### **CLASSICAL MUSIC**

The programme consisted of Italian composers. We began in the Baroque era with Corelli's Allegro. Vivaldi composed a lot besides the Four Seasons but not much has survived, we heard a movement from his Mandolin concerto. The familiar Adagio by Albinoni followed then a Scarlatti (father not the son) aria 'Che Sara'? the only religious item. Boccherini was a cellist so we heard his Minuet then a movement from his cello concerto. By then we were moving into the classical and romantic era in Scriabin's Mazurka and Etude. After tea we progressed to opera, the 'Overture to William Tell' and the 'Largo al Factotum' from the Barber of Seville both by Rossini. An aria by Donizetti sung by Joan Sutherland followed by Casta Diva by Bellini sung by Maria Callas showed the difference in voices. A duet by Verdi from Il Trovatore, with a chorus in the background, and 'Nessun Dorma' by Puccini, and finally the 'Intermezzo from Cavaleria Rusticana' ended the recital. 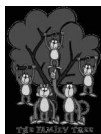
