ALL SWING & JAZZ GROUP

Report of the February 2015 Meeting.

The meeting this month was put together by two of our members, John Cooper and Mavis Pickett. John taking on the first half decided to give us two takes on each of his chosen tracks, what was immediately noticeable was the difference that came across between the treatments. First track was

"Take the 'A' Train " The first version was by The Dave Brubeck Quartet and the second by Duke Ellington, this was followed by firstly Louis Armstrong and then Nat King Cole with "Yellow Dog Blues. "Fish Seller" came next with Humphrey Lyttelton followed by the Sidney Bechet version. Anita O'Day and Tony Coe followed on with their respective versions of "Sweet Georgia Brown" John finished his programme with "Wild Man Blues" by firstly Roy Eldridge and the Johnny Dodds Black Bottom Stompers. What was striking was how differently the tunes sounded, in some instances they could have been totally different tracks.

After the usual noisy coffee beak it was back to business with Mavis leading the second half starting with "It Don't Mean a Thing" by the Bill Aldreds Goodtime Jazz Band. One word for that track is 'ROUSING' Then it was a change of tempo with Johnny Hodges playing "Hodge Podge" followed by Amy Winehouse singing "There is no Greater Love" shades of Billy Holiday there both in the voice and in her life. Next up another vocal, as a tribute to Acker Bilk him singing "Gotta see baby tonight" such a friendly voice. Change of tempo again with Stan Getz and "Sweet Miss" Then it was on to the Bob Cooper Sextet with "The Way you look Tonight" I've just realised I have included rather a lot of vocals because here comes another one with Bunny Berigan singing and playing "I can't Get Started" and then (oh dear) George Melly with "Maybe Not At All" So to finish off the programme I've put in another 'ROUSING' track with The Big 18 playing "Tuxedo Junction"

The Thanks of John and myself to Dennis for putting two such diverse halves together. Our next meeting will be on the 23rd April 2015 in the lounge of the Methodist Church, Old Town starting at 2p.m.

CARD MAKING GROUP



GRUMPY OLD MEN GROUP

An excellent, comprehensive and, at times, controversial presentation by Paul Burley, our Grump of the Month, kicked off our discussion on "Should we men be concerned about Girl Power". Exploring the status of women through the ages from when they were considered subservient to men and generally undervalued in their capabilities, except possibly in procreation, to the present day where there is now a

considerably degree of equality between the sexes particularly in Western society, Paul suggested that the advent of WW1 had a huge positive impact on the emancipation of women when they enjoyed a degree of financial independence and wider opportunities. While conceding that there is still a long way to go and it may still take some time he maintained that female domination is a distinct possibility in the future. During subsequent discussion the Grumps displayed very diverse opinions about the rise in the prominence of women in all aspects of life but were in total agreement it is still very much "a man's world". Although, perhaps irrationally, some queried the desirability of having females in certain jobs, e.g. airline pilots and ships captains, it was felt that equal opportunity (and pay) should apply but positive discrimination in favour of women was to be avoided. We recognised that women have a unique position in society and have greater expectations for their future roles and influence but we questioned do they actually want this ever greater freedom and opportunity. Somewhat reluctantly the Group accepted the inexorable rise of Girl Power but rather than be concerned perhaps it would be better to sit back and enjoy the women's take over - while we still can!!

HISTORY GROUP

Our scheduled speaker at our March meeting was unwell and we were grateful to Madeleine Cox and Victoria Lawston of the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust who filled the breach at very short notice to tell us about the collections of the Trust, which comprise over 55,000 books, over 1 million documents (some dating back to the 12th century), photographs, artefacts and works of art. Madeleine gave us illustrated information sheets about particular "treasures": a 1541 edition of Cranmer's Bible, a coloured 16th cen-

tury map of London, a Hundred Merry Tales (1526) to which Beatrice refers in "Much Ado About Nothing" and some of which was used to teach English and Italian languages, and illustrations of the 1769 festival organised by David Garrick, which kick started the tourist industry.

As our scheduled speaker was to have talked about the First World War in Stratford, Victoria had prepared information sheets about that. There was a poster about a concert and dance in aid of the Belgian Refugee Fund, a letter to the mayor offering a house in Loxley for rhe refugees, photos of yeomanry troops leaving Stratford in 1915, the V.A.D. Hospital in the Town Hall and the Hampshire Regiment's return from Gallipoli in 1916. Particularly poignant are the extracts from the diary written by Corporal Harry Fox from August 1914 until January 1917: terrible weather, rats, sick horses, enemy fire, cold nights, frozen boots (I was struck by his reference to the fact that grey horses were not required at the front because of their colour).

The Reading Room at the Shakespeare Centre is open free of charge (Wednesday - Saturday). On Monday 13th April David Ball is giving a talk on the History of the Black Country...
