

- No longer have a use for the equipment.





PARTS OF YOUR WHEELCHAIR

SELF – PROPELLING



ARMRESTS




Most wheelchairs have fitted detachable armrests. This is useful for fitting a tray or for a sideways transfer.

To remove: Pull lever 'A' and lift armrest up out of sockets

To replace: Place front armrest tube into frame first, then place rear tube into socket. Check to make sure lever '**A**' has fully engaged

STUMP BOARDS




If you have a lower leg amputation you may be provided with a stump board. Please ensure that you use it at all times whilst seated as it will help maintain comfort and a proper positioning of the stump, and will also prevent pain and swelling. The stump board can be removed the same way as the foot rest.

BACKRESTS



Most wheelchairs have a folding or hinged backrest which makes the chair compact for storage or stowing in a car boot.

To fold: Stand behind the chair, lift lever 'B' on each push handle, and pull handles backwards.

To unfold: Raise push handles, push lever 'B' down firmly to locate inner tubes into sockets of the chair frame

TOOLS

To carry out repairs to your wheelchair, you will need the following equipment:

Pump

Spray lubricant

Cleaning materials


Tyre levers

CONDITIONS OF LOAN

The wheelchair is the property of the local health authority and is loaned to you on the conditions shown below:

• The equipment must be returned or given up for repair as soon as you are asked.

GOING UP AND DOWN KERBS WITH AN ATTENDANT



Check to see if you can locate a dropped kerb or ramp nearby, if you are not able to find one then position the chair square to the kerb.

Grip the handles firmly, place one foot on the tipping lever. Push down and balance the chair on it's rear wheels.

If going down gently lower with the wheels against the kerb, whilst supporting some of the weight of the chair.

If going up the kerb, balance the chair on it's rear wheels until they touch the kerb, then gently lift the chair on to the pavement.


TO TRANSFER




As your wheelchair has detachable arms, removing the appropriate side will help transferring from the side of the chair. It may help if you have a smooth board (banana board) to slide along. Position your wheelchair alongside the seat, bed, toilet etc. and apply the brakes. Remove the armrest and lift the footrests back out of the way. Your foot should be on the ground, **not on the footplate**.

If you are able to pivot transfer, use your leg to pivot on the seat, bed, toilet etc. If using a sliding board, slide it from seat to wheelchair, bend it slightly upwards and slide across on to seat or bed.

BRAKES



FOOTRESTS



Brakes must always be applied when transferring into and out of the wheelchair.

This is to prevent it from rolling away when you are seating yourself or using the armrests to raise yourself out of the chair.

Brakes should also be applied when folding and opening the chair.

To apply, push the handle forward.

Footrests can be removed to make the chair lighter to lift, or swung out of the way to ease getting into the chair.

Alternatively the footplates 'D' can be raised out of the way.

To detach: Push plate '**A**' towards the back of the chair to release the catch, swing the footrest outwards, and to remove grasp at point '**B**' and lift

To attach: Match the holes on the footrests with the pivot points on the chair 'C' and swing footrests inwards until catch 'A' engages


TO ADJUST THE HEIGHT OF THE FOOT PLATE

The footplate height can be adjusted for your comfort, and the safest position is usually with your thighs horizontal and the hips and thighs at right angles.


To move the foot plate loosen the nut (shown above as 'D') with a spanner, adjust for comfort then re-tighten the nut.

Remember: Never use the footplate to enter or leave the wheelchair as this can cause the chair to tip over.


PLACING WHEELCHAIR IN TO THE BOOT OF A CAR



Apply the brakes. Remove all accessories – straps, cushions etc. and removable parts. Fold chair, including backrest and position chair parallel to boot. Bend your knees, grasp the frame and lift into the boot. TO OPEN YOUR WHEELCHAIR



TO CLOSE YOUR WHEELCHAIR



Turn footplates upright and footrests out to the sides or remove completely.

Grasp the middle of the seat canvas at the front and back, and pull upwards until chair is fully closed.
