

Our Minister's Message Reverend Scott Blythe



It feels really late in the year to be still approaching Easter. As I write this article, we are just approaching only the third week in the Season of Lent. We still have another few weeks to go before we embark on the important pilgrimage of Holy Week. That week in which we see the culmination of Jesus' ministry on earth.

Yet, in some ways, this chance to be still waiting and anticipating is worth its own reflection. I don't know about the rest of you, but I often find it difficult to be in the moment in which I find myself. So, often my mind is taken up with events that are coming up and I tend to think about both the past and the future more than I think about the day in which I find myself.

As I was thinking about it I realised that this tendency to not be fully aware of where we are and what is going on right now is something that I need to challenge. For after all, every day that we receive is a gift from God. It is given to us in love and with care and joy by God. Our not realising this and making the most of each day as it comes is something to try and stop.

Don't get me wrong - I can naturally understand anticipating events such as holidays or birthdays or big events like Christmas, Easter or Anniversaries. However, if we spend too much of our time focusing on the other, we can often fail to see what is right in front of our face. In doing that, we can fail to see important things, important blessings that God bestows upon us.

So, before we rush ahead to the celebration of Easter, let's give thanks for the time to wait. Let's try and slow ourselves down and instead of racing ahead and beyond Easter day, let us take the chance to reflect on the remaining days of Lent.

Is there something that God is trying to get through to us? Should we be spending a little more time in prayer, in reading scripture?

Before we rush from Palm Sunday until Easter Day, let us think about the whole of Holy Week and maybe each day read through the encounters Jesus undergoes in those days as Easter nears. Let us hear again what lessons the confrontations and the changes of fate that happen in that eventful week.

For if we really take the time to dwell in these events, we will come to a greater joy and wonder when the wondrous events of Easter unfold.

Give it a go, and if you struggle to do these things alone, don't forget that we are joining with our friends from the Clarkston Churches Together each

night through Holy Week. Maybe taking the chance to share in these services will allow you to walk more steadily to the Easter that approaches.

James Findlay Nelson Trust Fund (part 2) Catherine Nelson

Many of the young people who have received grants from the Trust Fund have described their experiences as "life-changing". The following are extracts from letters and reports received from just a few of the recipients of the Trust, and I include them for your encouragement.

Visit to Bloemfontein, South Africa by Adam Robinson (Lancaster)

"Thank you for the contribution you made towards my trip to South Africa this year. Without your support the opportunity to work in Bloemfontein with the most wonderful people would never have happened.

In South Africa, we spent time with a number of charities who help and support the impoverished people of Bloemfontein in a number of ways.....children's clubs where they have the opportunity to play sports and interact in other activities and receive food; supporting those with HIV, AIDS and TB, or building shacks for those in need. Working with these people and seeing the impact they made on the lives of others was a particular highlight for me. Being able to see God at work in a place where there are so many struggles was incredible and strengthened my own faith in His works. We also visited a Children's Hospice and a food bank for the homeless.

Overall, the trip was an incredible experience which will stay with me for life. I would like to thank you all for your support in making this dream a reality, and ask God's blessing on all you do in the future."

Visit to Uganda by Katie Dunn (Giffnock)

"I spent my five weeks in Uganda on a building project that aims to give more children in the area a secondary education. Getting my hands dirty and physical labour was one of the most rewarding acts I could have done over there. Spending hours on site with the locals was always enjoyable. Initially, they highlighted our differences: our skin; lifestyle and status. As the weeks went by, they realised we were the same, as our skin got browner and they got to know us better. My eleven teammates were the most inspiring, joyful and ambitious group of teenagers you will ever meet. The bond that I have formed with them is incredible and I know that they will be life-long friends.

Words cannot express my gratitude to each and every one of you. I can only thank you for allowing me to embark on a life-changing experience that has completely transformed my outlook on life and has made me a better person. I want to thank you for allowing me to grow and make a little difference to the world. I hope you know that this is the best possible thing I could have done this summer and I would not be the individual I am now without your generosity and prayers. From the bottom of my heart, Thank you."

Postgraduate course in Augmented Communications by Sarah Wadsworth (Larkhall)

"That's me done!! Or really, that's us done. I couldn't have done this without the support of James' Trust. At the start of the course, I chose to purchase a fairly expensive book and statistical software to help me get through the class, and for this I used James' money, which I had set aside for one-off purchases. Then something very unexpected happened. This class no longer felt like just my class, as it was James' money helping me get through it. I couldn't have passed it without that software or course book. God used James' money to give me the tools to pass this class. I nearly gave up several times, but whilst praying about it, James came into my mind. The grade I achieved was because of him.

I am now looking for a Speech and Language Therapy job, preferably with adults with learning disabilities. I will continue my work with Prospects and I am quite sure God will put into action some of what I have learned through my dissertation."

The Netherlee Forum

How do you move 4000 people to a small space safely and in good humour where some of the crowd are in opposition to the rest? This is the role of a Football Security Officer.

William McDougall had a successful career with Strathclyde Police and at Tulliallan Police College. On retirement he was invited to be Football Security Adviser to the Scottish Football Association and UEFA. Mr McDougall gave us insights to the issues and how to deal with them. Many of the Scottish fans are in the Scottish Travel Club (1500 normally travel with the Club). The Travel Club are happy to share with the police the travel arrangements and to co-operate with local operations. 1996 Scotland qualified for UEFA in England. In preparation for the games SFA worked on developing an atmosphere of good conduct. The motto was "We are the best supporters" This was backed with information and a gift - A "Hey Jimmy" badge!

When the fans travel abroad it is important to checkout the venues and the local facilities and plans for crowd management. Preparation for an international competition will start at least a year ahead. This allows for relationships to develop and provides opportunities to share intelligence about issues with fans and travel plans. Watching Mr McDougall telling us about this work it is clear that he not only has the ability to work in this field but also has the personality that would work well in these circumstances.

With experience with the fans the information provided has also developed. The fans are provided with an information pack that includes routes to the game from travel centres, local places to eat and watch the match outside the ground. This pack also includes phrase book lists, emergency service provision - hospital, police, embassy contact details. All this to encourage the idea that they are "... the best supporters".

The hooligans are managed using intelligence. One group were coming to Bordeaux from Spain. This knowledge was used to divert the coach from approaching the ground and ensuring that they saw the match in a separate ground and then dispatched back to Spain at the end of the match.

Currently the big issues are sectarianism and racism. This is being addressed by the Scottish Government, UEFA and the SFA. A school pack has been developed but this is only the beginning.

Crowd management of large numbers of people into a small space for a short time of high spirits and then safely dispersed at the end is a skill. The preferred outcome is happy fans, players and local community. Willie McDougall illustrated these skills with great aplomb and good sense of humour.



The boys have also been participating in a variety of District and Battalion events. We also sent two teams to the district collage competition at Moncrieff Parish Church where we narrowly lost out to 4th East Kilbride, whose boys benefited from leaders with an artistic flair not matched by our own! Our Noah's Ark collages can, nonetheless, be viewed in the large hall.

I am concerned...

Not about the future of Stamperland Church. Not about the future of the Church of Scotland. I am concerned about the future of Christianity!

Stamperland is the fourth church I have attended since I was a boy of ten – the other three have all gone – closed down and demolished. This may sound sad, and for me it is, but this is only part of the picture. Where I grew up in the south side of Glasgow there were eight churches within walking distance, and all that remains now is the ruins of the Greek Thomson church building, and one small new church.

I have been on holiday to the same area of another country for about 30 years and in the churches I have attended, there has been about 40% drop in attendance.

No doubt there are many contributory factors and you will have your own thoughts on the subject, however the stand-out factor for me is COMMUNICATION.

I can still vividly remember my first attendance at a meeting of Glasgow Presbytery many years ago, there was a reserved front pew for the PRESS – it was full, and I mean shoulder to shoulder with no gaps. At present and for a long time I have never heard or read any reports of Presbytery business, or initiative or desire for public communication.

More important is how do we communicate with THE PUBLIC? We (the church) used to have some lines of communication via three of the most important times in a person's life – birth, marriage and death.

<u>Baptism</u> – we sure made a mess of that. I still find it hard to believe that an assembly of Clergy and committed Christians could be persuaded to prefer human logic to the teaching of Jesus.

Oh and what kind of Christians are we to adopt a policy of 'Members Only' on anything?

<u>Marriage</u> – A church wedding is wonderfully atmospheric and picturesque. Why then has it become almost a rare event? I have not done any research but I would guess that it is in part due to people presuming it is a service for members only, and being totally unaware of it being a 'parish service'. Should people in the parish be better informed in this regard?

<u>Funeral</u> –Five of the last six funerals I attended recently have all been conducted by a Humanist. I ask myself are they so much better than the clergy? I say absolutely not! Again I would suggest there is a breakdown in **PTO**

communication between the church and the people of the parish. However, we have to be aware of the possible workload this would place on the minister. In the past funerals have been the subject of discussion at Presbytery, because in some areas the minister could barely cope with the numbers requesting this service.

As I have taken the liberty of getting this off my chest you might expect me to have some answers. Well I have no qualifications on the subject of Communication, only some random thoughts which you may, with delight, commit to your shredder.

I have not seen an Extra newspaper recently but I can remember churches having individual adverts. Well how about Clarkston Churches Together taking a single block advert with each church, on a rota, filling the allotted space with a Christian message by way of a story, quotation, picture etc.. There would also be an acknowledgement of the churches supporting the advert.

The west wall of Stamperland Church faces onto a busy main road. Most days hundreds of people pass by on public transport in both directions. Should we attempt to communicate a Christian message with some form of Wayside Pulpit?

A church notice board close to the pavement offers a lot of potential communication if the notices are brief and large print to catch the eye of a passer-by. Church events are an obvious use, but what about the Sunday service as a coming event? What about the title of next sermon, first line of hymns, special prayers, etc..

What are your random thoughts?



Stamperland Church Finance





The Stated Annual Meeting of Stamperland Parish Church took place on Sunday 19th March after morning worship. A summary of our finances was presented with full details being given in the Annual Report, copies of which are available in the Church vestibule. The following is a brief summary of our financial position.

In 2018 the Church's income totalled £95,814. Of this amount £54,433 was in the form of offerings with £2138 contributed by fund raising activities. £13,481 came from the use of our premises by non-church organisations, a valuable source of income. Those organisations which kindly contributed to our running costs were as follows: The Guild £450, Guides £257, Scouts £325 and BB Company and Junior sections together £300. Tax claimed on offerings donated through Gift Aid amounted to £10,326. It is thanks to those who "Gift Aid" their donations that we are able to claim this substantial amount from the Government at no cost to ourselves.

Over the year our total expenditure was £92,847, an increase of £3,000 from the previous year. £51,652 of this sum was our contribution to the National Ministry and Mission Fund. This includes our contribution to our minister's stipend and to the wider work of the Church of Scotland. We also paid £2,714 to Glasgow Presbytery. We have no control over these items of expenditure which represent over half of our income.

In 2018 expenditure associated with fabric amounted to £13,297. The main item of expenditure was the purchase of a new projector and screen costing £10,456. The cost of replacing flooring in the lower corridors amounted to £921. Our heating and lighting cost were £4634 which was actually £700 less than last year.

Stamperland Manse is still being let and we are able to claim this income from The General Trustees in Edinburgh against fabric expenses. We were therefore able to claim back £12,034 in this way. Many of the maintenance and repair tasks, including the upkeep of the church grounds, were undertaken by volunteers and this helps to keep expenditure under control.

Since our linkage with Netherlee Church on 6th September 2018 we have been sharing ministerial costs on a 70/30 basis, Stamperland paying the lesser amount. i.e. Minister's Travel, Minister's Telephone and Internet, Manse Council Tax, Manse Fabric and Manse Insurance. Pulpit Supply is split on a 50/50 basis and costs associated with the printing and publishing of "Connections" are allocated on the number of magazines taken by each Church.

We are fortunate to have a healthy amount of funds in the bank - a total of £130,495 together with investments valued at £4,167. In addition, the **PTO**

General Trustees in Edinburgh hold £13,913 on our behalf, being the balance of the accumulated rental income from the Manse.

Thanks are due to everyone for their efforts in supporting our Church throughout the year in their donations of regular offerings and to those who organise and support fund raising activities. Many thanks also to Anne Mac-Kenzie and Norman Walker for their work in relation to Freewill Offering and tax recovery through Gift Aid.

The Netherlee Forum Kate Cuthbert



The last Forum meeting of this session took us to Greenland in the company of Dr Simon Cuthbert from the University of the West of Scotland. At first glance Greenland appears to be a harsh ice covered wasteland but there is far more to the island

Once part of a massive ice sheet that covered Canada, Russia, Scandinavia and Scotland, the remaining ice covering Greenland is several hundred metres thick and covers most of the land surface apart from a narrow coastal strip. The ice cap contains 8% of all the earth's fresh water. It is estimated that if it completely melted it would raise the global sea level by 24 feet.

Erick the Red colonised Greenland after its accidental discovery, opening the country up to Viking settlement whilst the Innuit also moved in via northern Canada. Nowadays the population is still largely made up of people from Danish or Innuit origins. In days gone by people survived by hunting whales and seals using their skins, meat and bones for clothing, food, tools, weapons and ropes. Today Greenland is largely dependent on supplies shipped in from Denmark.

Picturesque towns with colour coded buildings are concentrated largely on the west coast. The largest is only the size of a Scottish village. With less than 47 km of roads, towns are isolated from each other and journeys between them are made by coastal ships. Journeys can be dramatic as boats push through the ice flows avoiding calving glaciers and hunting whales. Tourism is becoming increasingly important with hotels, museums and galleries springing up in the larger towns. With Glasgow only a five hour flight away the world, like the icecap, is rapidly shrinking.

Budget 2019

The Budget for 2019 was presented at the SAM on Sunday 24Th March. The Budget shows that the Surplus will decline from £15,343 in 2018 to £620. The main reasons are:

Income from collections will decline by £5,202 as a result of falling membership and some members no longer paying tax and they therefore have had to leave the Gift Aid scheme we lose 25% of the members givings in these circumstances.

Repairs and Maintenance is shown to increase by £6,363. The initial budget from the Fabric committee was £15,000 but as no volunteers came forward to tend the Church gardens it is felt prudent at add a further £1,000 to cover the cost of a contractor.

Electricity we started a new electricity contract on the 1st April and from then our electricity costs will increase by 38% per year. The contract is negotiated centrally by 121 George street and when we were first advised of the increase we tried to find a cheaper price on the web As we could not find a cheaper price it was decided to stay with the new Church of Scotland contract. The Budget shows that our energy costs will increase by £1,741 in 2019.

Other Costs will be subject to inflation increases, in some cases above inflation increase will apply e.g. Cleaning costs are set to rise by some 5% as their main cost from salaries and on the 1st April the living wage increased by 4.9%. In total our Expenditure is budgeted to increase by £10,023 to £209,8355. The surplus achieved in 2018 was exceptional and not the standard.

In summary we are facing a decline in Income and an increase in Expenditure.

At the end of 2018 our General Reserve stood at only £39,770 having increased by 63% as result of the 2018 General Fund surplus. That is only less than 6 months of the Total Cost budget for 2019. Each month I process some 200 standing orders many of which have not changed in value over the last few years. I believe if we can adopt a discipline that leads all members to review their giving's annually in light of inflation that will go a long way to improve the financial base of our Church. The Church is no different from a household, in that, it faces increases year on year in its Other Costs. Your direct debits for Electricity, Gas, Telephone, TV, Council Tax, Insurance etc. inevitably rise every year. This is a better solution of small increases year on year rather than having a giving campaign every 4/5 years as it is inevitable we will be seeking a double digit increase. **The solution is in your hands.**
