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A Message from our Locum Minister Reverend Jack Drummond



Dear Friends,

It is now five months since I began my Pastoral Care in Stamperland Parish Church as Locum Minister.

Time passes quickly when you are engaged in something which is enjoyable and worthwhile. Although my appointment by Glasgow Presbytery is on a part time basis, I would still welcome the names of Church members who would appreciate a pastoral visit. Please make use of the cards in the Church pews, speak to me after the Sunday service or phone me on 0141 571 6002.

I am grateful for the warm and friendly welcome which I have received form the people of Stamperland and for your support and encouragement on Sundays. The congregation is fortunate to have gifted people who are willing to put their rich variety of God given talents to good use.

I have always thought that the word "Vacancy" is an unfortunate description of a congregation's situation when there is no full time ordained minister. Stamperland Church may be technically "vacant" but the work and witness of the congregation continues unhindered and that's to your credit.

In his first letter to the Corinthians St Paul described the church as "Christ's Body" This is a helpful and appropriate description, because it reminds us that we all have our different gifts and our own particular part to play in the church's life.

As a young minister, I remember being given an helpful piece of advice. "Take care to ensure that your minister does not block other people from using their gifts"

As a middle-aged minister, I led a Quinquennial Visitation to a church in Kirkintilloch, whose minister had recently returned from study leave. On his return he wrote a report on his study leave in which he said:

"My study leave was a time of blessing to the congregation"

These words caused a bit of a chuckle. He did not mean that the congregation was glad to be rid of him for a short time, rather, he has making the point that his study leave had enabled elders and members of the congregation to exercise gifts that had remained untapped.

After St Paul gives his picture of the church as Christ's Body, he goes on to describe the best way for each member of the church to work together, and that is the way of LOVE.

"Love is patient and kind; it is not jealous or conceited or proud; love does not keep a record of wrongs; love is not happy with evil, but is happy with the truth" (1st Co-rinthians, Ch 13, Vs 4-6)

Let's all go forward together into a new Session's work for the Lord, and love for one another.

Progressing Our Church's Future

There was a meeting at our church on 11th May attended by Trustees (elders and former members of the Congregational Board), Gray Fletcher, our Interim Moderator, and three representatives of Glasgow Presbytery – Rev Stuart Smith, Mission Strategy Convenor, Very Rev Bill Hewitt, Presbytery Clerk and Chris MacRae.

The Presbytery representatives were very clear that, under the Presbytery Plan, they expected all of the existing church buildings at Stamperland and Netherlee (excluding Church House) to be retained and fully utilised and that both churches would have regular morning worship each Sunday.

At the meeting, Stuart Smith described five options facing Stamperland

- unite soon with Netherlee Church;
- establish a deferred union;
- Stamperland call a minister with a short-term reviewable tenure;
- continue with an Interim Moderator and Locum; enter Guardianship.

There was also a sixth option – Stamperland could appeal against the Presbytery Plan. If the appeal were lost then Presbytery would impose one of the five options.

Those trustees present at the meeting expressed a wide range of views and opinions not just on the options but on the whole concept of linking and uniting with some opining that the ethos of the two churches, Stamperland and Netherlee, was quite different.

The meeting concluded with a recommendation from the Presbytery representatives that there should be dialogue between Stamperland and Netherlee churches. The dialogue would start with small groups of representatives, eventually leading to meetings involving all Trustees and elders. These early meetings would take place without prejudicing any appeal by Stamperland against the Presbytery Plan. At the initial meetings each church would be represented by, probably, five elders including the Minister or Interim Moderator of each church.

We have agreed with Presbytery's recommendation to enter dialogue with Netherlee Church. I anticipate our dialogue will begin sometime in September and I am sure it will be conducted in a "respectful manner". We will explore options and listen carefully to proposals. Members will be informed of progress and no decisions will be made without consulting members of our church.

Maybe's Aye, Maybe's Naw

The Church of Scotland has no official view on the Independence Referendum. Individual members and individual ministers will have their own opinions but the church has no overarching stance – other than urging members and, indeed, all voters, to exercise their democratic responsibility and vote on the 18th September.

One of the themes of the current Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, Rev John Chalmers, is "Respectful Dialogue". This is not simply in relation to the Independence Referendum but is much more widely applicable in all areas of debate, tension or conflict. Too often, the two sides involved in a dispute talk, but don't listen; make demands, but never concede. "Respectful Dialogue" asks those involved to listen and engage with those holding opposite views; to explore the views of others; to see the other's point of view; to consider counter proposals. It doesn't mean lying back and accepting everything (or anything) the other party states; but it does strive to take the heat out of disputes. "Respectful Dialogue" needs to take place between Israel and Palestine; between Sunni and Shia Muslims; between Muslims and Christians; between YES supporters and NO supporters; between those in the church opposed to Gay ministers and those willing to accept Gay ministers. You can add your own groups to those I've just listed.

The Moderator has hosted a number of "Respectful Dialogues" aiming to show what can be achieved when parties undertake real dialogue and don't simply take up negotiating positions but listen, consider and review.

Whatever the result of our referendum a large number of people are going to be very upset at the outcome. There will be disappointment, dismay, unhappiness, unease; there could be resentment, blame, bitterness, unrest. Recognising these negative feelings the Moderator has arranged a Service of Reconciliation to be held in St Giles Cathedral on Sunday, 21st September. It will be attended by leading politicians from all political parties in Scotland. The aim of the Service of Reconciliation is to sooth any hurts, dispel ill-feeling and ill-will and encourage co-operation between former political adversaries.

Finance and The Manse

Over the summer months there has been a hive of activity at the manse. People have been plastering,



painting, cleaning, gardening, hoovering, hanging curtain poles, curtains and lampshades. The manse is now on the market "to let" and we are awaiting our first tenants. Many thanks to all the volunteers who helped in any way to get the house ready.

Of course there has been some financial cost to all of these improvements. Most of the windows had to be re-hung or re-fitted – cost £732. The dishwasher had to be replaced – cost £135. Curtains were purchased at a bargain price. We had to replace carpet on the upper stairs and landings – cost £174. We also had to give George and Pamela £1000 as compensation for leaving behind carpets and laminate floors on their move to Broomhill. In total the cost of refurbishing the manse amounted to £2723.

The letting agency has advised that we can expect a rental income of approximately £1000 per month. This money will go straight to the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh. However, we expect that we will be able to access this money to pay for our fabric expenditure.

Renting out our manse does not mean that we will be better off financially and we must continually strive to find ways of increasing our income. The Finance Committee are very grateful to all those members who have kept their promise to "save Stamperland" by increasing their offerings in the last few months. Hopefully with more income from offerings and a successful stewardship campaign in the autumn we will be able to avoid a deficit at the end of this year.



'Will my mouth always be like this?' she asks. 'Yes', I say, 'it will. It is because the nerve was cut.' She nods, and is silent. But the young man smiles.

'I like it,' he says. 'It is kind of cute.' All at once I know who he is. I understand and I lower my gaze. One is not bold in an encounter with God. Unmindful, he bends to kiss her crooked mouth, and I, so close, can see how he twists his own lips to accommodate to hers, to show her that their kiss still works.'

From Stamperland to the Vatican



As the Congregation may be aware, the last few months have been particularly busy for myself and Lynsey, so much so that I decided to step away from the Social and Fundraising Committee at the last Kirk Session meeting. It was therefore a relief and a joy over the summer to relax on holiday, this time on a cruise covering Italy, France and Spain.

The main highlight of this was an excursion covering the classical sites of Rome and the Vatican City. So on a sweltering Saturday in July, we had the pleasure of enjoying a pasta lunch before walking round the corner to the Vatican Museums. Eventually we wound our way to the Sistine Chapel, St Peter's Basilica and St Peter's Square, where we saw the Papal Balcony, apartments and famous area where smoke billows from the chimney at the end of the conclave to elect a new Pope. Indeed, while Pope Francis was apparently not in during the time we visited (how dare he not be!!) there was enough memorabilia and spirituality for us to gain an insight into why the Vatican is so revered.

What struck is most however was the sheer wealth on show. My neck was strained as from room to room the gold on the statues seemed to get more impressive: the paintings more detailed and the architecture more omate. This was particularly true of the Italian room where paintings of each area of Italy lined the walls and in the magnificent Sistine Chapel, where the paintings staring at you were far superior to the over zealous Italian Guard making more noise than anyone else – despite appealing for silence!

Yes money and wealth - contrasted with a poor society and beggars on the street. How can that be right?

As tends to be my way with these things, I like to read up on areas while visiting them and so I read 'Pope Francis Untying the Knots', during the cruise. From this fascinating read, it seems that the Pope too has a concern for the poor stemming from his days in the slums of Argentina. Yet he has to reconcile this with concerns over his actions during Argentina's Dirty War and his potentially dictatorial style of leadership. Yet the Pope is learning, has changed and knows that his actions towards the poor are how he must act for the Church to have its place in the world.

I am not sure what this says about us in the Church of Scotland but it could be

surmised that there is a need to reach out to people where they are. This may mean the Church meeting people where they want to, instead of saying where they should meet; or reaching out in new ways to show our faith can adapt to the 21st Century world, and is still relevant.

People are out there as we saw first hand from the queues and crowds at the Vatican. Perhaps we just have to look harder.
