History Group

At our July meeting Athena Roderick spoke to us about Chile where she and her family lived for five years. Her husband had been appointed as poultry advisor to the Chilean



government so they went there in january 1969, initially living in an apartment in downtown Santiago, and later in the Andean foothills. Chile's unusual ribbon-like shape (250 miles wide and 2700 miles long) has given it a hugely varied climate, ranging from the world's driest desert in the north, through a mediterranean climate in the centre, to a snow-prone Alpine climate in the south with fjiords, galciers and lakes. Surrounded on three sides by virtually impassable barriers, Chile's rich central valley remained largely unknown until the 15th century when the Incas began conquering much of South America. The Spanish conquistadors colonised the region from the 16th century until 1818 when Chile proclaimed itself an independent republic with the Supreme Director a moderate with the wonderful name of Bernardo O'Higgins.

Chile is one of Soth America's most stable and prosperous countries and has not suffered so many of the coups which have blighted the area, the exception being the 17-year rule by General Pinochet, whose 1973 coup left more than 3000 dead or missing. It faces the challenge of having to diversify its copperdependent economy and of addressing uneven wealth distribution.
