I started by talking about 'Book of the week' on BBC Radio 4 & how badly Russian women were treated when they returned home after serving at the front line in WW2. They were accused of being whores, as they had been mixing with men. But the men fared no better, as they were supposed to die like heroes, not to be taken prisoners & thus return like traitors. Commentators suspect that Stalin didn't want word to spread that life was better outside Russia.
