Iain Wright, MP for Hartlepool and Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State at the Department for Communities and Local Government, was welcomed

When asked how Comet country's

when asked how context country's infrastructure will cope with the planned 3,600 homes west of Stevenage, and up to 7,000 east of Luton, Mr Wright said: "I recognise that people are concerned and I think we have to be sensible and ensure

any development is well planned.
"The last thing I want to see is a development that doesn't think of the long term future, so that we will have to demolish it in 15 years time because it's not sustainable." He added: "This is an extremely

desirable place to live and affordability is a real issue in this area, so we do need more houses."
