Grumpy Old Men Group



The European Court of Human Rights - not a topic which would suggest an entertaining discussion over lunch but once again the Grumps managed sparkling and erudite contributions to delight the gathering. Frank Hodgson kicked off proceedings with an outline

of the workings and aims of the Court since its inception in 1959. Each of the 47 countries involved appoints their own representative to the Court which to date has received 57,100 cases for consideration (the majority from Eastern European countries) but judgement has been delivered on only 1,625!!! The different national legal systems throughout Europe inevitably leads to inconsistent interpretations of pronouncements handed down by the Court. The "politically correct" UK usually abides by them - "yes we will do it although we might not fully agree" - while our Continental cousins response often appears to be "yes we will give consideration to what you say" and then "forgets" to take any further action. The UK is basically anti European and therefore anything that goes wrong or is a bit silly is always blamed on Europe but certain recent judgements such as "votes for prisoners" and the possibility of a decree that "prisoners are being denied their human rights if they are not receiving full state benefits" surely gives support to this belief. It was agreed that the Court was indeed a desirable institution but some of its decisions raised the question are we governed by Parliament or Europe and should the European Court of Human Rights be allowed to decide how we conduct our own affairs.

This month's "rotating Chairman" Paul Burley, awarded the Grump of the Month Trophy to Frank Hodgson for his comprehensive introduction and further contributions to the subsequent general discussion.
