IAt our July meeting Helen Cooke gave us a talk on 'Shakespeare in Warwickshire', illustrated with documents, maps and portraits in the possession of the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust. The earliest map of Warwickshire was dated 1576 and showed how rural the area was. (Shakespeare was born in 1564 and died in 1616). At that time the population of Stratford was about 2,500 and it took 3 days to travel to London. Clopton Bridge, a wooden structure with 14 arches, was built about 1490. The first recorded reference to John

Shakespeare, Shakespeare's father, was 29<sup>th</sup> April 1552, when he was fined one shilling for having an assel, an unauthorised midden (muck heap) in Henley Street (he should have used the muck heap at the country end of Henley Street.). Among the numerous references to the family in the records Helen detailed the whitewashing by John of the medieval wall paintings in the Guild chapel, the purchase by William of New Place in 1597 and in 1602 of 107 acres of land in Old Stratford. William had become a gentleman of means. There will not be a meeting of the group in August.

#### SCIENCE, NATURE & 'ALL THINGS' TECHNICAL GROUP

On Friday 11<sup>th</sup> July we visited the Midland Air Museum and the Roman Fort, both at Baginton near Coventry Airport. When all the party had assembled at the Air Museum, we entered and had an introductory talk about the museum and the display centred on the way that Frank Whittle had pioneered the jet engine. We were split into small groups, each led by an experienced guide. My group had a sit in an early Vickers Viscount pas-

senger airliner. This was a turboprop plane introduced in 1948 and brought fast, quiet pressurised airliners to short/medium hall journeys - the first in the world. We looked at several jet fighters and bombers from various countries and then went inside an Argosy Galaxy - a large transport aircraft from the 1960s. It was enormous. There was an Avro Vulcan, one of the UK's nuclear V-bombers of the Cold War period to be explored. A very interesting visit. We were only

there for about 2 hours and so could not explore anything in depth. It would certainly repay having a further visit or two to fully explore the exhibits.

After lunch in a nearby pub we continued on to the Roman Fort nearby. This was an unusual fort as it was not merely for a contingent of legionaries or auxiliaries. It seems to have been built in its final form just after the rebellion of Boudicca in AD61 to hold and train the large number of horses that were acquired at that time. The Gyrus (a large wooden stockade within the fort) was constructed about AD64 and would have been essential in horse training. The fort was abandoned about AD80 during the time when Governor Agricola was advancing to northern Britain.
