#### A Message from our Locum Minister Reverend Jack Drummond



Dear Friends,

I am completing my first month as Locum Minister, and have already discovered over the Easter season that there are many willing, talented and capable people in Stamperland Church.

Now we move into May, when we think particularly about the work of Christian Aid. We are also invited to share in Christian Aid Week, either by volunteering to collect, or by making a generous donation. This year Christian Aid Week runs from 11th to 17th May.

Here is an old Sri Lankan fable which Christian Aid has used to illustrate the injustices and inequalities of life.

"Once upon a time an old man was dying, so he called his two sons and told them "I am going to leave you everything I have, but you must be sure to share it between you" In his will he left them a cow, a tree and a blanket.

The brothers decided that they should share all three. The older brother had the front half of the cow. The younger brother had the back half. The older brother had the bottom half of the tree. The younger brother had the top half. The older brother had the blanket by day and the younger brother by night!

However, things did not work out well. The older brother found he was spending all his money feeding the cow. The younger brother was getting all the milk. The older brother was putting all his effort into watering the tree. The younger brother enjoyed the fruit. The older brother spent the day washing and drying the blanket. The younger brother kept warm under it at night.

The older brother asked for a meeting and explained how unfair these arrangements were. However, the younger brother announced that he had no intention of changing anything because he was happy with the deal. So the older brother grew more and more despondent He could not see the point in feeding the cow anymore, so he stopped. The cow died. Then he could not see what use it was watering the tree, so he stopped. The tree withered. Finally he lost the will to wash the blanket. The blanket got covered in mildew and was too disgusting to use.

When the younger brother realised that he was no longer getting any milk or fruit and that he was shivering by night, he demanded to see his brother. He was furious with him for<sub>3</sub>stopping work. However, the older brother did not see it that way. He was angry with his brother for not

sharing the good things that the cow, the tree and blanket could do for them. The anger blew into a bitter quarrel. Then the brother's children and grandchildren continued the quarrel for the next hundred years"

The nations of the world have been quarrelling for much longer than a hundred years. From time to time the quarrels spill over into violence and bloodshed and war. In our quarrels and conflicts, poor people and poor nations always lose out.

Christian Aid is based on the teachings of the Bible and provides aid where it is needed to people of all religions or none. Christian Aid operates on the basis that "The world and all that is in it belong to the Lord" (Psalm 24 V 1) You and I are stewards of God's creation and we have an obligation to ensue that the resources of that world are freely shared.

Let us again this year take this obligation seriously by supporting and promoting the work of Christian Aid in a generous and sacrificial way.

Thank you for making me and my wife Barbara so welcome as I share with you in Sunday worship. May the Lord continue to bless you.



### Focus on Finance Income and Expenditure


For almost all of the last 20 years our church's annual expenditure has been greater than our annual income. If our church hadn't received a number of substantial legacies we would find ourselves in a very difficult financial position.




Because we run with a deficit, the Church of Scotland doesn't ask us to pay our full ministry costs. We are, in fact, subsidised by other churches in Scotland to the tune of about £2,000 per year. We are not paying our fair share of the costs of running our church and of the Church of Scotland.

#### How does our income compare with our neighbours?

It is interesting to compare church's income with some of our neighbours. The chart on the right shows we have the third lowest income of any of the churches in the wider Clarkston and Newton Mearns area.



The chart below shows the average income per member. We are second from bottom with an average of £220 per year per member.



However, the average income per member figure doesn't tell the whole story. Quite a lot of our income comes from sources other than our members. Last year these sources included rental paid by outside organisations (£8,468), fund raising events (£4,705) and donations (£5,423). The total given in *regular* offerings was £45,372 with a further £5,392 in open plate offerings. Income Tax recovered via Gift Aid amounted to £7,787. So, once we take account of other sources of income, our **average annual offering per member was £143.** Or expressed slightly differently, our average is **only £2.75 per member per week**.

Not all members give a regular offering. Although we had 355 members at the end of 2013 we know that quite a lot of these have not attended church for a rather long time and that quite a lot are not supporting the church financially. Unfortunately, the burden of supporting the church falls on a smaller number of faithful members than should be the case.

#### WHAT CAN WE DO?

Our church is facing challenges. We are not paying our fair share of the costs of Ministry and Mission. Compared with some of our neighbouring churches we are apparently much less generous in our support of our church. We are regularly in deficit at the end of the year.

Recently, more than 100 members completed a questionnaire entitled "Looking Forward". In responding to the question, "Would you be prepared to increase

your regular church offering by 10% to keep Stamperland Church operating as a church on its own?", 47 per cent of those who replied said they would be quite "very likely " to increase their offerings. A further 38 per cent said they would be "quite likely" to increase their offerings by 25%. In total, therefore eighty five per cent of responses, about ninety people, indicated they would be prepared to increase their offering by at least 10%. And 63 per cent indicated they would be very likely or quite likely to increase their offering by a quarter to keep the church going. These responses indicate a willingness to support the church financially. The responses are very encouraging. However, we need to ensure that this willingness is turned into action.

#### WHAT WOULD EXTRA OFFERINGS DO?

We are more than a third of the way through the year 2014. We need to start increasing our offerings NOW to get real benefit this year.

If everyone increased their offering by 10% then, in a whole year, our church would gain an extra £5,000 income. If we start increasing offerings NOW then, by the end of the year we could probably have generated enough income to avoid a deficit. We would start moving from being "Aid Receiving" and not paying our full and fair share of



Church of Scotland expenditure to being "able to stand on our own two feet".

If everyone increased their offering by 25% our church would gain an extra £12,500 income. This would really enable us to make a difference in lots of different ways. We could provide more support for the elderly in our congregation; for the youth who come around the church. We could do more for our community. We could better manage the maintenance of our church buildings and look to upgrading some of our accommodation and fittings.



Clearly not all members will be able to increase their offerings by 10% or 25%. However, if we want others to see value in our church it is important that we give offerings which show How much we value it. Our weekly or monthly offering shouldn't just be the spare change we have in our pockets or purse on a Sunday morning or the Standing Order we set up with the bank two, five, or even ten years ago.

#### WHAT SHOULD WE DO NEXT?

Try to remember when you last increased your offering. Was it at the start of this year? Or, maybe, a few years ago? Does the value

of your offering match how you value your church? Could you increase your offering? Then do it right away and don't delay. Our church really needs your support and its future really does depends on you.

#### Weekly offering envelopes

If you donate regularly each week using a pink or blue envelope all you need to do is put more money in the envelope each week. It is really that simple!

#### **Payment by Standing Order**

If you donate through regular Standing Order (usually monthly) all you need to do is tell your bank to increase the value of the Standing Order.

If you would like to start donating by Standing Order then simply ask Kay Bolton, Church Treasurer, for a form. Donating by Standing Order is simple and easy. You won't have to remember to have money available on a Sunday morning to fill your envelope. More and more members pay by Standing Order. It is convenient, easy, and helps the duty teams on a Sunday morning as they don't have to open envelopes and count money.

#### Gift Aid

If you or your partner pay any income tax at all, then the church can claim "Gift Aid". Gift Aid is a scheme which recognises the important work which charities perform. For every £1 which an individual donates to a charity, the charity can claim an additional 25 pence from the government.

So an offering of £8 per week effectively becomes an offering of £10 per week.

An offering of £500 per year gives the church an income of £625. It is basically MONEY FOR FREE! Virtually everyone should donate by Gift Aid!



To make sure your offerings are eligible for Gift Aid speak to Norman Walker and ask him for a Gift Aid Form. The only information you need to provide is your name and address - it really is as simple as that.

#### **Sharing in Prayer**

#### Mark 16: 19 & 20

#### THE RABBI'S GIFT

There is a story, perhaps a myth. Typical of mythical stories, it has many versions. Also typical, the source of the version I am about to tell is obscure. I cannot remember whether I heard it or read it, or where or when. Furthermore, I do not even know the distortions I myself have made in it. All I know for certain is that this version came to me with a title. It is called "The Rabbi's Gift."

The story concerns a monastery that had fallen upon hard times. Once a great order, as a result of waves of anti-monastic persecution in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries and the rise of secularism in the nineteenth, all its branch houses were lost and it had become decimated to the extent that there were only five monks left in the decaying mother house: the abbot and four others, all over 70 in age. Clearly it was a dying order.

In the deep woods surrounding the monastery there was a little hut that a rabbi from a nearby town occasionally used for a hermitage. Through their many years of prayer and contemplation the old monks had become a bit psychic, so they could always sense when the rabbi was in his hermitage.

"The rabbi is in the woods, the rabbi is in the woods again," they would whisper to each other. As he agonized over the imminent death of his order, it occurred to the abbot at one such time to visit the hermitage and ask the rabbi if by some possible chance he could offer any advice that might save the monastery.

The rabbi welcomed the abbot at his hut. But when the abbot explained the purpose of his visit, the rabbi could only commiserate with him.

"I know how it is," he exclaimed. "The spirit has gone out of the people. It is the same in my town. Almost no one comes to the synagogue anymore."

So the old abbot and the old rabbi wept together. Then they read parts of the Torah and quietly spoke of deep things. The time came when the abbot had to leave. They embraced each other.

"It has been a wonderful thing that we should meet after all these years," the abbot said, "but I have still failed in my purpose for coming here. Is there nothing you can tell me, no piece of advice you can give me that would help me save my dying order?"

I am sorry," the rabbi responded, "I have no advice to give. The only thing I can tell you is that the Messiah is one of you."

When the abbot returned to the monastery, his fellow monks gathered around him to ask, "Well, what did the rabbi say?"

"He couldn't help," the abbot answered. "We just wept and read the Torah together. The only thing he did say, just as I was leaving – it was something cryptic – was that the Messiah is one of us. I don't know what he meant."

#### IN PRAYER

In the days and weeks and months that followed, the old monks pondered this and wondered whether there was any possible significance to the rabbi's words. The Messiah is one of us? Could he possibly have meant one of the monks here at the monastery? If that's the case, which one? Do you suppose he meant the abbot?

Yes, if he meant anyone, he probably meant Father Abbot. He has been our leader for more than a generation. On the other hand, he might have meant Brother Thomas. Certainly Brother Thomas is a holy man. Everyone knows that Thomas is a man of light. Certainly he could not have meant Brother Elred! Elred gets crotchety at times. But come to think of it, even though he is a thorn in people's sides, when you look back on it, Elred is virtually always right. Often very right. Maybe the rabbi did mean Brother Elred. But surely not Brother Phillip. Phillip is so passive, a real nobody. But then, almost mysteriously, he has a gift for somehow always being there when you need him. He just magically appears by your side. Maybe Phillip is the Messiah. Of course, the rabbi didn't mean me. He couldn't possibly have meant me. I'm just an ordinary person. Yet suppose he did? Suppose I am the Messiah? O God, not me. I couldn't be that much for You, could I?

As they contemplated in this manner, the old monks began to treat each other with extraordinary respect on the off-chance that one among them might be the Messiah. And on the off, off chance that each monk himself might be the Messiah, they began to treat themselves with extraordinary respect.

Because the forest in which it is situated was beautiful, it so happened that people still occasionally came to visit the monastery to picnic on its tiny lawn, to wander along some of its paths, even now and then to go into the dilapidated chapel to meditate. As they did so, without even being conscious of it, they sensed this aura of extraordinary respect that now began to surround the five old monks and seemed to radiate out from them and permeate the atmosphere of the place. There was something strangely attractive, even compelling about it.

Hardly knowing why, they began to come back to the monastery more frequently

pray. They began to bring their friends to show them this special place. And they brought their friends.

Then it happened that some of the younger men who came to visit the monastery started to talk more and more with the old monks. After a while, one asked if he could join them. Then another. And another. So within a few years the monastery had once again become a thriving order and thanks to the rabbi's gift, a vibrant centre of light and spirituality in the realm. (by M. Scott Peck)

His cold heart melted, warmed with love And met with Jesus there. As the tears flowed... in his heart, He repeated old Jim's prayer;


I JUST COME DOWN TO TELL YOU, LORD,
