HISTORY GROUP

In January we were back in our usual Side Room attractively refurbished with blinds colour matched to the window frames and access to a splendid kitchen.

Anais Cooper, the Operations Manager of Nash's House next to the site of New Place, told us of the history of New Place, which was built towards the end of the 15th Century by Hugh Clopton. When William Shakespeare bought it for £120 in 1597 it was one of the largest houses in Stratford with 22 rooms and 10 fireplaces. Shakespeare is generally thought to have returned from London in 1610 and lived at New Place until his death in 1616. The house passed to his daughter Susanna who moved there with her husband Dr John Hall from Hall's Croft. Subsequently, it was owned by Shakespeare's grand-daughter but, after her death and that of her second husband, it was sold out of the family. In the middle of the 18th century it was owned by the Rev. Francis Gastrell, who became so irritated by visitors coming to see the mulberry tree, said to have been planted by Shakespeare, that he had it cut down. And he was so annoyed with the town authorities over rate assessments that he had the house demolished. Now only the foundations remain. In 1862 the site was purchased as a national memorial to Shakespeare and was later taken over by the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust.

Tess Hill, who is the Development Officer for the Trust, said the digs in 2010 had revealed where the house stood. She told us about the Trust's plans for Nash's House and the garden of New Place, which included a lift attached at the back of Nash's House, a "ghost-like" reproduction of New Place in the garden and the restriction of entry to the Great Garden. Some of us were not entirely happy about the plans but we shall have to wait and see.

On Monday 10th February Dr Robert Bearman, who retired as Archivist to the Trust, is giving us a talk entitled "The Shakespeare Family Graves - what do they tell us? All are welcome.
