By the time you read this letter, the first month of 2015 will almost be over. Many people say that each year seems to pass more quickly than the previous one, and people older than me say that this illusion continues year by year. At the age of 10, a year is one tenth of a persons total experience. Because a sixtieth or a seventieth is much less than a tenth, it's perhaps only natural that time seems to pass more rapidly, year by year.

We know all about time, that there are sixty seconds in a minute, and sixty minutes in an a hour, and yet the passage of time is a strange phenomenon. The measurement of time is the only measurement that has not been decimalised. It never will be, because the way we calculate time is not dependant on a system devised by a clever scientist or mathematician. The measurement of time ultimately depends on Almighty God, for it is based on the orbit of the moon around the earth, and the orbit of the earth around the sun. The great creator, God, who fashioned the universe, controls the passage of time, the regular change from day to night and the progression of the seasons of the year.

If we feel that time passes too quickly, or perhaps too slowly, there is nothing we can do about it. The passage of time, and our time in this world, is under the control of God. In Chapter 3 of the Old Testament book called Ecclesiastes, a wise man reflects on the mystery of time. The Good News Bible puts it this way;

"Everything that happens in this world happens at the time God chooses. He sets the time for birth and the time for death".

The author then goes on to list several other events which happen at the time of God's choice, before concluding; "He has set the right time for everything. He has given us a desire

to know the future, but never gives us the satisfaction of fully understanding what God does"

Our place in God's scheme is to make sure that we use the time

given to us in such a way that our lives reflect the love of Jesus and bring honour and glory to God. Ecclesiastes, Chapter 3, is a description of the balanced use of time. Life is not intended to be the exclusive pursuit of one activity, but a balance between a wide variety of experiences..

This year, 2015, lies unknown before us, as did 2014 at this time last year. God has fashioned life in such a way that none of us are meant to know the future. He asks us to exercise the gift of faith and to trust him for the months ahead. May we do this, and look ahead positively and enthusiastically to Church life continuing in Stamperland this year, and for the years to come.

Churches can be curious organisations. Different denominations operate in different ways with different forms of governance. Some work with parishes and presbyteries and assemblies; others with deaneries and dioceses; yet others with circuits, districts and conferences. There are ministers, priests, vicars, bishops, archbishops and cardinals. There are different rules, different regulations, different practices. It sometimes appears there is more to divide Christian churches than to unite them. And, on occasions, it can be the most minor differences which cause the maximum division.

However, at times of crisis or trouble, differences disappear. Common humanity and compassion come to the fore; the desire to provide care and support takes over and distinctions are forgotten. Witness what happened in the aftermath of the dustbin lorry tragedy in Glasgow. Ministers and priests were in attendance on the afternoon of the incident. The morning after, a service was held in St George's Tron church which was attended by people of all faiths and none. Two days later, another service was held in St Andrews RC Cathedral, again attended by people of all faiths, and none.

This edition of Focus is being published on the day Clarkston churches mark the

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity with pulpit exchanges. We may worship in different buildings and be organised in different ways but we share the same fundamental beliefs. Differences which in the past were the cause of bloodshed now seem relatively unimportant and quite inconsequential. We realise now that what is important are the basic truths. How sad, therefore, to see splits within our own Church of Scotland over the issue of ministers in a same-sex partnership. It isn't very long ago that there was huge controversy over the idea of having women elders, never mind, women ministers. Now most of us look back with some amazement that this was ever a contentious issue.

In any painting the detail can be important, but we have to stand back from the canvas to get a proper appreciation of the image the painter is portraying. In our churches we need to focus on the broader picture and not get uptight about differences in minor details and the ways in which we function. Working together we are stronger and more effective.




