This month we went to an exhibition at the Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery. The exhibition, I Want! I Want! Art and Technology, was of interest, mainly because it wasn't our usual cup of tea. The pieces delivered their messages through videos or computer games, were constructed using technology or computer graphics, or were related to technology in modern life. While we appreciated the imagination and skill that brought art and technology together in the exhibits, we found few of them personally engaging. One exception, from the Democratic Republic of Congo, was called *Esika na Ngayi (My Place)*. By superimposing circuitry graphics

over a beautiful, pensive, figure dressed in traditional fabrics, this made the connection between the exploitative mining of coltan, which when refined is used in mobile phones, and the destruction that industry has caused. Our next meeting will be in September.
