It was entitled "(Dolly) Mixtures & (Liquorice) Allsorts" and it was certainly a sweet programme, it started with Miles Davies and "Billy Boy" and was followed by a totally different genre with Bix Beiderbecke playing "Sorry". Then it swung into tracks by Frank Sinatra, Glen Miller and the MYJO then we had

a lovely Humphrey Littleton track of "Georgia on my Mind", Geoff then continued with "Stompin at the Savoy" played by Woody Herman and the final track of the first half introduced the instrument that he is especially fond of THE DRUMS with Buddy Rich with "Sweets Opus No. 1.

After our usual meeting of the voices (i.e. coffee and chat) we began the second half of the programme. This half was full of gems be they allsorts or dolly mixtures, The first track was "Summertime" played by Miles Davis and then there was a fantastic track of Wynton Marsalis and Eric Clapton playing "Icecream", if ever there was a dance inducing track that was it. Hard on the heels of this were two standards "St. Louis Blues" by Glen Miller and "Royal Garden Blues with Count Basie, and then an interesting track called "From Monday On" which had Bix/Bing/Whiteman, at the stage of this recording Bing hadn't achieved his 'croon'. Then came "Old Man River" firstly by Paul Robeson and then by Basie. Robeson's voice made the hair stand up on the back of your neck, a very interesting comparison with the Basie track. The afternoon finished with Stan Kenton playing "Fascinating Rhythm" A big thank you to Geoff for a great afternoon. BIG BAND MUSIC AND JAZZ GROUP

Sue Tríngham Once again Tony put together an unusual programme! He played CDs for the first half and vinyl records in the second half. He always researches the musicians and comes up with some interesting, sometimes little known, facts! Jimmy Launceford organised his first band, the Chickasaw Syncopators

him home. Rumour has it that he was poisoned by a fish restauranteur who did not like serving negroes! Stan Kenton's big orchestral form of jazz became known as the Wall of Sound. He died from a stroke in 1979. Tony really thinks that Lionel Hampton was responsible for changing the sound of jazz from the 30's onwards and helped to blend traditional sounds with the developing modern jazz of the 40's and 50's. Harry James started trumpet lessons aged 10 under the direction of his circus band leader father and became a band leader. His was the first band to employ Frank Sinatra. Woody Herman started as a singer and tap dancer in vaudeville and then at the age of 12 started playing clarinet and saxophone! Gene Krupa was a great drummer. Les Brown and his Band of Renown brought Doris Day to prominence with Sentimental Journey in 1945. Sidney Bechet was our first sound of vinyl but we learned that he spent 11 months in a French jail following a 'shoot out' in Paris! Turk Murphy was a trombonist and vocalist playing traditional and Dixieland jazz in San Francisco. Pee Wee Hunt originally played banjo but switched to trombone at college where he studied electrical engineering. The Six played mainstream jazz and it would appear that mainstream jazz draws on musicians from all styles and genre of jazz without labelling the music as other than jazz! Benny Goodman's career spanned 4 decades. Django Reinhardt is a jazz guitar despite being two fingers short on his left hand! Nat King Cole was a great jazz pianist and vocalist. The New Orleans Rhythm Kings from the 20's was formed by merging Chicago and New Orleans musicians in an effort to find better Gigs. Urbie Green learned to play piano as a child but soon picked up trombone from both his elder brothers when he was 12 years old. Gerry Mulligan is one of the few musicians to play jazz on a baritone sax. All this information was accompanied by fantastic music!

The Ron Shirt Memorial Trophy for Grump of the Month was unanimously awarded to Derek Phillips for his introduction and all round contribution to this month's topic " Should charity begin at home". His comprehensive and skilful mix of facts and figures, personal opinions and thoughts, particularly on Britain's Overseas Aid policy opened the door for much discussion within the Group. Currently 0.7%

of GDP (equivalent to approx. £170 per annum for every man, woman and child in this country) is donated to projects in numerous countries each year and while generally it was felt it is a good and worthy thing to do it should be more selective with regard to the countries receiving the aid as it was no longer appropriate for some. The type of projects supported should be reviewed and also how the funds are distributed as corruption is rife in many overseas government agencies. In addition to official government aid, considerable support is also given directly to many overseas projects by organizations such as The Lions, Rotary, Oxfam etc. With regard to "charity at home" this is not neglected as many of the approx. 170,000 registered charities and 600,000 unregistered but active charities in the UK devote their energies and funds to the deserving within the UK enabled by the generosity of the British public (eg Sports Relief £50m+and counting!!)

HISTORY GROUP





Dr Paula Barclay's talk to our group in March was entitled "The Mighty Atom - Ellen Wilkinson". A campaigner all her life for social justice, Ellen was born in 1891 and joined the Independent Labour Party at the age of 16, becoming an MP in 1924. At that time there were only 4 women in the House of Commons and she was the only woman in the Labour benches. A Diminutive figure of 4' 10", she

liked to dress in bright colours and with her red hair was much admired by the male Mps; Lady Astor, who became her friend, advised her it would be better to wear more sombre colours. On only her second day as an MP she made her maiden speech. In 1931 she lost her seat and wrote books until in 1935 she became MP for Jarrow; in 1936 she helped to organise the Jarrow Crusade and supported the workers on their march to London.

In WW2 she was the Parliamentary Secretary to the Home Secretary, Herbert Morrison, and was much involved in providing shelters inside the home as protection against air-raids. She was also concerned about safety and sanitation in the Tube stations where people slept overnight to escape the bombs and she became known as the

'Shelter Queen'. In 1945 she was a major contributor to the Labour Manifesto - "Let us face the future" - and among her 'firsts' she became the first woman Minister of Education. She raised the school-leaving age to 15 and provided free milk in school.

Ellen had always suffered from ill-health (asthma, bronchitis) and in 1947 she contracted pneumonia and died at the age of 56. A remarkable woman.
