The May meeting was programmed by member Derek who, unfortunately being indisposed on the day of the meeting, passed on the presentation to our resident MC. Geoff. (pause for applause).

The first half of the programme was a feast of goodies from Big Bands. We opened with "Tangerine" played by the 'Alex Welsh' band with a splendid trombone solo from Roy Williams, then onto 'Ted Heath' with "Lullaby of Birdland" followed by 'Artie Shaw' and "Begin the Beguine" (sighs from the ladies present) then we had Midland based 'Richard Leech Band' playing "At Sundown" featuring another good trombone solo. 'Woody Herman' came next with "Woodchoppers Ball" and the final track first half was "St. Louis Blues" played by the Bateman Brothers Band a unique group who have gained a worldwide reputation for their faithful recreation of the music of Louis Armstrong.

"Review of the Election result and What's in it for us" seemed to be a simple, straight forward and non controversial discussion topic when it was chosen at our May meeting but the unexpected outcome changed all that. It was agreed that the Conservative's campaign was unimaginative, lack lustre and what policies were included in the manifesto were badly explained and

poorly presented. The "presidential style" approach adopted by Theresa May was unanimously criticised and the "strong and stable government" slogan, repeated ad nauseam, became boring and was meaningless to uncommitted voters. In comparison the Labour Party's campaign and manifesto was considered to be a very energetic, positive and well presented with Jeremy Corbyn's involvement being very well received. Their promise to an end to austerity was very effective and the pledge to end university tuition fees attracted the high student vote which undoubtedly influenced the result in a number of constituencies. The Group believed that in terms of the number of seats won the Conservatives had every right to form a Government but it was considered that in practice there were no real winners as now we have a hung Parliament with all its uncertainties which will no doubt effect "what's in it for us". The Grump of the Month Award for his comprehensive initial analysis and contributions throughout went to Antony Eastaugh who summed up the surprise result as "Labour offered hope and change and the Conservatives didn't".
