Election of Officers to serve to May 2010

Councillor Barbara Reynolds was elected to represent the Council on the Liskeard Road Safety Partnership and the East Cornwall Rural Transport Partnership.

The construction of an entrance lobby at Plowd-Rytyn Barn, St Martins, Looe.

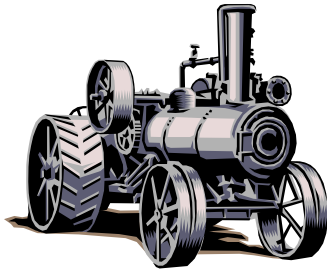
Youth Shelter Project

Sadly, despite the best efforts of everyone concerned the Youth Shelter Project now looks unlikely to proceed; following objections from a few residents Cornwall Council refused to issue a lease for the land despite giving planning permission. The Duchy of Cornwall wanted to help, but the land in question has been earmarked for affordable housing and our appeal for even a temporary site was turned down. The £4,000 plus funding, which we fought so hard to get, now looks likely to be returned; the only hope of keeping the funding is if someone, somewhere can suggest a site that will not be objected to. If ANYONE can help please call Charles on 01579 340905. One good thing came out of all of this, the estate has been tidied up by Cornwall Council. It would be nice if it continued to look good; maybe as responsible tenants you can do your bit to keep it maintained.

Cornwall councillor surgeries start at Looe One Stop Shop

There's a chance to meet with local Cornwall Councillors at Looe's One Stop Shop every Friday.

Councillors Edwina Hannaford and Armand Toms will be taking it in turn to hold surgeries at the one stop shop on Fridays from 10.00am to 1.00pm.

Councillor Hannaford, who represents the Looe West and Lansallos division, said: **"If you have any issues to raise or just want a friendly chat to find out more about your new council from your local councillors, please do drop in and see us."**

Councillor Toms, who represents the Looe East division, added: **"We're here to help with all sorts of things – planning, litter, housing – any service that the council offers or any other local problem where the council might be able to provide assistance."**

Looe's one stop shop is located in the library at the Millpool. In addition to the councillors' surgeries, there are also sessions with housing advice every Tuesday morning, the Citizens Advice Bureau Wednesday mornings, Knit and Natter Wednesday afternoons, Cornwall Works all day on Thursdays, Link into Learning at 5.00pm on Thursdays and Job Search workshops at 1.00pm and 2.00pm on Fridays. Housing benefit sessions take place on the first Tuesday of each month from 10.00am to 1.00pm.

Councillor Hannaford will also be holding monthly surgeries in Polperro Village Hall from 10.00am to 12.00 noon on 29 June, 27 July, 24 August, 28 September and 26 October.

Argyle football match kicks off community development scheme



Youngsters from south-east Cornwall enjoyed a trip to Plymouth Argyle's end of season match thanks to a Cornwall Council housing services project that encourages community spirit through social activities.

Eight children and young people from No Mans Land and Liskeard benefited from free tickets to the match as part of the scheme.

Russell Hale, Cornwall Council's District Housing Manager, said: "We meet with our tenants' and residents' forums on a regular basis, and one of the things they are concerned about is the lack of things for young people to do. It's a particular problem in rural areas where youngsters can be very isolated if they don't have transport.

"The Tenants and Residents Forum provided funding to help refurbish a snooker room in No Mans Land to give young people a place to meet and relax, and we were keen to organise something around football as it's very popular with local children and young people. We approached Plymouth Argyle, and they generously offered us free tickets to a match."

The names of the youngsters interested in going to the Argyle match were put into a hat, and eight lucky winners were drawn.

Russell Hale said: "It was a fantastic day out. Some of those who took part in the trip had never been to an organised football match before, so it was a really exciting time for them. We'd like to say a big thank you to Plymouth Argyle for making such a special day possible.

"We'd like to see a lot more young people on our estates involved in their communities, and we hope that this will be the first of many social activities for tenants and residents of all ages throughout the year. It would be great to have more young people involved in our tenants' and residents' forums as well."

Busy Bee's Gardening tips

A few reminders

Be alert to black and green fly, likewise vine weevil. As shrubs stop flowering that's the time to prune. Tidy flower beds by clearing out dead flower leaves. Move polyanthus to winter quarters, and feed roses on a regular basis.

Nip the tops from broad beans, ensure main crop potatoes are banked up, thin out swede, carrot, parsnips etc.

Sow a few seeds on a regular basis, spring onion, radish, lettuce etc so as to have a regular supply.

CARADON HILL TRANSMITTER GROUP

It is now less than 50 days to go before the **Caradon Hill** transmitter group, serving Plymouth, parts of Devon and east Cornwall, switches to digital TV. Analogue services will be switched off in two stages at each transmitter group.

Stage one of switchover. Caradon Hill - Wednesday 12 August.

BBC Two will cease broadcasting in analogue and the first group of Freeview digital channels will become available from relay transmitters.

Stage two of switchover. Caradon Hill – Wednesday 9 September.

Four weeks later, the remaining analogue channels will be permanently switched off and replaced with additional digital services. You will need to retune your digital TV equipment to receive the digital channels. Our latest research indicates good levels of awareness about the forthcoming change to terrestrial TV services and that the majority of viewers are well prepared:

- Eight out of ten households in the Caradon Hill transmitter group area (87%) have already connected their main set to digital TV.
- Seven out of ten people (75%) in the Caradon Hill transmitter area know precisely what to do for switchover against 72% in the nations/regions yet to switch.

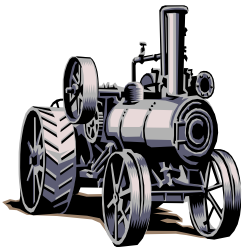
Please understand we need these signs to survive

History Snippet

A great outcry about our parliament is nothing new. In the eighteenth century there were rumblings of dissatisfaction – and we were in the thick of it!

Wesley took the coast road from Plymouth ‘close by the sea’ and dined at Looe. He complained it was ‘a town near half as large as Islington which sends four burgesses to Parliament’. William Cobbett the travel writer noted that politicians ‘have an inheritance in the public carcase, like maggots that some people have in their skins’. Cornish historian Dr Borlase wrote that the corruption of our boroughs at the electing of members for Parliament begins with intemperance and riot!

The problem was that Elizabeth I had given Looe boroughs extra status as corporations. This meant another MP – each! So East Looe and West Looe each had two MPs!

At this time there was no secret ballot and the only people entitled to vote were freeholders whose property was worth more than £2pa. Over our side of the river the Bullers of Morval (with their hold on Keverall) could easily win the day as most property was leasehold and the freeholders could be bought off or shamed. We lived in a Pocket Borough because we were in the Bullers’pocket. Scotland had 45 MPs: Cornwall had 44!

During the great debates that led to the 1832 Reform Bill one outraged member declared to a packed House, “There is only one place more corrupt than West Looe and that is East Looe!”

Oh! The shame of it all!

Imagine being stolen from your mother as a tiny baby, being sold at a market then spending the next ten years on your own in a 6ft by 4ft cage, never even going outside. Imagine moving from family to family, never able to settle until finally being housed in a shed at the bottom of a garden, your only company being a dog that terrifies you for the next 7 years.

These stories are just some of the deeply traumatic past lives of monkeys who are now in the care of the Monkey Sanctuary Trust. Monkeys are very social, intelligent beings and in the wild live in some of the most diverse habitats in the world. However, sadly, most of the monkeys living here in the UK will have never even been close to their native homes.

The Monkey Sanctuary Trust has been offering refuge and protection to monkeys in need for over 45 years. Started by Leonard Williams in 1964 the Sanctuary was initially home to Amazonian woolly monkeys, taken from the wild and imported in their thousands in the 1950s and 60s.

Things have changed a great deal over the last 45 years and thankfully you are unlikely to find a woolly monkey as a pet in the UK. We also implemented a non-breeding policy for many various and important reasons.

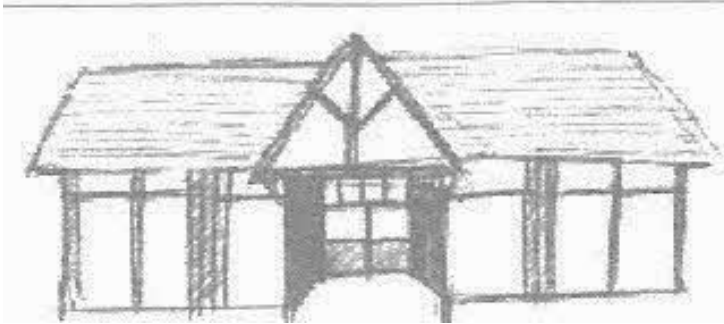
Many people are surprised to hear that the primate pet-trade is still legal in the UK. Whilst caring for the remaining group of woolly monkeys, the rescue centre re-opened its doors in 2001 to capuchin monkeys, victims of the UK pet trade. Also native to South America, capuchin monkeys are one of the most intelligent species of primate in the world.

Given the space, an appropriate diet but most importantly the company of others primates, previously traumatised neurotic monkeys begin to creep out of their fearful and lonely existence. No matter what physical mental problems that the monkey may suffer from, they will always choose the company of another monkey over a human.

Today, we have embarked on another new era. A small sanctuary in Wales sadly became bankrupt; they desperately needed to find new homes for the monkeys they had rescued in recent years. The Trust had a very short time to organise help and, after serious thought, agreed to offer a home to two elderly patas monkeys and three young male Barbary macaques as nowhere else would take them.

The Monkey Sanctuary is open to visitors for the summer giving people an intimate insight into a working sanctuary.
