## West Midlands Regional Seminar November 2011

Hand Bell Ringing

At our November Meeting Tony Whiteley showed us a film entitled "Oranges and Sunshine", featuring Emily Watson as Margaret Humphreys, a social worker. It told the story of the deportation of children from the 1920's onwards, but particularly in the 1950's and 1960's, to countries such as Australia, Canada, South Africa and Zimbabwe. The

children, some as young as three, were taken from their families to a "new life overseas" - hence the title of the film. The story of what happened to them was shocking - brothers and sisters were separated and many were sent to institutions where they were savagely treated and abused. Some were given different names and dates of birth so they could not trace their families. Margaret Humphreys was asked by a young Australian to help trace her mother and from then on she devoted her life to trying to unite families. Some twenty three years later the governments of Australia and Britain apologised for the part they had played. In his speech Gordon Brown drew comfort from the fact that so many of the children had grown up to lead happy and successful lives – despite the traumas of their childhood.

On 12th December the History group are having a Christmas Lunch at the Windmill Pub, followed by a meeting at our usual venue where we are going to be entertained by the U3A Choir.

"Brick Lane" by Monica Ali, the story of 18 years old Naseem brought over from Bangladesh to marry a man 20years older than herself and living in a council flat on a run-down estate in the East End of London.

"Little Boy Lost" by Marghanita Laski, the poignant story set in France of a couple separated by war . Jean, their young child hidden by the local priest and send along the resistance route to be cared for by nuns in an orphanage. After the war when his father searches for him, can he be sure that the child Jean in their care is really his son?

"When God was a Rabbit" by Sarah Winman, a book about the childhood and later life of a brother and sister as told by the girl. The brother always being complicit in what happens to her. God is the name of her childhood pet rabbit.
