. It was challenging and my husband did comment that I may be saving on the items in the wardrobe the washing machine was working hard. By choosing my limited wardrobe I was looking for items that had not come from a sweatshop. I was also looking for natural fibres. It is not easy. I did manage for the 40 days of Lent and it felt fine - I knew what I was wearing everyday for that time, I also recognised that I could and I did reduce my wardrobe considerably but over time the wardrobe has filled up again. Time for another Lent exercise?

Mearnskirk Hospital Memories Margaret Armstrong

Mearnskirk Hospital was located in open countryside and opened as a children's TB hospital in 1930. It subsequently became a general hospital and at its peak had more than 500 beds.

Services led by churches were begun in 1933 by the then minister of Newton Mearns Parish Church along with Mr James Rodger of Maple Evangelical Church.





Stamperland Church's involvement with the hospital began in 1958 when 2 members of the congregation joined in the services, then the church became more fully involved in 1960 conducting short services in a number of wards every Sunday.

Mr Rodger continued as leader for 40 years until just before his death in 1975 when Mr Alex Muirhead of Victoria Hall succeeded him as leader until

he retired in 1981. At that time the late Jack Fraser of Stamperland took over as leader.

Many local churches readily joined the rota over the years to regularly lead services Sunday by Sunday, some also being similarly involved at the Victoria Infirmary. Several churches such as Clarkston Baptist, Greenview Church, Kings Park Baptist, Newlands South, Newton Mearns, Victoria Hall, Maxwell





Mearns, Mearns Parish, Giffnock Park and Crosshill Queens Park played their part but later dropped out.

The hospital closed in the 1980's with the exception of two wings at Mearnskirk House which continued as a long term care unit. Services though never ceased and continued at PTO

Mearnskirk House up to the present day, Sadly this facility is due to close shortly and so all the church's involvement will now cease.

Congregations involved up to the closure were from Greenbank, Busby, Cartsbridge, Giffnock South, Williamwood, Mearnskirk, Netherlee, Broom and Stamperland.

A huge thank you to all those who have participated over the years bringing God's message to the patients. You, the Sunday singers and musicians, may have been the only visitors that some patients may have had. Thank you again.

Netherlee Treasurer's Report for the 11 Months to 30th November 2018

The previous report for the 8 months to the end of August reported a Surplus of £12,526. At that time it was felt that as the year progressed, the surplus would decline with an increase in R & M expenditure, and that there would be a reduction in the positive variance against Heat and Light. In fact the Surplus has continued to grow in the last 3 months and at the end of November it is £15,622.

On the Income side the positive variance is £6,590 of which £3,658 is under the Use of Premises. By the end of the year this positive variance from lets will be, circa, £4,500. Last year our income from lets was £14,802 and by the end of this year our income is likely to have doubled to nearly £30,000. The increase has mainly stemmed from the new tenant, Clarkston after School Care. The balance (£2,905) of the Surplus under Income came from Giving's and Donations. The budget forecast a decline in this income of £3,045 which thankfully has not materialised.

On the expenditure side the positive variance at the end of November is £6,130, an increase since August of £496. The 2 main headings showing positive variances are R & M and Heat & Light. Although the level of expenditure under R & M has increased in the last 3 months it was still below budget. As a result the Surplus under this heading has increased by £561 to stand at, £5,163. Against last year a saving of £5,000 has been made. The variance reported at the end of August under Heat and Light of £1,625 has, contrary to expectations, grown further to £1,688. This winter has not brought, as yet, a prolonged cold spell.

In summary our finances remain strong. The Annual Accounts are now expected to report a Surplus of circa, £16,000. This will help to offset the £28,000 we have spent from our Reserves this year, for the refurbishment of the lanterns in the Church and the final payment in respect of the halls refurbishment.

After a last-minute cancellation, Dr Sheena Wurtherman kindly addressed the Forum on the topic of biodiversity for gardeners. Sheena gave us some wonderful advice on what we can do to promote biodiversity in our own gardens. Her message was that gardens are habitats that we must preserve for the benefits of the birds and the insects that rely on them. We need not compromise how our gardens look: even small changes can make a big difference.

Sheena gave us some practical advice on what we can do to promote biodiversity. She advised us to plant good pollinators that help bees and other insects thrive, and to avoid the use of insecticides that harm them. She also recommended creating a pond, or even turning a bog garden into a feature by planting forget-me-nots, grasses, ferns and lilies. Leaving a pile of deadwood might look unsightly, but it is vital for biodiversity as insects and fungi feed on the remaining nutrients. Allowing a patch of grass to grow longer lets wildflowers grow, much to the delight of butterflies. Planting bluebells and foxgloves under trees and shrubs replicates the dappled edge of a forest, encouraging birds and small mammals to roam free. Ensuring that birds have a variety of food does them the world of good—a bird can only eat so many peanuts! This was just some of the advice that Sheena gave, which helped to demystify the term "biodiversity".

Sheena also explained how important it is to protect mature trees in the neighbourhood. Not only do they sustain birds and insects, they also give children endless opportunities for endless play and support good mental health among us all. It just goes to show that biodiversity is beneficial for humans as well as animals and insects. Sheena gave a very instructive talk at very short notice, for which we are all very grateful.

Dr Valerie Wright addressed the Forum on Monday 21st January 2019 on the topic of Red Clydeside. We meet at 7.30pm in the Lesser Sanctuary of Netherlee Church. Everyone is welcome.
