Parish Council News

Planning Applications

The Council considered applications for a certificate of lawfulness at Cliff Valley Farm, and the construction of a garage, car port and home office at Plowd-Rytyn Barn, Penhale.

Donations

The Council agreed to purchase a Poppy Wreath for the Remembrance Service at No Mans Land at a cost of £19. A donation of £30 was also made to Vitalise Essential Breaks for disabled people and their carers.

Windsworth Noticeboard

The noticeboard project is complete and by the time you read this will be in use. Our thanks go to Cornwall Rural Community Council who part funded the project.

Bodigga Cliff Path

The Council are extremely concerned about the condition of the path from Bay View Farm to Millendreath, this has been reported to Cornwall CC who have agreed to remedial work being carried out, this will require closure of the path, however an alternative route is currently being investigated.

No Mans Land Affordable Houses

The Clerk has been in touch with the Guinness Trust, the proposed development is still in its early stages, provisional plans have been drawn but not yet submitted to CDC Planning. The Parish Council can confirm that land has been requested within the development for a play/ recreation area.

Caradon Community Improvement Fund

The Parish Council has submitted an application for a grant to supply a youth shelter for No Mans Land (subject to planning).

COMMUNITY SAFETY FIRST PLEASE



Dear Resident, Every resident of the No Mans Land area will know the problem of trying to cross the B3253 to get to the shop/post office, to be honest it is dangerous and the need for a speed restriction has been known for a long time. For some time now both Parish Councils and myself have been campaigning for a speed restriction through the area as a matter of

community safety and a formal request was made 3 years ago. During the time that this scheme was under consideration the rules change and for the management of speed limits on rural roads with a government initiative to standardise speeds limits so similar roads throughout the country had the same speed. In Cornwall the council started surveying the roads in the west of the county first gradually working east which meant that the B3253 would have been surveyed possibly next year. This was totally unacceptable as you all know the accident rate on this stretch of road is very (very) poor and after every accident I would highlight the fact that this road is dangerous and needed surveying as a priority. After several accidents the survey was carried out and an initial scheme was drawn up and everyone was delighted that the speed shown through No Mans Land was 40 mph, although not the 30 mph we would have liked, it was far better than 60 mph. Then a second scheme came out which on the covering letter showed 40 mph through No Mans Land the attached map showed 50 mph and this discrepancy was picked up by a local resident (Mr A Soady) and the question was asked why this was so? The answer came back that the first consultation and second covering letter were wrong to show 40 mph through the village and should have been 50 mph. The Parish Council and myself requested that this be checked by the County Council and they have carried out a further survey and they claim that 50 mph is correct. I have no problem in saying that I find the way that this process has been handled by the County Council shows gross incompetence as not once but twice they indicated to the residents of No Mans Land that the speed would be reduced to 40 mph. This is not the end of the story as both the Parish Councils of St Martins & Morval, the District Councillors and myself will fight for the further reduction in the speed limit or a pedestrian crossing (or a bridge) as community safety is more important than speeding cars. The acid test is would they like to come and try to cross the road and feel completely safe with cars passing at 50 mph?

Thanks a million!

A new community grant scheme aims to provide a million good reasons for grass roots community and voluntary groups in South East Cornwall to seek funding for local projects.

The Caradon Area Community Fund was launched by Lady Mary Holborow, the Lord Lieutenant of Cornwall, on Friday 26 September. The fund's initial goal is to raise £1,000,000 to provide a sustainable source of small grants for groups that deliver projects benefiting communities in South East Cornwall.

The fund will be kick-started with a £100,000 donation from Caradon District Council and also has the backing of the local business, community and voluntary sectors in the form of organisations such as Ginsters, the South East Cornwall Federation of Small Businesses, Coodes Solicitors, St Mellion International Resort, Cornwall Rural Community Council, the Citizens Advice Bureau and East Cornwall Council for Voluntary Services.

Councillor John Turner, leader of Caradon District Council, said: "This is very much a joint effort across all sectors. We are united in our desire to leave a lasting legacy that will reflect the needs of local residents both now and in the future.

A capital fund of £1,000,000 would mean that £50,000 could be distributed in grants every year, benefiting communities across the district."

The Story of the Christmas Tree

People often wonder where the custom of having a tree in the home during Christmas time comes from. We will probably never know for sure. But there are several historical clues that point out where this custom came from.

An Ancient Symbol

Thousands or years ago, there were people who believed that evergreen trees were magical. Even in winter, when all the other trees and greenery were brown and bare, the evergreen stayed strong and green. People saw the evergreen as a symbol of life and as a sure sign that sunshine and spring would soon return. Candles, or the electric lights we use to decorate our trees today, are also an ancient symbol. They represent the light of spring triumphing over the darkness of winter.

In ancient Rome, people decorated their homes and their temples with greenery during a special December feast. It was a happy time. No battles could be fought, the schools were closed, and people everywhere joined in the carnival-like atmosphere and gave each other presents.

The Modern Tree

So when did the Christmas tree go indoors? Legend has it that the tradition was begun by Martin Luther in Germany. He was a monk and church reformer who lived from 1483 to 1546. According to the legend, Luther was returning home one wintry night when he saw the stars twinkling in the sky through the tree branches. Luther was amazed by the sight, and when he arrived home, he was eager to tell his family about it. To help them understand, he went to the woods and cut down a small fir tree. Luther brought it indoors and decorated it with candles, which represented the stars he had seen.

The custom spread in Germany, and from there all over the world. In England, the Christmas tree first appeared when Queen Victoria married Prince Albert, who was German. In 1841, Albert set up a Christmas tree at Windsor Castle near London to remind him of his homeland. The Christmas tree custom was brought to the United States by people from England as well as by many German immigrants who came in the 1800's. Whatever its origin, the Christmas tree is a beautiful symbol for everyone who celebrates Christmas.



The Legend of the First Christmas Tree

The night of the Saviour's birth, all the living creatures, both flora and fauna, came to Bethlehem with gifts. The olive tree brought its fruit and the palm its dates. But the little fir tree had no gift and was so tired it couldn't resist when the big trees pushed it into the background and hid it from view. But then a nearby angel took pity and commanded a cluster of stars to come and rest on its delicate boughs. When the Baby Jesus beheld this lovely lighted tree, He smiled and blessed it, declaring henceforth that fir trees should always be filled with lights at Christmastime to please little children. Our Favourite Cranberry Sauce

Ingredients

375g (13 oz) fresh cranberries 350ml (12 fl oz) water 5 whole cloves 5 whole allspice berries 400g (14 oz) caster sugar

Method

Place fresh cranberries and water in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Wrap cloves, allspice berries and cinnamon sticks in a spice bag or muslin. Place in the water with cranberries.

Cook until cranberries begin to burst, about 10 minutes.

Stir in sugar and reduce heat to low. Continue cooking 5 minutes, or until sugar has dissolved. Remove from heat and allow to cool. Discard spice bag. Chill in the refrigerator 8 hours, or overnight, before serving.





History Snippet

I was intrigued to find (via the pages of this publication), that the old house on the corner on No Man's Land is called St Euny, and that an old well has been found nearby.

St Euny was the brother/sister of St Ia, an Irish virgin who floated over Cornwall on a leaf, en route to Brittany! She leaves her name in St Ives and was associated with St Patrick. Brother Euny dedicated wells in Crowan, Sancreed and Lelant. He leaves his name at Unyredreth, Euny's red ford, now Redruth – a fair distance from here!

But, on that Tithe Map, the lane continuing east (now marked Keverall) from the bend on the Penhale road was called Lanturney Lane. This translated as a lane going to (or from) a sacred enclosure dedicated to St Euny! A church site, perhaps. Maybe St Kayne had a rival establishment in the neighbourhood.

I found another reference in the Hearth Tax Register 1662. A property spelt "Lanturry" has declared 2 taxable hearths. These weren't on the previous list so it must have been a new or upgraded dwelling at the time. It belonged to Walter Hoskyns. Where was it?

It's unlikely that a house in No Mans Land would have been recorded on the old parish surveys. "A peece of land called Noe Man's Land" (1665) would have been between parish boundaries – often becoming a tax haven for travellers and refuge for the dispossessed.

Curiously, the late Rev. Picken described it as a 'watering hole'.

So who named the cottage on the corner? Is it just coincidence? How old is the well? Was it another well of St Euny? And have we got a holy site we can claim as our own? Now our Parish Church is in the next parish, it would be great if we could find it!

Two new species at The Monkey Sanctuary, Looe.



Six new African monkeys have arrived at the Looe Monkey Sanctuary in the last two weeks. Whilst the kids have been back at school, the Trust has been busy with an emergency rescue of four barbary macaques and two patas monkeys.

They came from another UK sanctuary that was forced to close due to the credit crunch.

It's all change here now," said Brooke, one of the monkey keepers. "For over 40 years, we have looked after South American monkeys. Now we have four different species. The new monkeys caused quite a stir; they behave really differently. The barbaries are really bouncy, but the patas like to sit and watch the world go by. Our existing monkeys don't quite know what to make of them."

Quick & easy Christmas cake

For busy people, only takes about 25 minutes to prepare.

Ingredients:

1x 411g jar luxury rum and raisin mincemeat.

150g (5½oz) butter.

150g (5½oz) dark brown soft sugar.

3 med eggs

225g (8oz) S.R. Flour.

5ml (1 Tsp) ground cinnamon.

100g (3½oz) cherries, washed and dried.

 $100g (3\frac{1}{2}oz)$ raisins.

200g (7oz) currants.

Grated rind 1 lemon.

15ml (1Tbsp) dark rum.

Method:

Preheat oven 170 degrees, 325F, gas mark 3. Grease and line the base and sides of a 20cm (8in) deep cake tin. Place soft butter and sugar in a large bowl, beat until smooth and creamy, beat eggs in a small bowl and gradually add to the mixture, add cherries and mincemeat, stir in currants, then add lemon rind, rum and raisins, sieve flour and cinnamon to the mix, fold in well.


Cook in the oven for $1\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 hours. If it browns to quickly cover top with foil, when cake shrinks from the side it should be done, check by inserting skewer which should come our clean. When cold wrap the cake in double layer of greaseproof paper and foil, store in a cool place for up to 2 months, feeding with rum if required.

Busy Bee's Gardening Tips

Yes a very busy time ahead in the garden.

Cut back dead foliage and flowers, prune roses by a third, clean out hanging baskets, pot up plants you wish to save. Daffodil and tulip bulbs should go in now. Be ready for the frost, either lift or bank up dahlias, get frost prone plants and shrubs into cover.

Clear, clean and fumigate greenhouses. Prune, cut back or tie in raspberry canes, dependant on species. Carrots can be lifted and stored in dry sand or compost. Runner bean vines should be cleared. As ground is cleared, get on with digging in lots of dung, then a dressing of lime.


