

At the first gathering of 2018 the Grumps exercised their grey matter considering and offering solutions to the problems of Britain in Crisis. The meeting concluded that undoubtedly there was room for considerable improvement in the overall management of the Country's affairs but, although it could be political suicide, the Government (of whatever colour) must have the courage to increase general taxation to "balance the books". Unpalatable though it may be, the population have to accept that if they want more they will have to pay more!

Our speaker in January, David Ball of Dene Valley U3A gave an illustrated talk on the history of Wellesbourne. Originally there were two communities on either side of the River Dene, Wellesbourne Hastings to the north and Wellesbourne Mountford to the south. It was first recorded in 862 as Wallesburam, and our speaker explained that 'Welles' is synonymous with the Principality and may have derived from it being on the sheep droving road to east and south of England from Wales. The celtic translation of Wales is 'Foreigner'. The two old parishes merged into one and the parish registers give an insight to the lives of the ordinary folk who have inhabited the village during the past 450 years. Examples were given along with many photos of historic buildings within the community.

At our next meeting on February 12th David Dumper will give an illustrated talk on 'Stratford upon Avon the first 150 years and John de Hatton its most famous son before Shakespeare'.
